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Preface and Acknowledgements

Several years ago I received a fellowship award from the National Endowment for the Humanities to conduct a study of the imperial rhetoric in Fatimid public pronouncements. Part of my plan involved collecting all known copies of decrees, orders, letters, and manifestos issued by the government, in addition to any other written record of official communiqués. We possess almost none in their original form but many, perhaps upwards of 300, exist in various secondary contexts having been transcribed by clerks of the chancery or by historians and others for their own purposes. One result of my effort was a preliminary catalogue of such materials. Another, however, was the realization of how important one subset of it could be. Those were the sermons delivered by the Fatimid imam-caliphs. The great majority of the other documents were the product of the royal chancery; they were composed by people employed in it and thus not by the caliphs, at least not directly. This situation does not diminish the value of such decrees as a true expression of Fatimid policy; all of them were certainly offered in accord with explicit orders and each said what the caliph wanted said. But, while voicing his sentiments and that of the tradition to which the Fatimids ascribed, few actually conveyed his own words. In short, except for a small handful, the caliph rarely wrote them himself. In general, however, the opposite was true of the sermons, which were not only delivered by the imams in person whenever possible, but also composed by them. Therefore we have the possibility, in this latter case, of listening to (or more precisely of reading) the very words of the imams.

The sermon—in Arabic, the *khuṭba*—was (and is) a standard feature of Friday congregational observance. It was offered each and every Friday. The Fatimid caliphs naturally did not deliver such

sermons that often. However, the duty to do so on the twice-yearly occasion of the festivals—the two Muslim *ʿīds*, the feasts of fast-breaking and of sacrifice—was taken seriously and seldom missed by the imams. In later Fatimid times some Friday sermons were added for Ramaḍān. Yet precious few examples, even of the sermons delivered by an imam, have survived. Still, those that have come down to us are more than enough to begin to appreciate the event and the words uttered on it.

Our principal purpose in this book is, therefore, to provide access to these sermons by presenting the Arabic originals and complete English translations of all those now available. To understand their context it is also necessary to learn as much as possible about the practice of the *khuṭba* and its history. For this reason, the first two chapters are devoted to a history of the Fatimid *khuṭba*—what was said, by whom and on what occasions, and to an analysis of the themes and rhetorical strategies given expression in the surviving examples.

Acknowledgements

It is most important to recognize at the outset the work of Muḥammad al-Yaʿlāwī. Had it not been for his *al-Adab fi-Ifriqiya fi'l-ʿahd al-Fātimiyya* (French title, *La littérature en Ifriqiya sous les Fatimides*, published in Beirut, 1986) I would, most likely, never have noticed the importance of these *khuṭbas* or, more significantly, how many of them exist. In his book al-Yaʿlāwī assembled all the known examples of early Fatimid literature—texts which were actually composed in North Africa during the period of the caliph's residence there—including the sermons, some letters, and poetry.

To better comprehend the Islamic tradition of sermons, I consulted many friends and colleagues. In one instance I organized a panel of experts on the topic for the Middle East Studies Association annual meeting (2006). To my fellow panelists, Jonathan P. Berkey, Philip Halldén, Linda Gale Jones, and Tahera Qutbuddin, I owe special thanks for having educated me in this subject, either on that occasion or through their writings.

As I delved ever more deeply into the rituals surrounding the delivery of these sermons, I came to rely increasingly on Paula

Sanders' study of Fatimid ceremonial, *Ritual, Politics, and the City in Fatimid Cairo* (Albany, NY, 1994). Ultimately it seemed only natural to consult her directly. I asked her to read an early version of Chapter 1 and she kindly responded positively, offering queries, corrections, and new information.

I must also thank Abbas Hamdani who offered me the chance to participate peripherally in his project to edit and publish Ḥātim b. Ibrāhīm al-Ḥāmidī's *Kitāb tuḥfat al-qulūb wa farjat al-makrūb*. One of the caliphal *khuṭbas* included here is found in it alone.

At a late stage I had the opportunity to show the Arabic of these sermons to Husain Qutbuddin, who, in addition to his own scholarship in the topic of Ismaili commentary on the Qur'an, is himself a *ḥāfiẓ*. Keenly aware of which phrases are verbatim quotations from the sacred book and which echo or borrow from it, he provided much needed guidance.

Several other colleagues, especially at the University of Chicago, generously allowed me to consult them concerning matters arising from this study, among them Ahmed Hashem, Khaled Keshk, Tahera Qutbuddin, Saifiyah Qutbuddin and Bruce Craig.

Writing to thank those who helped with a project such as this months before the final steps of editing and printing means having to leave out many names that ought to be mentioned but who appear too late to be included. Given that this book follows another of mine in the same series (*Master of the Age: An Islamic Treatise on the Necessity of the Imamate*), it will not be amiss to cite here the staff of The Institute of Ismaili Studies, most particularly of the editorial team at the Department of Academic Research and Publications, Kutub Kassam, Patricia Salazar and Fayaz Alibhai, as well as Shellina Karmali of the library, who provided invaluable help on that book. I can only hope that this volume will have benefit of as much help and attention as that one did.

Note on the Arabic texts of the *khuṭbas*

The first nine *khuṭbas* (nos. 1–9) in this collection come from the North African period of Fatimid rule. As noted above, the well respected Tunisian scholar Muḥammad al-Ya'lāwī first brought special attention to them as a part of his work *al-Adab bi-Ifriqiya fī'l-'ahd al-Fāṭimiyya*.

For that volume he assembled the surviving examples of the caliphal *khuṭbas*, providing in the process a basic edition of the Arabic text for each one. For the Arabic text of these nine I have relied in the main on that edition. A year earlier, al-Yaʿlāwī also published a critical edition of the North African portion of the highly important history of the Ismaili imams by the 15th-century Ṭayyibī authority Idris ʿImād al-Dīn, the *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*. His edition of that work carries the title: *Taʾriḫ al-khulafāʾ al-Fāṭimiyyīn biʾl-maghrib: al-qism al-khāṣṣ min Kitāb ʿuyūn al-akhbār* (Beirut, 1985). As it is also the principal source for eight of these nine *khuṭbas* (all but no. 8), three of which appear in it alone (nos. 1, 3 and 9), al-Yaʿlāwī's text, either there or in his *al-Adab bi-Ifriqiya*, may be accepted as the basic edition of them, as I have done in this work. He had also consulted the *Sīrat Jawdhar*, which includes among its many documents from the period three of these *khuṭbas* (nos. 2, 5 and 7). Ustādh Jawdhar was the eunuch servant of the early Fatimid caliphs. Eventually he rose as high in such service as possible, becoming a quasi-wazir, responsible for much of the government, as well as the personal affairs of his masters. Two of the *khuṭbas* (nos. 2 and 7) were given to him personally by the caliph al-Manṣūr for him to hold in safe-keeping and to copy for himself. Jawdhar's collection of letters and documents—the *khuṭbas* among them—were edited by one of his own servants, a disciple named Abū ʿAlī al-Manṣūr al-Jawdhari (ʿal-Jawdhariʾ to signify that he once belonged to Jawdhar), to form what is called his *Sira*. That was published as *Sīrat Ustādh Jawdhar*, Arabic text edited by M. K. Husayn and M. ʿAbd al-Hādi Shaʿīra (Cairo, 1954), with a French translation by M. Canard, *Vie de l'ustadh Jaudhar* (Alger, 1958). Given that Jawdhar was himself a contemporary witness, his copies would have great claim to authenticity if, in fact, we could be certain of the transmission of his text, which was preserved and recopied exclusively by the same Ṭayyibī *daʿwa* to which Idris belonged. In his *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*, Idris obviously made use of it; his versions of these same *khuṭbas* are thus also a witness to those of Jawdhar.

In his *al-Adab bi-Ifriqiya*, al-Yaʿlāwī added readings and additions from yet another source for three of the eight *khuṭbas* (nos. 4, 6 and 7) in the *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*: namely the 15th-century Mamluk era historian al-Maqrizī's unfinished biographical dictionary, the *Muqaffā*. Although never completed, we possess substantial portions

of this work, including its lengthy biography of al-Manṣūr. Among other pieces by the caliph, this section of the *Muqaffā* contains four of his *khuṭbas*. Three of them are versions of those known already from Idrīs, but one is unique (no. 8). It does not appear in any other source.

Five years after publishing his *al-Adab bi-Ifriqiya*, al-Yaʿlāwī completed an edition of what survives of the *Muqaffā* (Beirut, 1991). Volume two includes the biography of al-Manṣūr (pp. 129–180). Although the editor is not quite clear about the changes he might have incorporated—the printed text of this material in the *Muqaffā* is later than his earlier editions of the same texts—it seems reasonable to assume that any adjustments he thought necessary for the later publication represent a better reading of the text. I have tried to adopt here the latest version.

For the first of these sermons, we possess, in addition to the al-Yaʿlāwī edition, a version offered by Samuel Stern and published in chapter six of his posthumous *Studies in Early Ismāʿīlism* (Jerusalem, 1983), pp. 116–121. Stern's source, as with al-Yaʿlāwī, was Idrīs's *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*. But he apparently based his work on a different manuscript. I have noted the main variants between the two and marked them as 'Stern' in the apparatus.

One *khuṭba* (but one only)—a sermon by al-Manṣūr (no. 7) on the ʿĪd al-fiṭr 336—appears in all three of these sources: in the *Sīrat Jawdhar*, in the *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*, and in the *Muqaffā*. A careful investigation of the differences indicates how close the three are for most of the text, and yet there are also serious discrepancies. That Idrīs follows *Jawdhar* fairly accurately is to be expected. But al-Maqrīzī, whose versions of these texts are generally less exact than those of Idrīs, includes a whole paragraph or more that is missing from the *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*. Obviously, then, al-Maqrīzī had access to a source that Idrīs most likely did not.

Two more of the *khuṭbas* (nos. 12 and 13) in this collection come from the *ʿUyūn al-akhbār*, not from the earlier North African period but from much later: the first decades of the 6th/12th century and the reign of the caliph al-Āmir. That section of the work was edited and published by Ayman Fuʾad Sayyid in *The Fatimids and Their Successors in Yaman: The History of an Islamic Community* (London,

2002). In the case of these latter two *khuṭbas*, I was able to consult a manuscript that Sayyid did not have. For it I have entered several new readings indicated in the notes with the letter ف, here meaning the Fyzee manuscript now in Haydarabad. (The letter ʾ represents Ayman Fuʾad Sayyid's reading).

The remaining two *khuṭbas* (nos. 10 and 11) derive respectively from the 6th/12th-century Ṭayyibī dāʿī Ḥātim b. Ibrāhīm al-Ḥāmidī's *Kitāb tuḥfat al-qulūb wa farjat al-makrūb*, as edited by Abbas Hamdani (forthcoming), and from Ibn al-Jawzī's *al-Muntaẓam fī taʾrīkh al-mulūk wa'l-umam* (Hayderabad, 1939). The same *khuṭba* of Qirwāsh is also found in Ibn Taghri Birdī's *al-Nujūm al-zāhira fī mulūk Miṣr wa'l-Qāhira* (Cairo) with some variations. I have taken note of the differences between the two in the apparatus.

Qurʾanic quotations in the Arabic and in the translations

These *khuṭbas* are full of Qurʾanic references, either as verbatim quotations or borrowings that reflect less exactly the wording of a particular passage. The speaker in most cases fully intended his audience to recognize them. In this type of discourse, which is religious by its very nature and which, especially when delivered by the imam himself, carries the highest doctrinal authority, does not require that these quotations have formal markers. Thus the text does not indicate exactly which phrases derive from the sacred book. For the present purpose, however, it seems essential to identify them. Accordingly, I have noted in the main body of each *khuṭba* those that quote verbatim, enclosing them with quotation marks and adding in brackets the *sūra* and verse numbers. Others that recall or allude to a Qurʾanic phrase, but not with the precise words, I have identified only in the notes. Certain standard, oft-repeated phrases that have a Qurʾanic counterpart, but are here not clearly quoted from it, have not always been acknowledged in this manner.

CHAPTER 1

A History of the Fatimid *Khuṭba*

A Fatimid *khuṭba* in Abbasid Iraq

In the year 401 (1010–1011), the ‘Uqaylid ruler of north Mesopotamia, Qirwāsh b. al-Muqallad, abruptly announced that he would switch his allegiance from the Abbasid caliph in Baghdad to the Fatimid caliph al-Ḥākim bi-Amr Allāh in Cairo. He was in fact setting up a *da‘wa*, an appeal, in the latter’s name. In typical fashion the formal public declaration of the change occurred in the next Friday *khuṭba* delivered in Mawṣil, the capital city of Qirwāsh’s domain. The ‘Uqaylid ruler simply handed the *khaṭīb* (the preacher) the text of his new sermon and the man dutifully read it to the assembled worshippers. That was the 4th of Muḥarram (18 August). Two months later, on the 2nd of Rabī‘ al-Awwal (13 October), the same or a similar announcement greeted the Muslim community in the congregational mosque of al-Anbār and one week after that in al-Madā’in and Qaṣr ibn Hubayra.¹ A quick glance at a map of Iraq indicates that the cities that had unexpectedly gone over to the Fatimids form what amounted to a noose around Baghdad. The Abbasid caliph could not but be alarmed; his position had, seemingly overnight, become perilous.²

Later Sunni historians, principally Ibn al-Jawzī and Ibn Taghrī Birdī, both of whom were decidedly anti-Fatimid, had a hard time making sense of this incident, even though they provide far more details about it than any other sources. Ibn al-Jawzī reports that agents for al-Ḥākim worked persistently to win over the ‘Uqaylids and eventually succeeded. Both historians insist that the inhabitants of Mawṣil agreed to the change with the ‘positive response of an enslaved flock, while concealing their true aversion and disgust’, and both marvel at how easily the *khaṭīb*, who had previously pronounced the sermon in the name of the Abbasid caliph, al-Qādir bi-llāh, would acquiesce in the change, which amounted almost to converting from Sunni to Shi‘i Islam. They offer a list of rather sumptuous new accoutrements—by implication a bribe—bestowed on him for the occasion.³

For al-Qādir the matter was urgent and critical. Still, he himself possessed no real army. His throne depended on the good will of Buyid overlords. To make his case to them, he enlisted the help of the famous Mālikī jurist and Ash‘arite theologian, Abū Bakr al-Bāqillānī, whose anti-Isma‘ili sentiments were well known. Al-Bāqillānī went to Bahā’ al-Dawla, the supreme Buyid amir, who, although himself inclined to Shi‘ism, was nevertheless bothered by Qirwāsh’s act, seeing it as a challenge to his own authority. The Buyid ruler then ordered 100,000 dīnārs to be spent either on a military force or a bribe to convince the ‘Uqaylid to reverse course and return to the Abbasids. Our historians claim that al-Ḥākim had offered no more than 30,000. In any case, Qirwāsh quickly realized where his best interest lay; the *khuṭba* in his lands soon once again called for God’s blessings on

al-Qādir. Within a couple of months at most—some say a month only—the matter had been resolved in favour of the Abbasids.⁴

In all, this incident seems to represent but a brief interval, hardly worth more than a passing mention. The rivalry between the two caliphates was old by then. The Abbasid al-Qādir required little to provoke him at any time into the strongest reaction and take what counter-measures he could. The famous Baghdad Manifesto of 402, one year later, which refuted the validity of the Fatimid claim of descent from ‘Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, is an example. Even so, while not itself a lasting stage in this competition, an unexpected benefit of Qirwāsh’s declaration of 401 is that a verbatim copy of the actual text of the *khuṭba* he issued for the occasion survived. And, most intriguing, it was carefully preserved by Ibn al-Jawzī, and from him by Ibn Taghrī Birdī. It is true that many odd bits of information show up in the former’s *al-Muntaẓam*, but for a vehemently anti-Fatimid writer to include this *khuṭba*, which is clearly pro-Fatimid, in its entirety, is at the least curious. Still more puzzling is that it is the sole complete example of a standard Friday *khuṭba* on behalf of the Fatimids to reach us.

Khuṭbas and khaṭībs

The Friday sermon is a required element in Islamic ritual; it is universally acknowledged by Muslims and performed in every weekly service as part of the community’s congregational worship. Its origin

Their latent Shi‘ism and inclination to recognize the Ismaili imamate was therefore either always present, though prudently hidden, or recurring.

is extremely old, going back to the practice of the Prophet, perhaps even earlier. Many of the provisions for it are common to the several *madhhabs*, including the Shi'a. The Fatimids were no exception.⁵ Typically, the sermon, which precedes prayers, is delivered by a professional preacher, the *khaṭīb*. Under the Fatimids *khaṭībs* (the Arabic plural is *khuṭabā'*) were government officials employed by the judiciary. They thus fell within the domain of the chief qadi, the *qāḍī al-quḍāt*.⁶ Therefore, significantly, although the Fatimids continued to maintain the *da'wa*, as its teaching and proselytizing organization, which was likewise a bureau of the government, the *khuṭba* was not the responsibility of the chief *dā'ī* or of his missionaries. Nevertheless, a late source reports that the salary allocated for individual *khaṭībs* was ten to twenty dinars per month,⁷ which is a not inconsiderable amount, and indicates how important they were.⁸ A passage from a section of al-Qalqashandī's manual of chancery practice includes the text of a decree of appointment for a judge under the Fatimids. One paragraph in it is devoted to the role of the *khaṭībs* whose job he is to supervise:

The *khaṭībs* are the knights of the *minbars*, the tongues of those assembled, the spokesmen of the sacred rituals, and the leaders of the congregations. They are the emissaries of the heart to its lofty station by means of the ears, its purifier that makes hearts overcome

its illnesses. His warfare drives away the satans of the communities when they commit aggression against them. He gives expression to guidance and uses his eloquence to the utmost to lead them rightly. He perfects the articulation of the letters so that they serve to enable their fulfilment and manifestation. His exhortation unties from the hardened eyes the knots that bind them and he calls to the rusted hearts until his cry unleashes their tears. He wears proudly the robes of high dignity so that *minbars* appear properly dressed because of him. His sermons nourish the souls when they come to him seeking assistance and appealing for help.⁹

There is no reason to assume that the sentiments articulated in this quite late document are in any way different from what might have been expressed a century or two earlier. Just as they would have been in other regions of the Islamic world, these 'knights of the *minbar*', whether Ismaili or not, were, under the Fatimids, men of distinction and religious probity.

Rules for the *khuṭba*, as stipulated in the writings of the various schools, stress that it be brief, among other conditions, for example, regarding dress of the *khaṭīb* and his ritual purity. Other provisions pertain to its content: recitation of Qur'anic passages, prayers (*du'ā*) on behalf of the faithful, admonitions to piety, blessings on the Prophet, all normally regarded as obligatory. Generally these *khuṭbas* actually consist of two given consecutively. The *khaṭīb* mounts the *minbar*, pronounces the first, sits for a moment, and then rises for the second. Other occasions for the *khuṭba* include the two 'īd festivals: 'Īd al-ḥiṭr, breaking of the fast following the close of Ramaḍān, and 'Īd al-aḍḥā (also called 'Īd al-naḥr), the feast of sacrifice on the 10th of Dhu'l-Ḥijja. *Khuṭbas* may be a part of rituals for special purposes such as an eclipse, a drought, or an appeal for a *jihād*. A festival *khuṭba*, which, in contrast to that of Fridays, follows prayers, conforms to the occasion of it, featuring instructions to the congregation on the stipulations for either the *zakāt al-ḥiṭr* (alms due at the breaking of the fast) or for proper and acceptable sacrifice (i.e. what animals may be slaughtered and how).¹⁰

Though not necessary according to Islamic law, it was customary to mention in these *khuṭbas* the name of the ruling sovereign by imploring God to bestow His blessing on him. This custom gained enormous importance, so much so that the historical chronicles note any changes or alterations, such as is in the case of Qirwāsh, just cited. Whereas *khuṭbas* naming the ruler, the reigning caliph, or both were routine throughout a kingdom, any alteration or modification had immediate political consequences. A switch from the Abbasids to the Fatimids, or vice versa, had religious meaning as well. This aspect of the *khuṭba* and its variations is a vital tool for determining the history of dynasties. More than the coinage, which also names the ultimate authority under whom it was issued, the *khuṭba* established sovereignty in as short a span of time as one week. There are, moreover, instances where the *khuṭba* changed back and forth quickly.

The holy cities of the Hijaz, for example, possessed huge symbolic significance. The caliph could claim ultimate supremacy only if he controlled them. The Fatimids obtained recognition in Mecca and Medina with the advent of the caliph al-Mu'izz in Egypt. The *khuṭba* named them thereafter until the Seljuks grew powerful enough to contest it. As with other cities and regions, however, the *khuṭba* in Mecca and Medina could revert.¹¹ Aleppo in northern Syria witnessed

frequent changes of allegiances throughout the 5th/11th century. The Zīrids in North Africa likewise both renounced their recognition of the Fatimids and returned to it on several occasions, beginning in the mid-5th/11th century and continuing onward to the time of al-Āmir in the early part of the next.

Nor were *khuṭbas* accorded this level of political importance solely within the lands of Islam. An interesting case is that of Constantinople and the Byzantine empire. Fatimid relations with the Byzantines began soon after the conquest of the Maghrib and continued, at times with animosity and in other periods with peace, for the next two centuries or more. In the year 378/988, a treaty concluded with Byzantium stipulated, among other provisions, that the *khuṭba* said in the mosque of Constantinople name the Fatimid caliph al-ʿAzīz as the Muslim supreme authority.¹² It is difficult to imagine that the congregation of Muslims in the Byzantine capital was large enough to be significant. However, renewals of this treaty maintained that provision. In 418/1027, a treaty with the Emperor made sure that *khuṭbas* in the lands of the Byzantines were to name only the Fatimid al-Zāhir. The mosque in Constantinople is to reopen, it says, and in exchange al-Zāhir will permit the reopening of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem (both were evidently closed in the period prior to this).¹³ Three decades later, in 447/1055, this stipulation remained in effect (or had been renewed in subsequent treaties), when an ambassador from the Seljuk sultan Tughril Beg arrived in Constantinople and asked if he could use its mosque. The Emperor granted him permission. The man went to the mosque on Friday to say his prayer and while there also gave a *khuṭba* in the name of the Abbasid caliph al-Qāʾim. At the same time the qadi Abū ʿAbdallāh al-Quḍāʾī, who was the official representative of the

Fatimid caliph al-Mustanşir, happened to be in Constantinople on behalf of his own master. He reported this breach of the treaty to Cairo, whereupon al-Mustanşir revoked its provisions and ordered that all the goods and possessions in the Holy Sepulchre be seized by the government, leading predictably to a serious deterioration of relations with the Byzantines.¹⁴ Yet it is unclear if the Byzantines fully appreciated how a small gesture on their part—allowing a visitor to use the mosque—could cause such an aggressive reaction elsewhere. Perhaps they failed to realize that al-Qudā'ī was present and would report what had happened to Cairo.

Changing the *khuṭba* might come with other symbolic measures beyond the naming of the new ruler and altering the colour of the preacher's robes. In 450/1058, when the amir al-Basāsirī captured Baghdad on behalf of the Fatimids, he had the *khuṭba* read in the name of al-Mustanşir in its mosques and the *muṣallā* (festival grounds) one by one. Al-Maqrīzī reports that, on the 'Īd al-naḥr, he smashed the *minbar* in the mosque in Baghdad and built a new one, stating 'this *minbar* is sinister; from it hatred of the family of Muḥammad has been proclaimed'.¹⁵

But the other side could be equally as vociferous. A case in point involves the Zīrids. This dynasty inherited the old Maghribi dominion of the early Fatimids. They were theoretically vassals of the caliph in Cairo. The Ṣanhāja Berbers from which tribe these rulers came were not, however, ever converted to Ismailism in contrast to the Kutāma. Most remained Mālikī Sunni even while supporting, at first loyally, the Fatimid cause. Shortly after the accession of the Zīrid al-Mu'izz b. Bādīs in 407/1016, anti-Ismaili riots, fomented by Mālikī clerics and possibly secretly abetted by the government, decimated what remained of any Shi'ī centres in the cities of North Africa. Nonetheless, al-Mu'izz preserved the trappings of continued allegiance, notably the *khuṭba*, until 440/1048–1049. In that year he cut his ties to Cairo for the first time. The Maghribi (Sunni) historian Ibn 'Idhārī reports that he ceased the *khuṭba* in favour of the lord of Egypt and burned the banners of the Fatimids. He also quotes from

the poet Ibn Sharaf al-Qayrawānī, who was extremely well connected at the Zīrid court and lived contemporary to the event.¹⁶ He offers a detailed account of al-Mu‘izz’s switching the *khuṭba* to the Abbasids, thereby putting an end to the *da‘wa* of the Fatimids. The reason given is that, following the departure of the caliph from the Maghrib in the middle of the previous century, the appeal of the Fatimids—recitation of their names from the *minbars*—was resented so strongly that fewer and fewer attended the Friday service, leaving the mosques empty. After many years the Zīrid ruler finally, according to this view, came to agree with his subjects, broke off the *khuṭba* in their favour, and divorced himself from them. On top of that he ordered his *khaṭīb*, commencing with the *khuṭba* of the next ‘Id al-aḏḥā, to insert into the *khuṭba* a cursing of the Fatimids. Ibn Sharaf preserved a copy of the portion that contained this curse and it is available in Ibn ‘Idhārī’s *al-Bayān al-mughrib fī akhbār al-Andalus wa’l-Maghrib*.¹⁷

It is worth wondering, as the medieval authors often do, how the same *khaṭīb* could, after perhaps years of calling upon God to bless the Fatimid caliphs, suddenly recite a string of curses against them, asking that God do the same. But this problem occurred often enough. In the obituaries of famous preachers, their biographers might note, as in one example, that ‘Abd al-Karīm b. al-Ḥusayn Abu’l-Barakāt, a well-respected preacher, had said the *khuṭba* in Damascus for both the Abbasids *and* the Fatimids.¹⁸ And, as with Qirwāsh’s *khaṭīb* in 401 and the example here for the Zīrids, there are many more like him.¹⁹

In most of these examples what exactly was said in the new *khuṭba*, and how, was likely of great historical interest. Nonetheless,

although the text carried obvious importance, there exist few records or information beyond the mere fact of the change. Most *khuṭbas* were never copied; and it is probable that on the vast majority of occasions the preacher spoke extemporaneously, perhaps embellishing a memorized sermon, or elements thereof. Famous *khaṭībs*—those noted for their rhetorical skills and eloquence—did in certain instances assemble collections of their work in book form, providing in turn models for others in the profession. However, it is difficult now to determine which of them might have been originally read in a mosque rather than composed solely for the book. Thus, while such books of sample sermons may have value as literature, they tell us little about historical events. Under such conditions, the survival of a verbatim copy of Qirwāsh's *khuṭba* is extraordinary. Because it is the sole example of what were, in their time, thousands and thousands of *khuṭbas* on behalf of the Fatimids—one on each Friday in every city and town in their empire, or otherwise in support of them—it holds a unique position. Can it, because it is all we have, stand for the rest? Were the others like it?

Qirwāsh's *khuṭba* may have survived because it was not merely a written text but because copies of it circulated to the other cities of his domain. Possibly the same *khuṭba* was used in al-Anbār, Qaṣr, and al-Madā'in, and perhaps elsewhere in towns unnamed in our reports. It is more than likely that agents of the Abbasid caliph obtained an example of it, which thus made it available to later historians such as the Baghdad-based Ibn al-Jawzī. Significantly, we possess no complete example of an ordinary Friday *khuṭba* delivered inside the Fatimid empire. Given its importance, this situation is puzzling.

The Fatimids ruled a diverse population; Muslims within the empire belonged to a complete array of Islamic communities and schools. Even the chief justices, men who had ultimate responsibility for the *khuṭba* and the *khaṭībs* employed under their supervision, were frequently not Ismaili. Many judges were Mālikī or Ḥanafī, in other words, Sunnis.²⁰ Yet a basic stipulation of holding such offices required acceptance of the *khuṭba* and that which was said in

the name of the Fatimid caliph. Muslims attending Friday services anywhere within the empire would hear the preacher ask God to bestow His blessings on these Ismaili imams. It is true that the average citizen need accept what he heard only passively. Even so, he could not escape at least a basic level of recognition of those who ruled over him without fleeing or hiding, and there is little evidence of that, notwithstanding the resistance in the Maghrib cited above. Many other parts of the Fatimid empire accepted their rule without protest. They enjoyed considerable support and evident loyalty from all their subjects. Willingness to listen to that *khuṭba* would have constituted a minimal requirement for citizenship within their territory. Would then we could know more about exactly what was said in it.

Festival *khuṭbas* by the Fatimid caliphs

Fortunately, another category of *khuṭba*—those composed and delivered by the caliphs themselves—is much better represented in our sources. Where there are none for the ordinary Friday *khuṭba*, we have a dozen, more or less, for the imams. The Fatimid caliphs believed that it was their responsibility to deliver the *khuṭba* on the two *ʿīd* festivals,²¹ a duty evidently well suited to most of them, particularly al-Qāʾim, al-Manṣūr, al-Muʿizz, al-ʿAzīz, al-Ḥākim, al-Zāhir, al-Mustanṣir, and al-Āmir. For the rest, evidence of their participation is lacking, which may mean that we simply have no record of their having given the *khuṭba* in person. In the case of the first Fatimid caliph al-Mahdī, however, one report indicates that he did not undertake so public a function, preferring instead to have his eldest son, the future al-Qāʾim, fill that role in his place.

Among those for whom we have examples of their *khuṭbas*, al-Manṣūr stands out. He was famous for his ability to compose and deliver the sermon, and was admired for it even by the Sunnis.²² The North African historian Ibn Ḥammād commends him for his eloquence,²³ and the Mamluk era Egyptian authority, al-Maqrīzī,

who is one of our principal sources, included whole *khuṭbas* and other examples of al-Manṣūr's compositions in his biography of this caliph.²⁴ It is obvious that he also thought highly of them.

It is odd, nonetheless, that we do not have more examples. For Ismailis any statement by the imam has extraordinary value. Surely, if a text of what they said, in the *khuṭba* or on any another occasion, ever existed, it would have been preserved and recopied for posterity? The answer—perhaps the only explanation possible—is that, as with al-Manṣūr, who could deliver the *khuṭba* extemporaneously at will and without a text to read, the caliph rarely wrote down what he said. Those we have copies of are, therefore, all that may have existed; the rest were delivered by him but he left no written text of them. The same may be true of the other imams.

The very earliest *khuṭba* we now possess that was composed and delivered by an imam—actually a future imam—comes from al-Qā'im in his capacity as the heir-apparent. While leading a Fatimid army in the first attempt to conquer Egypt in 302/914–15, he spent time in Alexandria during the 'īd festivals. Following what had evidently become his regular practice, he gave the *khuṭba* on these occasions. One example survives. It was delivered by al-Qā'im on the feast of breaking the fast upon the completion of Ramaḍān that year (19 April 915). What he said in it is, moreover, unusually interesting and historically valuable.²⁵ The text is quite remarkable for its anti-Abbasid (and anti-Umayyad) content and tone, in sum an admonition to the Egyptians to abandon their overlords in Baghdad.

The Andalusian historian from a slightly later period, 'Arīb b. Sa'd, reports that, while in Alexandria, al-Qā'im delivered many *khuṭbas*, and that they were preserved, evidently meaning that copies of them circulated. 'Arīb himself must have obtained his own copy of this collection because he remarks that if they had not been

so heretical, he would have borrowed them for his own use.²⁶ He himself worked under the patronage of the Umayyads in Spain who were vehemently anti-Shi'a. Al-Qā'im's castigation of what he calls 'the tyrants of the Banū Umayya' was quite likely pointed at both the Umayyads of a much earlier era as well as their descendants in the west. It is a pity that there is otherwise no trace of this collection of al-Qā'im's *khuṭbas*.

Moreover, we have no more, either from the reign of his father or his own,²⁷ until the very end of his life, when, from the sickbed of the illness that killed him, he dictated another *khuṭba*,²⁸ which he was too weak to deliver in person. It was read to the faithful assembled in the mosque of al-Mahdiyya, which was then under siege by the Khārijite rebel Abū Yazīd, by the qadi al-Marwadhī. That al-Qā'im actually dictated it himself is attested by his son, who would later deposit his copy of it with Ustādh Jawdhar along with the written text of one of his own *khuṭbas* (one from the year 336). Jawdhar was also given permission to make a copy of both for his own records.²⁹

Even so we have good evidence of al-Qā'im's delivery of the festival *khuṭbas* from the beginning of Fatimid rule. Ibn 'Idhārī reports that, for the 'īd festivals of the year 297/910, al-Qā'im led prayers and gave the *khuṭba* at the *muṣallā* of Raqqāda—the earliest administrative capital of the newly formed Fatimid state—on the feast of fast-breaking and on the feast of sacrifice. This historian comments that, for the first occasion, he proceeded to the *muṣallā* 'accompanied by Abū 'Abdallāh al-Shī'i and a group of the leading commanders of the Kutāma'. It was, he continues, the first 'īd in which he led the

prayer in North Africa. In addition a statement of explanation by the father, al-Mahdī, was read out from the *minbar* of Qayrawān and in the districts surrounding it.³⁰

So important was the responsibility for the festival *khuṭbas* that al-Qā'im was quite sensitive to the status they endowed, even though he was frequently also charged with the command of the armies sent great distances away and thus could not always be available in the capital for the *ids*. On one such expedition in the year 316/928–29, while away in the west, he learned of talk among the people that his father might switch the succession to a younger son, his half brother, Aḥmad Abū 'Alī. These rumours evidently had started because this son had recently been delegated to lead the festival prayers. Alarmed, al-Qā'im immediately returned to al-Mahdiyya for reassurance and to put an end to any gossip of the kind.³¹

Fatimid *khuṭbas* in North Africa

There are two other important pieces of information about *khuṭbas* from the beginning of Fatimid rule. One is that Abū 'Abdallāh al-Shī'ī (who spearheaded the initial conquest of the Maghrib), prior to the advent of al-Mahdī, gave a general order to include in all *khuṭbas* a blessing on Muḥammad and his family. 'He had the *khaṭībs* of the mosques of Raqqāda and al-Qayrawān lead the way. He also wrote to other regions to the same effect. Abū 'Abdallāh ordered that the *khuṭba* include blessings on Muḥammad, on his family, on the Commander of the Believers 'Alī, on al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, and on Fāṭima the Radiant, may the blessings of God be on them all.'³² Therefore the essential elements of a Shi'i *khuṭba* were already present before the first

for al-Mahdī as the new caliph, which occurred on the Friday immediately following his arrival in Raqqāda. 'When the morning dawned on Friday the day following his arrival, he sent out a note ordering that he be prayed for from the *minbars*, and he dispatched it to the *khaṭībs* of Raqqāda and al-Qayrawān telling them to invoke, after the blessing on Muḥammad, a blessing on 'Alī, and Fāṭima and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, and the imams among their progeny, as Abū 'Abdallāh had ordered.'³³ That note, according to Qāḍī al-Nu'mān, stipulated the following prayer as part of the Friday *khuṭba*:³⁴

O God, bless Your servant and Your deputy, the one responsible for the affairs of Your servants in Your land, the servant of God ('*abdallāh*'), Abū Muḥammad, the Imam al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, just as You blessed his forefathers Your deputies, the rightly guided, the *mahdīs*,³⁵ who have discharged the duty of truth and in regard to it acted justly. O God, and just as You chose him for Your guardianship and for Your deputyship (*li-khalīfatika* [i.e. Your caliphate]) and You made him the defence of Your religion and its foundation, and for Your creation a refuge and sanctuary, so grant him victory over Your apostate enemies, and heal through him the breasts of the believers. Conquer through him the easts of the land and its wests as You promised him; support him against the iniquitous rebels, O God of creation, Lord of the worlds.³⁶

In this passage, although we are missing what else might have been said in these earliest *khuṭbas* for the Fatimids, we have at least the key portion. The command the caliph gave evidently stipulated only that these phrases appear in the *khuṭba* without going further. Presumably, in all other matters concerning the *khuṭba*, the individual

khaṭībs continued with their previous practice and traditions. Fatimid *khuṭbas*, even those given by the imams, in general followed Islamic traditions as to form and content.

***Khuṭbas* by al-Manṣūr and al-Muʿizz**

The record of *khuṭbas* by al-Manṣūr is far richer than for any other Fatimid caliph. Even so it provides textual examples solely from the first couple of years of his reign. We have copies of one from the ʿĪd al-fiṭr in the year (334/946), given by him in place of his father who was gravely ill. Al-Qāʾim died less than two weeks later. Another, quite short—which may indicate that we lack the whole of the text—was delivered on Friday the 14th of Muḥarram (14 August 946) in Qayrawān, not by al-Manṣūr but by the chamberlain Jaʿfar al-Ḥāḡib. Rather than the standard *khuṭba*, it consists most importantly of an announcement of the remitting of taxes for the coming year, a measure intended to aid in the economic recovery after the revolt of the Khārijite Abū Yazīd and its attendant devastation. Two more examples come from the same year. Both were given while the imam was leading the army in the field in pursuit of the rebels. For the festival of the breaking of the fast, he preached at an ad hoc *muṣallā* laid out specifically for the occasion. By the feast of sacrifice (2 July) he was ready to assault the fortress of Kiyāna, the final refuge of Abū Yazīd. Again he delivered the *khuṭba* at an improvised *muṣallā*. With this ultimate victory he accepted at last the public proclamation of his imamate; only from then on did he use the regnal title al-Manṣūr. Beyond the four *khuṭbas* just mentioned, we have two more from the following year (336/948), both given in al-Mahdiyya, one for each of the ʿīd festivals. But that is all.

The lack of further examples does not indicate that al-Manṣūr ceased to deliver the *khuṭba* for the festivals but that he apparently no longer wrote down a copy of the text. Ustadh Jawdhar, the major domo of this period, almost a quasi-wazir to al-Manṣūr, reports that the caliph lent him copies of two *khuṭbas* to copy for himself.³⁷ They were two of those mentioned earlier. Significantly, moreover, we have no information to suggest that his *khuṭbas* from the last five

years of his reign were ever copied. Still there is a poignant account that describes him delivering his final *khuṭba* in the festival square of Qayrawān at a time when he was already quite ill.³⁸ That was the ʿĪd al-fiṭr of 341 (19 February 953); he was dead four weeks later.³⁹ His son and successor al-Muʿizz would later comment that, in this last *khuṭba*, his father had announced his own impending death.⁴⁰

The first, and only complete, example of a *khuṭba* to come from al-Muʿizz was the one delivered by the new imam on the feast of sacrifice only weeks later. In it the caliph both announces the loss of his father and laments being separated from him. For the next two decades, he gave many more *khuṭbas*, but, aside from a relatively short passage from one that has no date or indication of where or on what occasion it was delivered, we have copies of no more. In fact there are none for the subsequent century and a half, not until the time of al-Āmir, when the next examples appear. Nevertheless, there are several reports of al-Muʿizz giving the *khuṭba*. Qāḍī al-Nuʿmān says in his *al-Majālis waʾl-musāyārāt*, that al-Muʿizz gave the *khuṭba* but he provides neither text nor details.⁴¹ On another occasion al-Muʿizz preached to the troops who were about to leave for the *jihād* (in this case the conquest of Sijilmāsa); this *khuṭba* was, al-Nuʿmān reports, lengthy and he managed to preserve a part of it. What he saved is now available in this book.⁴²

The first Fatimid *khuṭba* in Egypt

We have more information about the *khuṭbas* that were given in Egypt commencing with the Fatimid conquest. Ibn Taghrī Birdī says that, immediately after seizing control, Jawhar cut the *khuṭba* for the Abbasids and prohibited the wearing of black, replacing it with white. He commanded that the *khuṭba* have added to it: 'O God, bless Muḥammad, the chosen, 'Alī, the approved, and Fāṭima, the chaste, and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two grandsons of the Messenger, from whom God has removed impurity and purged them of all sin. Bless the pure imams, the forefathers of the Commander of the Believers, al-Mu'izz li-Dīn Allāh.'⁴³ The equivalent text given by al-Maqrīzī has the word 'rightly guided' (*al-rāshidīn*) in place of 'pure' (*al-ṭāhirīn*) and adds after the name of the caliph: 'the rightly guided guides', (*al-hādīn al-mahdīyīn*). Another account relates a portion of the first *khuṭba* delivered in Fuṣṭāṭ with Jawhar and his troops present: 'When it was Friday with ten days left in Sha'bān, Jawhar went down with the army to the Old Mosque [in Fuṣṭāṭ] for Friday prayers. Hibat Allāh b. Aḥmad, the deputy of 'Abd al-Samī' b. 'Umar al-'Abbāsī [i.e. the *khaṭīb* of that mosque], gave the *khuṭba* wearing white.'⁴⁴ When he reached the

O God, bless Your servant and Your deputy, the fruit of prophecy, scion of the rightly guided guiding family, the servant of God, the Imam Ma'add Abū Tamīm al-Mu'izz li-Dīn Allāh, Commander of the Believers, just as You blessed his pure forefathers and his predecessors, the rightly guided imams.

O God, raise high his rank and advance his word, make his proofs clear, bring the community together in obedience to him and their hearts loving friends of his, make guidance follow his sanction, have him inherit the eastern parts of the land and its west, have him be master of the beginning of things and their outcomes, for truly You speak and Your word is the truth. 'We had written in the Psalms after the remembrance that the servants of righteousness shall inherit the earth' [21: 105].

Your religion has been subject to vexation. When that which is sacred to You was defiled, *jihād* on Your behalf extinguished, pilgrimage to Your house and visitation of the tomb of Your messenger ... disrupted, he made his preparations for the *jihād*, got ready everything necessary and sent the armies to support You. He expended funds in adherence to You, taking pains to please You, to curb those who are foolish and restrain those who are arrogant, to cause the truth to appear and the false to come to nothing. So, O God, support the armies that he has sent and the detachments that he charge with fighting the polytheists, contending with the heretics, defending the Muslims, building up of the border territories and the holy places, eradicating injustice, suspicions and greed, and spreading justice throughout the nations.

O God, make his banners stand high and prominent, his armies dominant and victorious; plant righteousness through him and by his hand; and grant us through him supreme protections.⁴⁵

The difference between this more complex benediction and the shorter one ordered by Jawhar about the same time probably reflects his direct involvement on the occasion. Accordingly, whereas there was to be included the briefer phrases in all *khuṭbas* everywhere in the newly conquered territories, the longer version applied to a specific event and depended on having a written text for the *khaṭīb* to read. The source suggests, in any case, that the preacher delivered his regular *khuṭba* for the first of the two and referred to the written text only for the second. What has come down to us is the latter portion only.

Al-Mu'izz himself did not arrive in Egypt until four years after the proclamations of these new *khuṭbas* in his favour. But, when he did, the record of his activities became ever more detailed, in part because the Egyptian historian Ibn Zūlāq, a contemporary, began to compile an account of what transpired between the caliph's arrival and his death, day by day. Al-Maqrīzī found and used a copy of that work written in its author's own hand.

On his way to Cairo al-Mu'izz first encountered a delegation of Egyptian notables in Alexandria where they had come to greet him. To them he gave a lengthy speech—a kind of *khuṭba*—in which he explained why he had come. From what he said on that occasion we have no more than a few notes.⁴⁶ As he approached the capital coming up the western side of the Nile, another group of greeters met him at Muḥallat Ḥaṣṣ. There, before al-Mu'izz, this same Ibn Zūlāq, who is our major source for the period, gave a short *khuṭba* of welcome, the text of which survives in al-Maqrīzī's biographical entry for Ibn Zūlāq in the biographical dictionary, *al-Muqaffā*.⁴⁷ It has obviously been taken from Ibn Zūlāq's own account of the event. In his speech, Ibn Zūlāq attested, most importantly, to his personal acceptance of the Fatimid descent of al-Mu'izz.⁴⁸

Thanks to Ibn Zūlāq, from then onward we have a complete record of, at least, the occasions of al-Mu'izz's *khuṭbas* (though not

the text of any of them). He reports that the caliph led prayers and gave the *khuṭba* for each of the festivals for the years 362, 363 and 364. He died before the feast in 365. An account as complete as we have in this case indicates a practice that in all likelihood applies as well to the rest of his reign and that of his father, perhaps also his successors at least through al-Ḥākim. The *khuṭba* by the imam himself was a regular feature of the festival. The first of those in Egypt provides additional details about the event:

On the day of fast-breaking [in 362], al-Mu'izz rode in procession to the *muṣallā* of Cairo that Jawhar had constructed for the 'īd prayer. ... al-Mu'izz approached in full attire⁴⁹ with his banners and coverings. He prayed with the people the prayer of the 'īd at full length and completely, reciting for the first, after the Sūrat al-Fātiḥa, 'Has the story of the overwhelming event reached you' [88: 1].⁵⁰ Following the recitation, he pronounced the *takbīr*, bowed for a long time, and prostrated at length. Ibn Zūlāq said here: 'I uttered the *tasbīḥ* after him thirty times for each bow and each prostration. Qāḍī al-Nu'mān relayed the *takbīr* from him. In the second he recited, after the Fātiḥa, the Sūrat al-Ḍuḥā [no. 93] and said the *takbīr* following the recitation. This was the prayer of his grandfather 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib. He held the bowed position and the prostration in the second also at length. ... When he had completed the prayer he mounted the *minbar* greeting the people on the right and the left. Next he unfurled the two banners that were on the *minbar* and he delivered the *khuṭba* with them to the front of him. On the highest step of the *minbar*, there was a heavy brocaded cushion for him to sit on between the two *khuṭbas*. He began the sermon with 'In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.' With him on the *minbar* were Jawhar, 'Ammār b. Ja'far, and Shafī', the bearer of the royal parasol. Then he commenced with 'God is great, God is great,'

opening with this. He preached so eloquently the people cried. His *khuṭba* was humble and submissive.

When he had completed the *khuṭba*, he departed with his troops, followed by his four sons wearing armour and helmets riding on horses in the finest attire. Two elephants preceded him. Upon reaching the palace he invited the people to enter and eat, urging them toward the food. He rebuked those who arrived late and issued a threat to those about whom he heard that they were fasting through the feast.⁵¹

Later that year he rode again with his troops to the *muṣallā* for the feast of sacrifice. The prayer and the circumstances of that occasion were more or less the same.⁵² Those of the following two years (363 and 364) were likewise; by then the details of al-Mu'izz's practice on the 'īd had become routine and customary as so noted in our sources.⁵³ But finally early in 365, we find the following report:

'Abd al-Samī' b. 'Umar al-'Abbāsī, the *khaṭīb* of the mosque of Fustāṭ, led the prayer from the *minbar* on Friday for al-Mu'izz. He said in his prayer the following: 'O God, bless Your servant and Your deputy, the fruit of prophecy, the source of excellence and the imamate, the servant of God, Ma'add Abū Tamīm, the Imam al-Mu'izz li-Dīn Allāh, just as You blessed his pure forefathers and his predecessors, those chosen before him. O God, assist him in that which You have appointed him to do, fulfil for him what You promised him, and make him master of the eastern parts of the earth and its west. Support him, O God, and assure his triumph through the amir Nizār Abi'l-Manṣūr, the heir apparent, the son of the Commander of the Believers, whom You have appointed to uphold his *da'wa* and speak his proof. O God, benefit through him the servants and put the land into good order before him, and fulfil for him

through him Your promise to him for 'truly You never disappoint in promises made' [3: 193].⁵⁴

This *khuṭba* prayer, uttered as the caliph lay on his deathbed, announced the coming succession of his son Nizār, who would take the regnal name al-ʿAzīz. Al-Muʿizz died later that very day.⁵⁵

***Khuṭbas* by al-ʿAzīz, al-Ḥākim, and al-Zāhir**

Fatimid practice in that era held that the death of the reigning caliph be kept secret until the transition of his successor was firm and secure. In keeping with this policy al-ʿAzīz did not announce publicly what had happened until, in what had also become customary, the next feast of sacrifice.⁵⁶ On that occasion he gave the *khuṭba* naming himself as imam-caliph in it and expressing his own sorrow over the loss of his father.⁵⁷ The 15th-century Ṭayyibī historian, Idrīs ʿImād al-Dīn, the author of a history of the Fatimid imams, provides a few details about what was said and, more importantly, quotes eleven lines from a long poem in praise of al-ʿAzīz composed by his eldest brother Tamīm in response to the moment of this announcement.⁵⁸

More evidence about the *khuṭba* in this period comes also from Idrīs. In the year 368, shortly after the elevation of Yaʿqūb Ibn Killis to the rank of wazīr, al-ʿAzīz, on the feast of fast-breaking, extolled him. Again Idrīs quotes lines of a poem for the occasion by Tamīm.⁵⁹ During that same year al-ʿAzīz also gave a *khuṭba* to the troops he was sending for the *jihād* against the Byzantines.⁶⁰ For the following ʿĪd al-fiṭr (369?)

he preached the sermon to the troops assembled, having just returned with booty and captives from a victorious campaign in Syria, a moment and image again made the subject of Tamīm's verse.⁶¹

Our next reports come from the year 380,⁶² more than ten years later. The record from then until the end of the reign is, however, complete with respect to the caliph's participation in the festivals. The years 370 to 379 were likely the same. Al-ʿAzīz was famously fond of public events and the processions attendant on them in which he would ride out from the palace. Perhaps that love of pomp and ceremony provided the motivation for a new addition to the occasions for caliphal *khuṭbas*. According to later authorities, al-ʿAzīz was the first to deliver the sermon for the Friday service in Ramaḍān, a practice adopted by the Fatimids from then on.⁶³ Once this custom became settled, a caliph would typically ride to a different mosque each successive Friday and there deliver the *khuṭba* and lead prayers. But the rule limited riding for some reason on more than three Fridays, the fourth being reserved as a day of rest.⁶⁴ For the year 380, which may have been approximately when this innovation began, al-ʿAzīz gave the *khuṭba* on the second Friday of Ramaḍān and the next.⁶⁵ In the latter case he did so in the new mosque he had begun to erect just outside the Bāb al-Futūḥ, one of the two northern gates of Cairo.⁶⁶ That same mosque would later go by the name of al-Ḥākim,

who finished it. For the feast of fast-breaking, the service took place at the *muṣallā* outside the Bāb al-Naṣr, the other northern gate. *Maṣṭabas*, raised benches, were built outside of homes and buildings along the route between it and the palace on which the *mu'adhdhins* and scholars could sit and observe the procession of the imam to the *muṣallā*. When the *takbīr* sounded at the festival square, the students and the faithful whom the qadi had ordered to join the others on the *maṣṭabas*, relayed it all the way back to the palace.⁶⁷

For the following two years, we know al-ʿAzīz delivered the *khuṭba* in at least two mosques during Ramaḍān, the second in the Mosque of Cairo (later called al-Azhar). As had become his practice, al-ʿAzīz also gave the *khuṭbas* of the two festivals, as he did in 382, the year following.⁶⁸ This pattern continued in 383 and in 384 with the addition of the presence with him during Ramaḍān of his young son Manṣūr (the future al-Ḥākim).⁶⁹ By the end of Ramaḍān of 385, the court had moved out of Cairo to a staging area at Minā Jaʿfar devoted to the preparation of a grand army on its way to fight in Syria. On the ʿīd, in place of the caliph, the *khuṭba* was presented by his son, then less than ten years old. He observed his father's customary practice for the occasion and dressed as he would have.⁷⁰ Al-ʿAzīz, however, gave the *khuṭba* on the feast of sacrifice.⁷¹ It was his last; he died in 386 at the very end of Ramaḍān still at the armies' encampment.

On the spot al-Ḥākim was proclaimed the new caliph. A great assembly of those at the camp immediately returned to Cairo for the funeral. On the morning of the feast, the chief qadi, Muḥammad b. al-Nuʿmān, led prayers and mounted the *minbar* to deliver the *khuṭba*, pausing in doing so to kiss the place where al-ʿAzīz would have sat. He wept and cried; a loud lamentation then arose from the people present. The qadi gave the *khuṭba* weeping in mourning for the deceased imam, but also in the same sermon announcing the new *daʿwa* for al-Ḥākim.⁷²

But another account reports that, because of the noise of people crying, the audience could not hear most of what he said.⁷³

A little more than two months later, in that same year, al-Ḥākim himself, who though quite young had already given the *khuṭba* at least once before, rode to the *muṣallā* for the feast of sacrifice. He mounted the *minbar* for the *khuṭba* on that occasion along with the chief qadi, Barjawān, his tutor, Ibn ‘Ammār, the regent, and others.⁷⁴

In general, however, the record for the reign of al-Ḥākim is spotty and uncertain. One account from the year 395 says that in it:

The Mosque of Rāshida was fitted out and the caliph rode to it on the feast of fast-breaking, wearing a plain yellow robe with an indeterminate turban on his head, which had been wrapped on his head with a hanging tail and with a jewel between his eyes.⁷⁵ In front of him in the procession were six horses bearing saddles studded with jewels, six elephants and five giraffes. He prayed with the people the ‘*id*’ prayer and preached to them. In his *khuṭba* he cursed his enemy oppressor as was his due and those who would spread false rumours about him. The commander of the armies and the chief judge climbed the *minbar* with him.⁷⁶

This report is important less for what it says about the giving of the *khuṭba* than for the details it provides concerning the procession. Obviously the ceremony on these occasions needed to be as elaborate as possible. The number and type of animals was one key element. From only a few years before, an account of the Zīrid ruler’s procession to the *muṣallā* in 387 describes him as wearing the finest attire and being preceded by an elephant, two giraffes and ‘a gleaming white camel the like of which had never been seen before.’⁷⁷ There are also descriptions of family members and other notables who walked behind the caliph and in what order.

But the later record for al-Ḥākim is not consistent. For example, in the year 401, on the feast of sacrifice, the chief qadi led the prayer and gave the *khuṭba*. The caliph did not ride or offer the sacrifice.⁷⁸ In Ramaḍān of 403, however, he led prayers once in the Rāshida mosque, another time in the mosque beyond the Bāb al-Futūḥ and yet another in the Old Mosque in Fustāṭ. At the 'Īd al-fiṭr he rode without the usual accoutrements. The ten horses led in front of him had saddles and bridles adorned with only small amounts of white silver. The parasol was white and without any gold. His robe was also white and without decoration and there was neither gold nor jewels in his turban. The *minbar* was not furnished.⁷⁹ On the feast of sacrifice he kept to the same relatively austere pattern.⁸⁰ His cousin 'Abd al-Raḥīm b. Ilyās performed the sacrifice in his place. The report for this event, as for several other 'īds about his time, does not mention the *khuṭba* or who gave it.

The following year al-Ḥākim announced that this same 'Abd al-Raḥīm, his cousin, had been made the heir-apparent and would therefore be his successor. He commanded that the invocation of the prayer should name 'Abd al-Raḥīm after himself. 'Respond [O God] in regard to me in the matter of the son of my uncle and the holder of my covenant and the covenant of the Muslims and the caliph after me as You responded in regard to Moses concerning his brother Aaron.' On the feast this man mounted the *minbar* with al-Ḥākim and sat on his right.⁸¹ That same year al-Ḥākim began to ride more and more often. In Ramaḍān he visited all four of the mosques: the one in Cairo, the one outside the north gate, the mosque of 'Amr in Fustāṭ and the Rāshida. He himself pronounced the *khuṭba* from the *minbar* in favour of 'Abd al-Raḥīm with the words quoted above.⁸² About this time he issued an order to stop the practice of kissing the ground in front of him, praying in his name even in the *khuṭba* and that instead the salutation should name simply the 'Commander of the Believers' (*amīr al-mu'minīn*).⁸³

In 405, during Ramaḍān, the heir-apparent ‘Abd al-Raḥīm rode for prayers on the first Friday in a procession fit for the caliph to al-Anwār, the new mosque outside of the northern gate, and then on subsequent Fridays first to the mosque of Cairo and then twice more to the new mosque.⁸⁴

At the very end of the reign in 411/1021, just as the transition to al-Ḥākim’s son and actual successor al-Ẓāhir was about to take place, an amir was charged with the responsibility of having the oath of allegiance said for the new caliph on the feast of sacrifice. At the *muṣallā*, however, the *khuṭba* was given by the chief qadi in the name of al-Ḥākim. Not three hours later on the same day, following the return of the qadi from the festival square, the oath was taken for al-Ẓāhir. Our source, Ibn al-Ṣayrafī, the head of the Fatimid chancery at a much later time, claims that nothing like this had ever occurred before.⁸⁵ He does not say why but evidently, since there had been no announcement of al-Ḥākim’s death, the proclamation of al-Ẓāhir’s succession so abruptly seemed quite unusual.

The testimony of al-Musabbiḥī

The amir al-Musabbiḥī, who held a high rank at the court, observed most of these events. Over much of the reign of al-Ḥākim and at least part of that of al-Ẓāhir, he compiled, apparently on an almost daily basis, a record—a history—of what he saw and what he heard during those years, including news arriving from abroad. His account grew to massive length, some 26,000 pages by one estimate. Of all that, however, we possess only one portion that covers part of the years 414 and 415. Other sections of the whole evidently were available to later medieval historians to judge by their quotations from it, but al-Musabbiḥī’s account of these two years is unique in its completeness, and in the wealth of specific detail it provides of what took place. Accordingly, his description of al-Ẓāhir riding for prayers on the Fridays of Ramaḍān in 415 and for the two ‘īd festivals is invaluable.

Moreover, he proudly noted that, in these very processions, 'as was my custom, I walked in the company of all the notables in the presence of the imam both as he rode out and as he came back'.⁸⁶

So important are these eye-witness passages that what follows is a full translation of them:

[The first Friday of Ramaḍān]

On Friday two nights into the month of Ramaḍān, our master (*mawlānā*), may the blessings of God be upon him, rode for Friday prayer in the Anwār Mosque.⁸⁷ He was accompanied by all of his servants, as well as the elite notables of his government. He wore a fine linen shawl that was wrapped around him. On his head was a white turban embroidered with gold thread. On him was a white *dabīqī* linen robe and over him a *dabīqī* linen parasol, also embroidered with gold. That was for the procession going. When he came back, over his head, there was a white *dabīqī* linen parasol *mukhawwama* threaded with gold. The chief qadi Aḥmad b. Muḥammad b. Abī'l-ʿAwwām mounted the *minbar* with him as did Ibrāhīm, the companion and tutor, known as al-Jalīs (the boon-companion). These two lowered the curtains around the dome that was above the *minbar* and which was itself covered in plain white. Ambergris evaporated in front of him in jewelled silver and gold censers. He delivered the *khuṭba* for himself. It was a beautiful *khuṭba*, most complete and perfect. Then he offered a prayer for his forefathers, and for himself and all his servants and the prominent men of his government. The chief qadi and Ibrāhīm the tutor next raised the curtains of the dome that was above the *minbar* and the two descended before him. He, on whom be peace, then descended and prayed with the people a most complete and beautiful prayer. He departed for his palace safely, thanks to God. As was my custom, I walked along with the company of all the notables in the presence of the imam, both as he rode out and as he came back.⁸⁸

[The second Friday]

On Friday the 16th of the month of Ramaḍān, our master, may the blessings of God be upon him, prayed in the Anwār Mosque outside of the Bāb al-Futūḥ. He, peace be upon him, rode wearing a white cloak hemmed with brocade and a white robe of *dabīqī* linen, an undorned white gown and a white turban with gold thread. In his hand he carried the jewelled staff and over his head was the parasol circled with red. That was for his procession out, and for his return a parasol circled with gold thread. He mounted the *minbar* and gave the *khuṭba*, a beautiful *khuṭba*, most eloquent. He prayed a complete prayer, most completely and returned to his palace with all of the servants and prominent men of the government. I walked in his presence until he went in through the Gate of Gold safely, thanks to God. That was the second Friday in which he led prayers in this Ramaḍān.⁸⁹

[The festival of breaking the fast]

Saturday was the ʿĪd al-fiṭr and our master, may the blessings of God be upon him, rode in procession with his troops and the prominent men of the government. In front of him there was the one elephant that remained of the elephants and the giraffes, golden banners brocaded with silver, drums, and other things. Various types of unmounted horses were paraded in front of him bearing saddles studded with jewels and heavy amber, along with all of the commanders of the Turks and the servants under commission in arms and others. He wore a wax-coloured silk robe and a wax-coloured turban embroidered with gold thread. In his hand was the staff and he was girded with a sword and he carried the lance as was usually done. Over his head there was the parasol heavily ornamented with gold carried by the Slav Muẓaffar as was customary. He proceeded in the finest of attire, a most perfect appearance and the most beautiful equipment. With him were his black eunuch servants wearing types of gilded, heavy adornments, fashions of great value. I walked in his presence to the *muṣallā* from the time before reaching its gate until he entered. He prayed a quite beautiful prayer, quite complete and perfect, and next delivered a most eloquent *khuṭba*. When he, peace be upon him, went up the *minbar*, he summoned the chief

qadi, who also went up. This man was ill as result of a sting he had received. Next he summoned Ibrāhīm, the boon-companion and tutor, and he climbed the *minbar*. Then he summoned Shams al-Dīn Abū'l-Faṭḥ Mas'ūd b. Ṭāhir al-Wazzān and he went up as well. He summoned Tāj al-Dawla Ibn Abī Ḥusayn, who was formerly the ruler of Sicily, but he was not present. He summoned 'Alī b. Mas'ūd b. Abī'l-Ḥusayn Zayn al-Mulk and he went up. Then he summoned 'Alī b. al-Faḍl and after him 'Abdallāh b. al-Ḥājib, so he went up as well. At that point he was covered with the two banners that were attached to the *minbar*. He, peace be upon him, gave the *khuṭba*, a most beautiful *khuṭba*, quite complete and eloquent. The banners were then opened and those on the *minbar* descended. Finally he descended. There was on him a trace of weariness. Then he rode and returned to his palace safely, thanks to God.⁹⁰

[The festival of the sacrifice]

The 'Īd al-naḥr was Thursday the 10th of Dhu'l-Ḥijja. On it our master, may the blessings of God be upon him, rode in procession to the outskirts of the *muṣallā* by way of the Bāb al-Futūḥ with his servants, his troops, his eunuchs, and the prominent men of his government. In front of him were handsome unmounted horses, golden banners brocaded in silver, two flags, the giraffes, and the one elephant remaining of the elephants. With him were his Turkish servants in heavily adorned robes and fine arms, and his servants who had received commissions as officers in the finest of attire, most splendid and perfect. He reached the festival square after observing the other customs which had each lieutenant remain at his abode and district, and that the prayer of the troops take place with all of them gathered together with their commanders in their own district. They did that. Behind him were the Kutāma friends [i.e. Ismailis] and the notables of the government. He was girded with a golden sword and the lance was borne by Ibn Banūṭ whose duty was to carry it behind him. In his hand was the jewelled staff, until he arrived at the *muṣallā*. On his forehead was a jewel and over his head the red parasol heavily adorned with gold being carried by the Slav Muẓaffar Bahā' al-Dawla. The notables dismounted in front of him as was their custom. He prayed a beautiful prayer, quite completely

and perfectly. He climbed the *minbar* and gave an eloquent *khuṭba* that was most beautiful. He summoned up the *minbar* the chief *dāʿī* Qāsim b. ʿAbd al-ʿAzīz b. al-Nuʿmān and handed over to him the roster of the names of those who, according to protocol, climbed the *minbar*. He summoned the chief *dāʿī* Shams al-Mulk but he was not present. He summoned Muẓaffar the Slav, then ʿAlī b. Masʿūd and Ḥasan b. Rajāʾ b. Abīʾl-Ḥasan. Next ʿAlī b. Faḍl. Prior to the group just mentioned, he called for the boon-companion Ibrāhīm, the tutor and goldsmith. Then he summoned at the end, ʿAbdallāh b. al-Ḥājib and the son of his uncle. All of them mounted the *minbar* in accord with protocol. They covered our master, may the blessings of God be upon him, with the two banners until he had completed the *khuṭba*. Then he descended from the *minbar* to the place for the sacrifice at the *muṣallā*. He sacrificed a female camel and returned with his troops and regiments. In going out and returning he wore a white *sharb* linen turban, a cloak hemmed with gold thread, and a plain white robe until he arrived at his palace. The people walked with him as was their custom and he entered in complete security, thanks to God.⁹¹

Al-Musabbiḥī was not an Ismaili but rather Sunni.⁹² Nevertheless his depiction of the caliph and his role in these ceremonies and in giving the *khuṭba* on each of these occasions is deferential, revealing this amir's respect for both the imam and the institution he represented. We should assume that the others who participated did likewise. The chief qadi, who is mentioned by name in the first report, was Ḥanafī and thus also Sunni, and yet he performed a key function: climbing the *minbar*, lowering the curtains around the caliph as he delivered the *khuṭba*, and then raising them after he finished. Although we possess additional descriptions of processions for the *khuṭba*, none from this period are quite as detailed. Here, moreover, are accounts covering four events in succession from one and the same year. It is unclear whether the caliph offered the *khuṭba* on yet another of the Fridays (a third Friday) of this particular Ramaḍān, as had apparently become the custom in the reign of his two predecessors and perhaps

in his as well. Otherwise it is quite valid to consider the pattern we observe in this case as applying more or less to the practice of his forefathers and possibly to his immediate successors with some exceptions to the end of the dynasty. Small changes may have occurred over time, especially in the later period, but general custom prevailed. Al-Musabbiḥī's account is thus a capital source for the ceremonies surrounding the *khuṭbas* of the imams, even though it offers us no text of what they said in it.⁹³

The *khuṭba* from al-Mustanṣir to al-Āmir

The lack of sources becomes even more important in trying to assess the subsequent period. For the next hundred years, from 415 until almost 515, when al-Afḍal b. Badr al-Jamālī, the wazīr under al-Āmir, was assassinated, there is little information, and none of it from the chronicles. Even so, evidence of the caliph's riding to perform the prayer on both 'īd festivals exists in a collection of decrees and letters (*sijillāt*) issued by al-Mustanṣir and sent to the Yaman.⁹⁴ In them the caliph in his own name describes his riding to the *muṣallā* for the festivals. The late Mamluk specialist in chancery practice, al-Qalqashandī, quotes here from a 5th/11th century Fatimid manual of chancery

practice, the *Mawādd al-bayān*, a reason why such letters were necessary. Public observance of the festivals of Islam were both essential and yet also fraught with danger. In a state that governed a wide variety of religious groups and factions, the opportunity for rebellion and discord was always present. Those who wanted to cause trouble might see the festival as an opportunity for it. Thus news conveyed by these letters both announced the successful completion of a given ceremony and also the safe arrival of the imam back inside his palace.⁹⁵

With this information we have thus no reason to conclude that the subsequent caliphs ceased giving the *khuṭba* at least on the two *ʿids*. Still, it would be nice to have more direct evidence in the cases of al-Mustaʿīr (r. 427/1036 to 487/1094) and al-Mustaʿlī (r. 487/1094 to 495/1101), and a clearer picture of the practice of al-Āmir in the period prior to the death of al-Afḍal. The flow of information from these years in our medieval histories steadily dries up, leading to the era of the wazīr Badr al-Jamālī (466/1074 to 487/1094) when it all but disappears. The documentation for the wazirate of his son is hardly better. Nor is there much if any relevant information about the crisis caused by the split between the supporters of al-Mustaʿlī and Nizār and how that might have affected the delivery of the *khuṭba* either at the time of the schism or later. Nothing comparable to the writings of al-Musabbiḥī exists until the beginning of the wazirate of al-Maʾmūn who succeeded al-Afḍal in that position upon the latter's death.

Quite abruptly the historical record for the next years becomes nearly as complete as it was once a century before. For the years of al-Maʾmūn's wazirate, from 515 to 518 (he was arrested in Ramaḍān of 519/1125 and confined in prison until his execution in 522/1128), we again have a considerably detailed account of the ceremonies that accompany the occasions of the caliphal *khuṭbas*. These reports for the most part come from a history composed by this same wazīr's son, Ibn al-Maʾmūn al-Baṭāʾihī, which, though it itself is no longer extant, was a major source for several other chroniclers, among them al-Maqrīzī and Ibn Taghrī Birdī who quote it for these years. The son may thus offer an eyewitness account, his own perhaps, or, at the least, he had direct access to persons who were there.

Information from this source, however, says little about the *khuṭba* before al-Ma'mūn took over, except in suggesting a change in practice precisely to alter a policy instituted under al-Afḍal. Al-Ma'mūn evidently also convinced al-Āmir to let someone besides himself deliver the *khuṭbas* on the Fridays in Ramaḍān, although he continued to do those of the two 'īd festivals. The much later Ṭayyibī *dā'ī* and historian Idrīs 'Imād al-Dīn found, among the possessions of the Ṣulayḥid queen al-Ḥurra, copies of two *khuṭbas* given by al-Āmir. Both had been transcribed on silk and sent to her from Cairo. One of the two is from a Ramaḍān Friday service; the other from the 'īd al-fiṭr. In the first the caliph invokes God's blessing on 'the Illustrious Excellency al-Afḍal, the son of the Lord Commander of the Armies', i.e. al-Afḍal Ibn Amīr al-Juyūsh, the wazīr at the time of this *khuṭba*. That text thus provides evidence of the *khuṭba* before 415, though how much before is impossible to say. The other *khuṭba* has no indication of a date but it would be reasonable to assume that the two come from the same period.

Al-Afḍal fell to assassins at the very end of Ramaḍān in the midst of preparing for the feast. Al-Āmir had thus to observe both the ceremonies of mourning for the deceased wazīr and the 'īd at the same time. For the latter he broke his fast in the palace in the midst of sadness. We have an account of the details of breaking the fast and the mourning at the palace.⁹⁶ In regard to the 'īd prayer and the *khuṭba*, the same source reports that at one point the commander al-Ma'mūn took 'the hand of the *dā'ī* and brought him close to the caliph. Al-Āmir then handed him the text of the *khuṭba*, which had been on his left wrapped in a kerchief of white *sharb* linen with gold thread. The *dā'ī* kissed it, put it to his forehead and then clutched it to his breast. The commander went over to the chamberlain Ḥusām al-Mulk and asked him to gather all of the amirs and proceed with them to the *muṣallā* of Cairo to perform the prayer. They wended their way there wearing the attire for mourning; the *mu'adhdhins* were in front of them. The *dā'ī* led prayers and then mounted the *minbar*, stopping on the third step. There he gave the *khuṭba*. That *khuṭba* expounded a prayer for al-Afḍal and a request for the mercy

of God to be upon him.⁹⁷ But the caliph, who remained back in the palace, did not attend.

During these years the head of the Fatimid chancery was Ibn al-Ṣayrafī. In this man's history of the wazirate, we have some evidence about the *khuṭba* after that event. He reports that in the year 515,⁹⁸ on the 2nd of the month of Dhu'l-Ḥijja, the caliph al-Āmir bestowed special honours on his new wazir and then issued a copy of the exact words to be used in offering a prayer for him (i.e. as in the *khuṭba*):

O God, support the one the Commander of the Believers has chosen for his government, has approved of him and selected him to manage the affairs of his kingdom and picked him and entrusted matters to him. He has administered them with the finest of governance, always watchful, with diligence and firm energy. He has rendered satisfactory matters of importance and met all requirements in that regard with keen discernment, independence, and resolve, freeing himself for that which is beneficial with an acuity that matches in sharpness his keenness. The auspicious star rises higher because of him and its resplendence is more sublime. Radiating him is the illustrious and reliable, Crown of the caliphate, Strength of Islam, Pride of mankind, the Good order of religion and loyalty to the Commander of the Believers,⁹⁹ Abū 'Abdallāh Muḥammad al-Āmirī, may God assist him in providing good service to the Muslims, and keep him upright in service to the Commander of the Believers and prolong for him greatness, abundance, and strength. O God, make him the star of his good fortune, eternal, supreme, and of great height. Conquer for the dynasty by his hand the west and the east. May his opinions and resolutions be connected to success. In slaughtering the enemies of religion, have the points of his lances and sharp edges of his swords accomplish their purpose.¹⁰⁰

Early in his wazirate, according to one report, al-Ma'mūn, who had noted some carelessness in al-Āmir's climbing the *minbar* and giving the *khuṭba*, was nevertheless embarrassed to speak about it to

the caliph in person. He hoped to make the caliph realize it without having to confront him. So he said to him: 'O our master, some days have passed from the month and it is time to ride for the first Friday.' Here our source, Ibn Taghrī Birdī, interjects: 'The arrangement for the Fatimid caliph to ride in procession for the Friday prayer and to pray with the people on three Fridays was discussed previously in the biography of al-Mu'izz li-Dīn Allāh [in this book].¹⁰¹ For the final Friday of every month the *khaṭīb* prayed with the people. They referred to that Friday as the Friday of rest (*al-rāḥa*), meaning that the caliph rested in it.'¹⁰² In the corresponding passage of Ibn 'Abd al-Zāhir, it is clear here that the wazir refers to the first Friday, not the last. That is the day he proposes for the caliph to observe the *khaṭīb*. Ibn Taghrī Birdī then resumes his account:

...the wazir suggested to the caliph that, without attendants, he go to the mosque on the last Friday and sit in the dome over the *miḥrab* opposite the *khaṭīb* in order to observe how the man who was deputized to take his place gave the *khuṭba*. That man was a *sharīf* and was quite skilled with the Arabic language, having memorized the Qur'an. Al-Āmir agreed to the plan. Once he was in the mosque, he took up a seat in the domed area with the skylight opened. The *khaṭīb* stood up and gave the *khuṭba*. In the midst of the prayer for the Prophet in the second *khuṭba*, a whiff of air opened the drapes and the *khaṭīb* raised his head and found himself face to face with the caliph. He recognized him and began to tremble in alarm. He did not know what to say until inspired to speak: 'O assembled Muslims, may God benefit you and me by what you hear and keep you from error. God says in His precious book: "We had previously accepted the covenant

of Adam but he forgot and We found that he had no consistence" [20: 115]. "God commands justice and the doing of good..." [16: 90] (to the rest of this verse). He descended and prayed with the people. When he had left that session, al-Āmir spoke with his wazir about what had happened to the *khaṭīb*. That opened the subject for the wazir and he mentioned what had concerned him. Thereafter al-Āmir refrained from giving the *khuṭba* and delegated it instead to this wazir. The wazir then went thereafter to give the *khuṭba* in the mosques of Cairo, Ibn Ṭulūn, and Fuṣṭāṭ.¹⁰³

Here Ibn Taghrī Birdī switches to another source, a history by Ibn Abī'l-Manṣūr(?), who implies that al-Ma'mūn began giving these Friday *khuṭbas* thereafter despite al-Āmir's express desire to ride for such purposes even more so than his forefathers. The caliph continued to deliver the 'īd *khuṭbas*, leaving only those of the Fridays in Ramaḍān to his wazir.¹⁰⁴

When he rode to the *muṣallā* for the festival sermon, he was preceded there by his men with furnishings and implements. The *miḥrab* was swathed in golden *sharb* linen and three mats were laid out overlapping one another, on top of which was a fine mat, which was by them highly prized. It was a piece of a mat that they claimed had once belonged to Ja'far al-Ṣādiq. During the time of al-Ḥākim it had been taken along with other items from his house in Medina when it was opened by this caliph's order. The ground beneath the dome was furnished entirely with mats. The three doors beneath the dome in front of the *miḥrab* were shut. Curtains were hung from the *miḥrāb* and on both sides of the *minbar*. The latter's steps were covered as well. At the

top they placed a cushion for the caliph to sit on. Two banners were unfurled and attached. The supervisor of those preparations stood with the qadi at the bottom of the *minbar*. Incense was released. The wazir was responsible not to let anyone open any door except the door through which the caliph would come at which he stood. The *dā'ī* sat in the entryway with the *mu'adhdhins* reciting beside him. The princes, the *ashrāf* nobility, the witnesses, and notables entered but no one else unless given a pass by the *dā'ī*. If the prayer fell due, the caliph approached in the attire we described..., the sceptre of power in his hand. Immediately behind him were all of his brothers and uncles. The *mu'adhdhins* met him and those who had been around him of his uncles and brothers withdrew. He went out from the Gate of Power [of the palace] arriving at the 'īd Gate. The parasol was then extended over him and a procession formed calmly, no one advancing or falling out of his proper place. Behind the procession were the camel-borne litters, the giraffes, the elephants, and the lions on which were fetters adorned with steel claws. No one entered the gate of the *muṣallā* riding except the wazir. Then he went through the second gate and dismounted. He took control of the bit of the caliph's horse while the caliph dismounted and walked to the *mihrab* with the qadi and the *dā'ī* to the right and left of him relaying the *takbīr* to the group of *mu'adhdhins*. The Kātib al-Dast and a group of clerks were offering blessings beneath the supports of the *minbar*; no one but they were allowed to be with them. The *takbīr* was said seven times in the first and in the second five in accord with the practice of the nation. Next the wazir went up and handed over to the qadi the list of invitees. He summoned those who customarily mounted the *minbar*. No one overstepped his place. Then, following the *khuṭba*, the caliph descended and returned [to the palace] in the finest of form and attire. His going out and his return were by the gate opposite the festival courtyard and for that reason that place was called the courtyard of the 'īd Gate.¹⁰⁵

The description of this 'īd festival (and the Friday services) appears to come from the year 516 and from an account of it composed

by Ibn al-Ma'mūn, the wazīr's son. Because it contains extensive detail of the event, it later served as a prime example of Fatimid practice in regard to the caliph's riding to the *muṣallā* and back. What took place that year, however, may have represented a change from earlier practice. The year 516 was the first fully under the control of al-Ma'mūn. He is known to have agreed to allow the caliph much greater participation in public ceremonies, particularly of these two festivals. Al-Maqrīzī remarks that the caliph prayed with the people at the *muṣallā* beyond the Bāb al-Naṣr and gave the *khuṭba* in 516. 'That' he adds, 'had been discontinued in the days of Badr and al-Afḍal.'¹⁰⁶ Still it seems unlikely that al-Afḍal had eliminated the ceremony altogether. But the matter remains unclear. It could be that the role of the caliph was severely reduced by the old wazīr and then enhanced by al-Ma'mūn.¹⁰⁷

We have, in addition, a description of the festival of sacrifice from later that same year, again from Ibn al-Ma'mūn,¹⁰⁸ and, for the first time, a report covering in some detail the observance of the 'īd of Ghadīr Khumm, a commemoration of the moment when the Prophet publicly acknowledged 'Alī's special relationship as the one who would succeed himself as leader of the Muslim community.¹⁰⁹ On these festivals, sacrifices were performed like those of the feast of sacrifice and, according to Ibn al-Ma'mūn, on that day in 516, after the qadī Abu'l-Ḥajjāj Yūsuf b. Ayyūb led prayers, 'the *sharīf* Ibn Anas

al-Dawla rose and delivered the *khuṭba* of the 'īd festival'.¹¹⁰ Evidently the caliph did not take an active role in these proceedings.¹¹¹ At a later period, following the caliphate of al-Ḥāfiẓ, the festival of Ghadīr Khumm assumed special importance. It was then used to affirm the possible accession of a cousin, as had been the case both with 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib and with al-Ḥāfiẓ.¹¹² Even in its expanded format, however, the ceremonies of this feast were quite private among loyal Ismailis and confined to the palace grounds. Moreover, although it featured a *khuṭba*, that *khuṭba* was delivered by the *khaṭīb*, not the imam, even though he sat close by in the *subbāk*, the royal grilled loge, which separated him from the audience.¹¹³

For 517 we have a report that the caliph rode to the *muṣallā* and gave the *khuṭba* on the 'Īd al-fiṭr as usual.¹¹⁴ But, from the rest of his reign, there is little evidence. What policy he might have adopted once he rid himself of his wazīr could be of special interest, but we know nothing about it.

Khuṭbas from the reign of al-Ḥāfiẓ onward

The assassination of al-Āmir in 524 brought to power his cousin ‘Abd al-Majīd as regent and then in swift succession a coup by the son of al-Afḍal, Abū ‘Alī Aḥmad, who was known by the name Kutayfāt. Although this man’s control of the government lasted only until a counter-coup in the following year restored the former regent, who thereafter adopted the full trappings and titles of caliph with the regnal name al-Ḥāfiẓ, the brief interregnum of Kutayfāt was important in a number of ways. One later historian reported of it: ‘Aḥmad the son of al-Afḍal conducted his affairs nicely, especially in relationship to the days of al-Āmir. He returned to the people much of what had been extorted from them. He openly espoused the doctrine of the Twelver Imamis. He removed from the call to prayer the phrase “Come to the best of works”. He ordered that the prayer be made from the *minbar* [i.e. in the *khuṭba*] in his name using a formula of prayer that he devised himself. It ran as follows:

The Illustrious Excellency, King of the supporters of the state, Defender of the domain of religion, Spreader of the wing of justice over the Muslims, both those near and those far away, Supporter of the imam of truth both in his absence and when he is present, Brandisher of the sharpness of his sword in backing him, the pertinence of his opinions and his good management, Trustee of God to His servants, Guider of judges in following the road to truth and basing themselves on it, Director of the *dā’īs* of the believers through the clearness of his explanations and instructions, Master of favours, Remover of tyranny from the nations, Possessor of the two virtues of the sword and the pen, Abū ‘Alī Aḥmad, son of the Illustrious Lord al-Afḍal Shāhanshāh, Commander of the Armies (*amīr al-juyūsh*).¹¹⁵

The *khuṭba* for the regent was stopped. In its place Kutayfāt appears to have opted for a generic Shi‘i appeal to the imam in occultation and this change presumably implied the end of the Fatimid dynasty. But the period of his rule was so short it is hard to determine

exactly what he intended. Removing the phrase 'Come to the best of works' from the call to pray goes against all the Shi'a, not merely the Ismailis.

Soon enough the *khuṭba* returned to its Fatimid form, with, now, the specific citation in it of al-Ḥāfiẓ as imam-caliph. After the death of Kutayfāt and his own enthronement, al-Ḥāfiẓ ordered that the prayer be said in his name from the *minbars* according to the following formula:

O God, bless he through whom You reconstruct religion after enemies conspired to make it disappear. You empowered Islam by making him ascend over the nation and reappear. You made him a signpost for whoever brings about the truths by inner discernment, our master and our lord, the imam of our age and its time, 'Abd al-Majīd Abu'l-Maymūn, [bless] his pure forefathers, his noble sons, with a blessing that persists until the Day of Judgment.¹¹⁶

With the advent of al-Ḥāfiẓ, now no longer merely a regent, but—as these formulas in his *khuṭba* indicate—claiming the imamate in full and in his own name, the Fatimid dynasty began a new lease on life. Yet the cost to its base of support in many regions of the Islamic world had strained the institution severely. Nizari Ismailis had withdrawn three decades earlier when al-Afdāl refused to accept the succession of Nizār. A major section of the Ismaili *da'wa* in Yaman, and with it India, likewise declined to accept al-Ḥāfiẓ, maintaining instead that the imamate of al-Ṭayyib, the infant son of al-Āmir, had continued with him as an imam in hiding. A Ḥāfiẓī *da'wa*, however, would remain in charge of Egypt until the close of the dynasty. Accordingly, the *khuṭba* over the final period of Fatimid rule reveals both interesting changes and innovations and yet important evidence of how practices of an older culture persisted.

The innovations would include the following *khuṭba* that al-Ḥāfiẓ, under intense pressure from forces he could not control, permitted, as one part of his recognition of his son Ḥasan as heir apparent:

O God, construct by the continued existence of the holder of the covenant of the Muslims the foundations of his caliphate. Gird him with the swords of might in support of him and his capacity, make him a benefit for the betterment of his land and his people, make him a gathering for them and for the whole of the lords his brothers whom You have raised in the heavens of his kingdom like moons without which it would wane and be moonless. You tame with their fortitude every renegade among the partisans of dissent and hypocrisy. You strengthen through them the vigour of the imamate and retain the caliphate in their offspring until the Day of Judgment, through Your mercy, O most merciful of the merciful.¹¹⁷

Al-Ḥāfiẓ did not actually favour this son but, in permitting him to claim the title of heir-apparent, he was bowing to brute force used against him by this same Ḥasan. Later the caliph would also contrive the death of this offending son. Even so the *khutba* said in his favour is the one preserved example of how such a sermon might read.

At a later time this same caliph appointed as his wazir the Christian Bahrām. How a Christian could perform the tasks expected of the wazir was the subject of much debate. How could he climb the *minbar* with the imam on the *ʿid* festivals in order to cover him with the curtains that were to conceal him from the people while he delivered the *khutba*? It was a serious question and treated as such by members of the court. There were other problems as well. Al-Ḥāfiẓ decreed, however, that the wazir's role on the days of the festival would be performed by the chief qadi instead of the wazir.¹¹⁸ Nevertheless, soon enough the presence of a Christian wazir and the coincident influx into Egypt of great numbers of Christian Armenian soldiers—Bahrām was himself Armenian—produced a backlash among Muslims. The governor of the Gharbiyya province, Riḍwān b. Walakhshī, himself a Sunni, took up the cause of the Muslims in opposition. He mounted the *minbar* and delivered a stirring *khutba* urging those who heard him to begin a *jihād* against Bahrām and any who supported him.¹¹⁹ That was the year 531; Bahrām fell from power soon thereafter.

From the final thirty-six years of the Fatimids there is not much information about the *khutba*.¹²⁰ The exceptions are, first, two documents from the year 536, both copied by al-Maqrizī into his *Khiṭaṭ*.¹²¹ They are decrees or letters written in the name of the caliph for dispersal abroad. Each announces that in that year the caliph had ridden to the *muṣallā*, led prayers, and delivered the *khutba*, after which he returned safely and securely to the palace. One is for the ʿĪd al-fiṭr and the other for the ʿĪd al-naḥr. Both were composed by the head of the chancery, Ibn al-Ṣayrafī. It is odd that, from this period, we have these two, and both from the same year. Yet it is quite likely that that is merely an accident of survival. The practice of sending out such announcements was obviously common. An additional eight examples exist, also perhaps by an accident of preservation, from the years of al-Mustanṣir.¹²² There are seven more in al-Qalqashandī's manual of chancery practice, the *Ṣubḥ al-aʿshā*, but only one of these has a date (ʿĪd al-fiṭr, 531). Typically al-Qalqashandī was less interested in exact dates, which he often removed in his presentation of the text of a document, than in the person who composed it. Five of his examples are by Ibn al-Ṣayrafī, most likely the sixth as well (the one dated 531), and one by Ibn Qādūs, who was head of the Fatimid chancery at a period after the former. Ibn al-Ṣayrafī died in 542/1147; Ibn Qādūs in 553.

The eyewitness testimony of Ibn al-Ṭuwayr

The other item is a detailed account of a caliph delivering the *khuṭba* on the Fridays of Ramaḍān and the two *ʿid* festivals. One of the most complete of its kind, it comes from Ibn al-Ṭuwayr, an eyewitness to the late Fatimid period. In fact this man reports that he personally saw the caliph give the *khuṭba* in one of the cases he describes. Unfortunately he does not indicate which caliph it was. Since he himself lived from 525/1130 to 617/1220, he could have seen only the last four: al-Ḥāfiẓ, al-Zāfir, al-Fāʿiz and al-ʿĀḍid.¹²³ It is unlikely that he refers to al-Fāʿiz, and perhaps not to al-Ḥāfiẓ. The former was probably too young ever to give the *khuṭba*¹²⁴ and the latter was caliph in Ibn al-Ṭuwayr's own youth (although he would have been nineteen by the end of this reign).

Ibn al-Ṭuwayr reports:¹²⁵ If he rode on the first of the month of Ramaḍān, the caliph rests on the first Friday. On the second Friday, he rides to the great Anwār Mosque wearing the outfit of the festival seasons and those items of accoutrement mentioned previously. He is clothed in a robe of white silk, reverently gilded out of respect for the prayer, and a kerchief and rounded shawl of hair. He enters by the *khaṭīb*'s door, with the wazīr accompanying him, after having been preceded at the start of the day by the treasurer, who was mentioned earlier as one of the eunuchs, who brings with him the furnishings special to the caliph if he appears on that day. These items are carried in the hands of servants selected for this duty and are wrapped in wide *dabīqī* linen. Three carpets have been laid out in the *mihrāb*, either of the finest *sāmān* or of *dabīqī* linen of either kind, each embroidered in red. These carpets were stacked one on the other.

Two curtains, one left and one right, have been attached to the top. The one on the right has written on it in red silk with clear markings the Basmala, the Fātiḥa, and the Sūrat al-Jumu'a. The curtain on the left is similar, with, along with the Fātiḥa, 'When the hypocrites come to you...' [63: 1].¹²⁶ They have been lowered and spread in being attached to the sides of the *miḥrāb* affixed to its structure. Then the chief qadi goes up the *minbar* holding in his hand a fine bamboo censer that has been given to him by the treasurer containing embers on which has been placed three types of incense the like of which were never smelled except in this place. He perfumes the top, which has on it a covering like that of the dome for the caliph to sit in the midst of the *khutba*. The qadi makes three passes over it. Then the caliph arrives with respectful appearance of drum and bugle. In his train, just beyond the grooms, come the reciters. The reciters were present on each side chanting the recitations one after another, having begun that when he first departed from where he sat, along the route leading to the chamber of the *khutba* in the mosque. The enclosure is guarded from the outside by the chamberlain and the commander of the troops, and from inside from start to end by the Elite Youth Guard (*ṣibyān al-khāṣṣ*) and others who were so charged, from his entering it through the doorway until he exits going to the *minbar*, one by one, with the wazīr at the end.

When the call to Friday prayer sounds, the chief qadi goes in to him and says: 'Greetings to the Commander of the Believers, the most noble judge, may God have mercy on him and bless him. The prayer, may God have mercy on you!' Then the caliph precedes out walking, around him are the eunuchs and *muḥannaks*, the wazīr behind him, and those of the elite following them, those belonging to the Youth Guard with weapons in their hands—they are officers bearing this name. He mounts the *minbar* to the top, beneath the perfumed dome. Once he is seated, with the wazīr at the door to the *minbar* facing him, he signals the latter to climb up. The qadi goes up until he reaches him and then kisses his hands and feet in full view of the people. Next he covers the caliph inside the dome, which then resembled a *hawdaj*. He descends facing him and stops holding the door of the *minbar*. If there is no wazīr who is also military, the lowering of the curtains would have been done by

the chief qadi in like fashion and he would have stood holding the door of the *minbar*. The caliph then delivers a short *khutba* from a prepared text presented to him from the chancery. He recites in it a *sūra* of the Sacred Qur'an. I myself listened once to his *khutba* in the Azhar Mosque. He recited in his *khutba*: 'O my Lord, have me be thankful for Your favour which You have bestowed on me and on my parents' (to the end of this verse) [27: 19 or 46: 15]. Next he prayed for his father and grandfather, meaning by them here Muḥammad and 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib,¹²⁷ and he preached to the people an eloquent sermon of a few words. The *khutba* itself consisted of abundant phrases. He mentioned those who had come before of his forefathers until coming down to himself and said—and I was listening to him: 'O God, I am Your servant, and son of Your servant; I do not expect of You either harm or benefit'. He asks for grand good wishes appropriate to that and he requests blessings for the wazir, if there is one, and, for the armies, support and good order and, for the troops, victory, and, on the unbelievers and opponents, destruction and domination. Then he closes by saying: 'Remember God remembers you.' The person who had covered him then goes up and opens those curtains and descends again backward. The reason for covering them was their reading from a prepared text in contrast to the usual custom of the *khaṭībs*. The caliph descends and stands on those three carpets in the *miḥrāb*, alone in front, the wazir and qadi in a line behind and behind them the eunuchs, the *muḥannaks*, the collared officers, various lords of rank among the military and clerical staff, with the *mu'adhdhins*, standing and visible up against the *maqṣūra* to guard him. As the wazir hears the caliph, he relays [what he says] to the qadi, who relays it to the *mu'adhdhins*, and they relay it to the people. So it was and the mosque was full of a host ready for prayer behind him. The caliph reads what is written on the right-hand curtain during the first *rak'a* and in the second what is written on the left, doing that as a way of remembering, out of fear of any hesitation. When finished, the people depart and ride away one by one. The caliph returns in the direction of the palace, with the wazir behind him. Bugles and drums sound on the return.

The ceremony of the second Friday was much the same. On the third, the caliph rode to Fuṣṭāṭ for the *khutba* in its mosque. The route and decoration of this procession were thus different but the other details remained. For the festival of fast-breaking:

[T]he caliph rides in procession at the onset of Shawwāl at the close of Ramaḍān which they calculate always as thirty days. Once preparations have been completed for the caliph, the wazir, the commanders, and the elite of various ranks, as described previously, and the wazir with his retinue is stationed at the door of the palace, the caliph proceeds wearing the attire of the caliph, the parasol, the solitaire gem [in his turban], and other accoutrements previously mentioned. His clothing on this day, which is the ʿĪd al-fiṭr, consists of a white-banded robe *mujawwama*, which is the most glorious of their outfits, and the parasol is similar (it always matches his robe so that however it is, the parasol is also). He exits from the ʿĪd Gate to the *muṣallā*. The extras that appear on this day are in the numbers of soldiers and troops, both on horse and foot, who line the route from the gate of the palace to the *muṣallā* in two rows. The master of the treasury had, as was the custom, furnished the *muṣallā* as was done on the Fridays. [Here Ibn al-Ṭuwayr repeats in summary the furnishing and the two curtains with Qurʾanic verses (on the right 87: 1 and the left 88: 1, plus Basmala and Fātiḥa on both).] Two banners have been firmly planted on the two sides of the *muṣallā* like those, on two lances adorned with joints of silver, both unfurled and loose. The caliph enters from the eastside of the *muṣallā* to a spot in which he rests a moment. Then he proceeds, guarded as he had been in the mosque of Cairo, meaning that he walks out with the *muḥannak* eunuchs around him and the wazir behind him.... He goes forward to the *mihrāb* and gives the ʿĪd prayer with *takbīrs* as prescribed, the wazir behind him and the qadi. In each *rakʿa* he reads what is inscribed on the curtains, which are there as reminders.

Once finished, he extends greetings and mounts the *minbar* for the ʿĪd *khutba* of the festival of fast-breaking. When he has taken his seat at the top where there is a cushion of *sāmān* or *dabīqī* linen of appropriate size, the rest of him is covered in white in his measure according to the division of its stairs exactly without having been altered. The people of that gathering see him sitting at the top. Standing at the base of the *minbar* are the wazir, the chief qadi, the chamberlain, the commander of the army, the head of the chancery,

the controller of the palace, the master of the bureau of state, the parasol bearer, the leaders of the *ashrāf* relatives, the treasurer, the lance bearer, the head of the 'Alid nobility. The wazir faces him. The caliph signals to the wazir to climb up and so he does, approaching and stopping, his face opposite his feet. He kisses them in view of all those present. Then he rises and stands to the right of the caliph.

Once standing he signals to the chief qadi to come up. He goes up to the seventh step. Then the boon-companion He takes out of his sleeve a register that has been presented to him the day before from the chancery after having been passed by the caliph and the wazir. As he reads it he disclosed what it contains. He says: 'In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate. This confirms who is to be honoured by mounting this sacred *minbar* on such and such day, which is the 'Īd al-fiṭr, of such and such a year, of the servants of the Commander of the Believers, may God's blessings be on him and on his pure forefathers, and the noble prophets, following the mounting of the Illustrious Lord and his approved title and his pious benediction.' If the caliph wants to bestow honours on any of the sons of the wazir and his brothers, the qadi would call them up by the title mentioned therein. Next follows the name of the aforementioned qadi, who is himself the reader [of the document]. It is not his place to expand on his own titles nor his invocation but to say merely 'the slave so and so (*fulān b. fulān*)'. Once the qadi Ibn Abī 'Aqīl was reading when he came to his own name and he said: 'The humble servant who confesses to the wondrous art in the glorious position, Aḥmad b. 'Abd al-Raḥmān b. Abī 'Aqīl.'¹²⁸ That was considered good on his part and subsequently al-A'azz b. Salāma, who was qadi at the end [of the dynasty], followed his example.¹²⁹ He said: 'The slave in the place of sacred honour, who holds the appointment to the most truthful symbol, Ḥasan b. 'Alī b. Salāma.' Next he summons those we mentioned who were standing at the door of the *minbar* by their titles, citing their service, and inviting them according to rank.

In going up each of them knows his place on the *minbar*, left or right. Once there is no one left who should mount, the wazir signals those in whose hand is a part of the banner that hangs to the side of the caliph. He is then covered over and concealed. The wazir calls to

the people to listen. The caliph delivers the *khuṭba* from the written text as usual. It is an eloquent *khuṭba* appropriate for that day. When he finishes, each of those whose hand was on a part of the banner outside of the *minbar* uncover it as they had previously covered it. They descend one by one, the nearer first, backward. Once the *minbar* is cleared of all except the caliph, he stands and goes down to the spot he will exit from, stopping only a brief moment and then rides...[back to the palace].

Here Ibn al-Ṭuwayr continues with details of the ceremony of returning to the palace, entering it, and the feast to follow.

His account of the ʿĪd al-naḥr is shorter, in general noting that the riding of the caliph on that day was much like that of the feast of fast-breaking, except that he would be dressed in red. His riding occurred on three days consecutively, only the first of which was to the *muṣallā* for a *khuṭba* as with the ʿĪd al-fiṭr. The other two went instead directly to the special grounds for the sacrifices, the *manḥar*.

As with the information gleaned from Ibn al-Maʾmūn, this report by Ibn al-Ṭuwayr entered most subsequent accounts of the caliphal *khuṭba* and its attendant ceremonies. Both appear, for example, in al-Maqrīzī's *Khiṭaṭ* in the section of that work devoted to the appropriate topic. Like Ibn al-Maʾmūn, and al-Musabbihī from a previous century, Ibn al-Ṭuwayr offers eyewitness observations of the events he describes. Significantly, a comparison of the three suggests that there had been little, perhaps no, change in the protocol surrounding either the Friday *khuṭba* of Ramaḍān or of the two ʿīd festivals. Once set, the customary practice of the Fatimid dynasty in regard to the giving of these *khuṭbas* remained in place to the very end.

The last *khuṭba*

At the very end of Fatimid rule, the wazir was Saladin (Ṣalāḥ al-Dīn), who would become famous as the founder of the Ayyubid dynasty that followed. Before that he had entered Egypt only as a commander of Syrian troops on behalf of his Zangid overlord and sponsor in Damascus from whom he had obtained his commission. Later, having risen to the position of wazir, he came to owe a second allegiance to

al-‘Āḍid, the last of the Fatimids. And, although under pressure from both Damascus, and also Baghdad, to abolish the Shi‘i caliphate in Cairo, he resisted as long as he dared. Finally, with al-‘Āḍid sick and dying, and not expected to recover, Saladin at last gave the order to change the *khuṭba*. The *khaṭīb*, however, was poorly prepared. It was Muḥarram of the year 567 when the command came down, but, faced with what exactly to say in the new *khuṭba*, he hesitated. He knew not to mention al-‘Āḍid and did not. In place of the Fatimid caliph, however, he named in the prayer simply ‘the rightly guided imams’ (*al-a’imma al-mahdiyyīn*), along with al-Mālik al-Nāṣir (the title of the wazir, i.e. Saladin). The formulation ‘rightly guided imams’ was as old as the Fatimids; it had appeared in the earliest of the *khuṭbas* said in their favour. It hardly sufficed to signal the end of their dynasty. But, on the following Friday, the *khaṭīb* came much better prepared and this time pronounced without confusion or hesitation the full names and titles of the Abbasid caliph. Egypt no longer recognized the Fatimid imam; it was once again Sunni and the Shi‘i Ismaili caliphate had finally come to an end.¹³⁰

CHAPTER 2

Rhetoric and Themes in the Surviving *Khuṭbas*

Rhetoric is the art of expression, particularly in oratory. It is thus the skilful use of language in speech. Whoever delivers the Friday *khuṭba*, or that of the two *ʿīd* festivals, must assume the responsibility of employing terms and phrases aimed at a broad audience, the rhetoric, in other words, of public address. To understand fully what might have been involved, we ought to have a much larger sample of these sermons. It is unfortunate that those which survive, either whole or in part, represent a very small fraction of the total. Over the entire 270 years of Fatimid rule, the number of *ʿīd khuṭbas* alone would have easily exceeded 500. Of these, today we can study as few as ten, with some uncertainty about one or two of them. Of Friday sermons by the imams, only one, possibly two, remain. Of the literally thousands and thousands of ordinary Friday *khuṭbas* said in their names, we possess only one in complete form and parts from a handful of others. Even so the situation is by no means hopeless. Although the evidence is not as plentiful as we might want, what we do have is all the more precious for its rarity. If we cannot expect definitive answers, we nonetheless have important material to investigate in the sermons that survive.

What follows in this chapter constitutes a preliminary accounting of the themes and rhetorical strategies displayed in the texts of the *khuṭbas* that are available. This material begins to tell us what the imams actually said to their subjects and it thus reveals, secondarily, a little about what, in the context of a public forum, they felt the need to relate to those who, in that era long ago, followed them.

The audience

The Fatimid caliphs obviously always guarded carefully what they said, but perhaps no more so than on the occasions of the *khuṭbas* just described when they spoke before an audience that may well have included a vast array of their subjects, representing many different religious inclinations—Sunnis and Shi'is of various kinds—and also a variety of ranks: men of the elites from both the military and the bureaucracy, merchants, religious scholars and the common folk among them. They knew well that the audience for these *khuṭbas* likely consisted not only of their most loyal subjects but also, at the same time, others less attached, and possibly some who harboured grave doubts about them, even hostility. One of the surviving *khuṭbas*, by al-Qā'im in Alexandria in 302, acknowledges such conditions forthrightly. The future imam even anticipated the resistance and possible enmity of the Egyptians to himself and his dynasty. Likewise the *khuṭba* of Qirwāsh, as perhaps many Fatimid *khuṭbas* in similar situations outside the empire, must have seemed quite foreign to those who were used to hearing the Friday sermon said in the name of another caliphate.

Within the *da'wa* of the Ismaili movement, loyal members would have attended a private session—a lesson—normally given by a *dā'i*, on behalf of the imam. At the conclusion of these meetings, called the *majālis al-ḥikma*, which were held generally once a week, each person paid what was called 'a fee for private discourse' (in Arabic, the *najwa*). This practice was clearly based on Qur'anic legislation as noted, for example, in *sūra* 58: 12: 'O you who believe, if you confer with the Prophet in private, give alms before your consultation.' These occasions were not for the public and this is thus confirmed additionally in this way. By contrast, the ceremonial *khuṭba* was open at least theoretically to all Muslims, not simply to Ismaili believers, and the person speaking had to take that fact into account in choosing his words.

It is obvious then that the first step in analysing the rhetoric of these *khuṭbas* depends on determining the audience for each one. The sermon for the festival, moreover, was delivered at the *muṣallā*, which was always a large open space designed to accommodate the

maximum number of worshippers at one time. The Friday *khuṭba* given inside a mosque naturally limited the size of the audience. Not so that of the *ʿid*.

With crowds so large it is fair to ask how many could actually hear what was said. Even in a mosque that may have been a problem. The congregation was under a strict rule to maintain absolute silence. A *ḥadīth* on the authority of Jaʿfar al-Ṣādiq states clearly: 'When the imam stands up to deliver his sermon, it is obligatory for the congregation to observe complete silence.'¹³¹ Even so, in the open air of the *muṣallā*,¹³² surely only those close to the *minbar* heard the words of the imam directly? Perhaps the same was true in the largest congregational mosques. But this difficulty was in part overcome by having a series of voices relay the message out beyond the reach of the speaker's own immediate circle.

Still, it is likely that those allowed to be close to the imam had a special claim to this privilege, either through rank or proven loyalty. From the descriptions provided by eyewitnesses from the last phase of Fatimid rule, it is clear that the protection of the caliph was taken seriously whenever he appeared in public. The occasion of the *khuṭba* required careful control of exactly who came into close proximity to him. One note indicates that no one outside of the governing elite was admitted to the ceremony without being vouchsafed by the chief *dāʿī*. That stipulation would appear to confine the scope of the public audience—that is, those from outside the government—to Ismailis. Only Ismailis would have had access to the *dāʿī*. This condition, however, may have applied more to the Friday *khuṭba* than the caliph gave in Ramaḍān in a mosque than to the festivals. In any case there is no comparable evidence about such a restriction from the earlier periods.

One important detail in two of the *khuṭbas* from North Africa, however, features a direct appeal by name to the Kutāma, who must, therefore, have made up a major portion of the audience at the time. The first instance is particularly striking. It occurs in the *khuṭba*

read to the army during Abū Yazīd's siege of al-Mahdiyya in Rajab 333 (March 945). In the name of al-Qā'im, the judge al-Marwadhī praises the Kutāma, whose forefathers had performed so gloriously both in keeping the rights of the Fatimid line safe when it had been forced into hiding and in fighting for its return to triumphal victory. 'You were the cache where God placed this Muhammadan, Fatimid, *mahdī*-ist right [to the imamate] until He caused it to triumph.' 'You are,' it goes on to say, 'like the apostles of Jesus and the Anṣār of Muḥammad.' The appeal here is so specific we must conclude that the audience on that occasion was predominantly, if not exclusively, Kutāma Berber. The second instance is the festival sermon for the 'Īd al-fiṭr of 336, again at al-Mahdiyya. In it al-Manṣūr addresses part of his remarks to the Kutāma, noting effusively God's favours to them and thus their special status in the imam's eyes, and how pleased he is with them and their devotion to the Fatimid dynasty.

Aside from these quite specific cases and the general impression conveyed by al-Qā'im's tone in his *khuṭba* to the people of Alexandria, we need to assume that the audience tended to include a variety of the Muslim inhabitants of the empire and was not limited to Ismailis, except as might have occurred by virtue of place and time. Al-Mahdiyya, when the caliph resided there, was largely Ismaili; Qayrawān, the home of the old, mostly Mālikī elite, was not. Cairo in its earliest phase is likely to have been heavily Ismaili since it began as a Fatimid governmental enclave; nearby Fuṣṭāṭ was much older and already contained a substantial Sunni population. Later some of these distinctions faded or disappeared entirely.

Double meanings for different audiences

An element in the rhetorical strategy of these *khuṭbas* may have involved the use of phrases that a Sunni audience would understand differently from the Shi'a among them. For example, the commonly employed words 'Alī walīy Allāh ('Alī is the *walīy* of God'), which eventually appeared on all Fatimid coins and is quite standard in Shi'a discourse of every type, is readily taken by Sunnis to mean 'Alī is the friend of God'. Ordinarily, because this sense of the word *walīy*, which is perfectly valid for it, is not objectionable, it causes no resistance or hos-

tility on their part. For the Shi'a, however, it means more than 'friend'. 'Alī was, in their view the 'guardian' (*walīy*, in a different sense) of God's community on earth. He was thus the agent of God with exclusive authority to act as regent for the Muslims; he is their guardian.

One good example, albeit by mistake, of how Sunnis might misread the words of a Fatimid *khutba* occurs with the line in Qirwāsh's Friday sermon about God, '...who, by His light, caused the rising of the sun of truth from the west....' Islamic messianic speculation, even among Sunnis, regarded the signal for the end of time as the rising of the sun from its place of setting, in other words of time being made to reverse course or to cease altogether. With the Shi'a, in expectation of the return of this or that imam who had temporarily gone into occultation, such speculations are more pronounced. The doctrine of several early Shi'i sects included a rising of the imam from the west, from where he will restore true Islam and reclaim his rightful position as head of the Muslim community. The Fatimids, who had first attained power in the Maghrib, i.e. in the west, naturally made the most of this concept. They were, beginning with al-Mahdī, but subsequently collectively, the embodiment of such messianic aspirations. With their rising to the imamate in the westernmost region of the Islamic realm, these speculations had become a reality.

But, in at least one major source that reports these opening words of Qirwāsh's *khutba*, Ibn al-Athīr's early 7th/13th century universal history, *al-Kāmil fi'l-ta'rikh*, some copies have changed the word 'west' to 'Arabs', which in Arabic script is quite easy: instead of *al-gharb* (the west), read *al-'arab* (the Arabs), the difference is a dot above the Arabic letter غ or ع.¹³³ Thus the key phrase would have the 'sun of truth rising from the Arabs', which would sound quite reasonable to a Sunni audience.

The address to God: the *khutba* as a prayer

A major portion of the *khutba*, in any case, consisted of an address to God, a request to Him for blessings or favours, as in the standard

benediction for Muḥammad and for his family, hardly a matter of controversy. Typically it commences with the vocative phrase *Allāhumma*, 'O God!'. A passage of this type is then a prayer, a *du'ā*, a form of supplication made either in the name of the person giving the *khuṭba* or by him on behalf of someone else. More rarely, however, but not unknown, it asks God to curse an enemy. We have an example of the latter in al-Qā'im's early sermon to the Egyptians where he castigates the Umayyads, and in his last *khuṭba* in which he invokes God's curse on the Khārijite rebel Abū Yazīd, there naming him simply the 'Nukkārī'. In these respects Fatimid *khuṭbas* are like those we know from elsewhere. Obviously the caliphs intended to observe common Islamic traditions and therefore followed established practices in the form and the content of their sermons. That is clear from the use of the double *khuṭba* in which the speaker sits briefly between the two, in having the Friday sermon precede, and on the festivals follow, prayers and in other technical matters such as the number of *takbīrs*, greetings to those present, and the recitation of Qur'anic passages.

Qāḍī al-Nu'mān quotes the Imam Ja'far al-Šādiq for a rule concerning the content of the *khuṭba* prayer:

Allāhu akhbar should be uttered only once, and with it the recitation of the Qur'an should begin; thus this is the *takbīrat al-ihrām*. Thereafter the Fātiḥa should be recited, followed by *wa'l-shamsi wa ḍuḥā* [sūrat al-Shams, no. 91]. Then the *takbīr* [of the 'īd] should be recited five times. The ordinary *takbīr* should also be said at the time of bowing and prostrating oneself. Then the worshipper should stand up [for the second *rak'a*] and recite the Fātiḥa, followed by *hal atāka ḥadīth al-ghāshiya* [sūrat al-Ghāshiya, no. 88], and the *takbīr* [of the 'īd] should be recited four times, and the ordinary *takbīr* should be uttered while bowing and rising from it and prostrating oneself. Then the *tashahhud* should be said, and finally the salutation.¹³⁴

He likewise noted that Ja'far's father had included the following words in his own prayer for the occasion:

O God! He who prepares and arrays himself this day to present himself to a creature hoping for his gift and reward [may do so;

but] I come to You, my Lord, preparing and making ready and ar-
ranging myself solely for Your gift, reward, and presents. I have not
come to You with the assurance of good works already performed,
nor have I sought the intervention of any of Your creatures [for the
fulfilment of my hopes]. But I have come to You conscious of my
misdeeds and the evil that I have wrought upon myself. O Mighty,
Mighty, Mighty One! Forgive my weighty sin; for verily none save
You, O Mighty One, can absolve me from a weighty sin. There exists
no god but You.¹³⁵

In general what Qāḍī al-Nu'mān reports about the circumstances
of the Friday prayer and that of the two 'īd festivals indicates the
standard expected of these events. There we find strictures concern-
ing the silence to be observed while the *khuṭbas* are being delivered
and that the congregation must face the speaker and pay close atten-
tion. 'The sermon is prescribed in lieu of the two *rak'as* that have
been omitted from the *ẓuhr* prayer; and thus it is similar to offering
a prayer itself. Hence nothing is permitted during the delivery of the
sermon that is not permitted while praying.'¹³⁶

The Friday prayer should commence with the delivery of the two
sermons. When the imam first ascends the pulpit he should sit
down and the *mu'adhdhins* should give the call to prayer. When
they have completed the call, the imam should stand up and deliver
his sermon and exhortation. Then he should sit down for a short
while and then stand up again and offer a second sermon along
with his prayer invocation [*du'ā'*]. Thereafter the *mu'adhdhins*
should say the *iqāma*, and the imam should come down from the
minbar and pray the two *rak'as* in which the Qur'an should be
recited loudly.¹³⁷

Unfortunately, aside from the relatively brief section in al-
Nu'mān's handbook of Ismaili law that speaks about the Friday
and festival sermons, there is little else to indicate what rules might
have applied to Fatimid *khuṭbas*. And those of the imams, who were

acknowledged authorities for doctrine and practice in their own right, did not necessarily follow earlier dictates in any case. But what al-Nu'mān does report is likely what was expected.

Qur'anic imagery and language

Given its nature as a prayer to God, the *khuṭba* obviously tends to borrow heavily from Qur'anic imagery and depends on its language either by outright quotation or only slightly veiled allusion. In fact the texts of the surviving *khuṭbas* are replete with references to the Qur'an, though some less obvious than others. The predominant stylistic device involves the use of rhymed prose, *saj'*, which is itself an important element of Qur'anic eloquence, as it was even in the pre-Islamic period for most oral prose.¹³⁸

Praising God

All *khuṭbas* that are designed for ceremonial use have a section, usually at the beginning, dedicated to praising God. In our Fatimid examples that portion could be brief or long depending, perhaps, on the needs of the particular moment. Several are quite elaborate, however, and especially eloquent. Do they also reveal any peculiarities of Ismaili doctrine, such as the denial of attributes for God? From the writings of Ismaili theologians—that is, those who wrote about such matters as God and the possibility of His having attributes—we know that they carefully observed a rigorous doctrine of restricting all qualification of God, thereby denying that He possesses the attributes commonly given to Him by Sunni authorities. He is outside and beyond the perceptions of human beings, even intellectually, and thus He cannot be known or indicated directly by human intellect.¹³⁹

In parts of the following passages taken from the surviving *khuṭbas* there appears to be an echo of this doctrinal position:

Praise be to God who unites through divine lordship, who is unique in oneness, who is almighty in ability and endurance, all-powerful in majesty and grandeur, the first without limit, the last without end, transcending the comparisons of the ignorant and the definitions of the describers, the conditions of the attributers, and the comprehension in visions of those who speculate.¹⁴⁰

Hallowed is God, He whose signs bear witness to His power. His essence refuses the association with it of attributes, the vision of Him by sight, the definition of Him by intellects, being most grand and almighty, glorious and powerful, splendid and magnificent.¹⁴¹

His causing things to come into being from nothing all at once and altogether is evidence that nothing came before Him and their end at a term indicates that there is no limit to Him. That they are apprehended by definitions establishes that He has no definition. The weakness, impotence, poverty, and want of which created beings are not free is the most eloquent admission and most truthful evidence for the Creator, who is alone, glorious is His praise, in divinity and singularity, in power and lordship, in completeness and perfection, in eternity and perpetuity.¹⁴²

Distinct in His essence, alone in His attributes, manifest in His signs, solitary in His indications, time passes by Him not so that the seasons preceded Him, forms do not resemble Him so that places contain Him. Eyes do not see Him so that tongues can describe Him. His existence is prior to all existences; His goodness surpasses all goodness. His oneness is fixed in every intellect; His presence exists in every vision.¹⁴³

If, however, there is here some deliberate reference to Ismaili doctrine, these statements of it are, even so, much too vague for a firm conclusion. The rhetoric of the *khuṭba* often suggests rather than insists. Those in the audience heard in the first instance phrases and

meanings that agreed with what they thought. The speaker was not in most cases intent on expounded doctrines that might provoke dissent. The praising of God in Islam always required a firm declaration of His absolute unqualified oneness—as is frequently stated in the Qur'an itself—and that is exactly what these and the other passages in our *khuṭbas* indicate. To say in a *khuṭba*, for example, that God cannot be seen, which is Ismaili doctrine as well as the doctrine of many other groups, does not necessarily imply that He will never be seen, even in the next life, which is also the Ismaili position at least as expressed by its *da'wa* in that era. For that conclusion, we would need more information than we are provided in these *khuṭbas* alone.

Muḥammad as grandfather

To bear witness or testify that Muḥammad was the prophet and messenger of God is a standard feature of the *khuṭba* in general. Most of the attributes ascribed to Muḥammad in Fatimid *khuṭbas*, moreover, agreed well with such statements in those not by them. What is different and uniquely Fatimid is the reference to him as the 'grandfather', e.g. of the current caliph, or, as it most often appears, as 'our grandfather', as in the invocation of God's blessings on 'our grandfather' (*jiddinā*). The meaning, of course, is ancestor or forefather, but it carries a special connotation in conjunction with references to 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, who is always called 'our father' (*abūnā, abinā*). See, for example, the *khuṭbas* of al-Āmir where this type of reference appears prominently in both parts of the sermon. Additional examples occur in those of al-Manṣūr from 335 and 336.

'Alī as father

References and characterizations of 'Alī are particularly important as a sign of the ancestral lineage of the Fatimids and of the Shi'i assertion of legitimacy for its imamate. 'Alī bears the title Commander of the Believers, which, for the Shi'a, applies to him alone among the Companions of the Prophet since they do not recognize any of the others as valid successors to the imamate. In his position as heir to the Prophet, both physically and spiritually, he carries also the title

of Legatee (in Arabic *waṣī*). In Qirwāsh's *khuṭba* he is called the Lord of the Legatees (*sayyid al-waṣīyīn*). Another appellation denotes his close family relationship to Muḥammad, which for the Shi'a means, in reference to 'Alī, brother. For them the Prophet had adopted him as his own brother. He was, moreover, in the same position as had been Aaron with respect to his brother Moses. The Prophet had stated, according to a *ḥadīth* of special importance to the Shi'a, that, "Alī is to me as Aaron was to Moses."

Here follow some examples from the *khuṭbas*:

'Alī, the Commander of the Believers and master of the legatees and best of Muslims.¹⁴⁴

...and bless the first to respond to him [i.e. the Prophet], 'Alī, the Commander of the Believers and lord of the legatees, the establisher of excellence and mercy, the pillar of knowledge and wisdom, the root of the noble and righteous tree generated from the sacred and pure trunk. And [blessings be] on his successors, the lofty branches of that same tree, and on what comes from it: the fruit that grows there.¹⁴⁵

O God, bless your radiant guardian and your greatest friend, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, the father of the rightly guided imams.

God bless our grandfather, Muḥammad, the guide to the shining path, and our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, his brother and son of his paternal uncle, whom he sanctioned for the position of executor, and the chaste imams among the descendants of both, the clear evident proofs of God to His creatures.¹⁴⁶

And bless, O God, our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, who held the place with respect to him that had Aaron with Moses, the one who spoke to God.¹⁴⁷

...and He aided him through our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, his brother and his legatee and the spokesman of his law, who explained its peculiar intricacies.¹⁴⁸

The Companions of the Cloak (*aṣḥāb al-kisāʾ*)

From a brief mention of a ritual of mutual cursing which is apparently what is taking place in Qurʾan 3: 61 (‘If any one disputes this with you after the knowledge has come to you, say, “Come, let us gather our sons and your sons, our women and your women, ourselves and yourselves; then let us pray and invoke the curse of God on those who lie”’), an entire tradition developed around the implied story of Muḥammad having brought his immediate family members under his cloak on that occasion. They were the *aṣḥāb al-kisāʾ* (the Companions of the Cloak). The question then became who exactly belonged to this set. For the Shiʿa this has never been much of an issue since they included only the Prophet, ‘Alī, Fāṭima, al-Ḥasan, and al-Ḥusayn. The non-Shiʿa dispute the matter and they have alternate interpretations of the tradition.¹⁴⁹ However, in the Fatimid *khuṭbas*, as one would expect, the Shiʿi point of view prevails, as in the following passages:

O God, bless Your servant and Your messenger with a perpetually perfect blessing, increase him with an honour to his honour and a nobility to his nobility. Bless also all of the Companions of the Cloak (*aṣḥāb al-kisāʾ*), the pure ones, the immaculates: ‘Alī, the Commander of the Believers, Fāṭima the Radiant, mistress of the women of the two worlds, and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two most noble and most righteous, and [bless] the rightly guided imams among the progeny of al-Ḥusayn, the luminaries of guidance, the full moons of the darkness, the masters of mankind, friends of the Most Merciful, the proofs of times, and pillars of the faith.¹⁵⁰

I testify that Muḥammad is His chosen servant, and His approved messenger, His confidant for what He reveals, the deliverer from error and destruction, may God bless him and his revered family, the rightly guided ones, the imams of righteous guidance: ‘Alī, the Commander of the Believers and master of the legatees and best of Muslims; Fāṭima, the radiant, mistress of the women of the two worlds; and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two lords of the youth

among the people of paradise; and the imams from the progeny of al-Ḥusayn, the chaste ones, the remainder of the messenger of God and his fruit, his two heirs, his proof to the servants, the mountains of religion, lords of the believers, and saints of the worlds.¹⁵¹

...the rightly guided (*mahdī*-ist) imams among his noble and chaste progeny who have been chosen for the caliphate and approved for the imamate, confirming their proof in the testament of the messenger, making obedience to them necessary in the revelation, after His conferring excellence on them over the world through the parentage of Muḥammad, the lord of the messengers, and 'Alī, the most excellent of the legatees, those whose mother was the mistress of women, the fifth of the Companions of the Cloak.¹⁵²

Fāṭima as mother

Al-Manṣūr speaks of her as 'the Radiant, mistress of the women of the two worlds' in two successive sermons, and in yet another *khuṭba*, in reference to his own father and grandfather, the imams al-Qā'im and al-Mahdī, he calls her 'Fāṭima, the radiant virgin,¹⁵³ your mother'. In a sermon by al-Mu'izz the rightly guiding imams are 'those whose mother was the mistress of women, the fifth of the Companions of the Cloak'. Similar characterizations appear in the *khuṭbas* of al-Āmir.¹⁵⁴

al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn

In Fatimid era *khuṭbas* both Ḥasan and Ḥusayn are cited as imams and members of the five Companions of the Cloak, although they make quite clear that the imamate continued after them solely among the descendants of Ḥusayn.

...al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two lords of the youth among the people of paradise; and the imams from the progeny of al-Ḥusayn, the chaste ones, the remainder of the messenger of God and his fruit, his two heirs, his proof to the servants, the mountains of religion, lords of the believers, and saints of the worlds.¹⁵⁶

O God, bless the two pure grandsons al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn.¹⁵⁷

...her [Fāṭima's] two sons, the imams Abū Muḥammad al-Ḥasan and Abū 'Abd Allāh al-Ḥusayn, the best of creatures.¹⁵⁸

[Bless] al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn two imams of the community and shining lights of the sphere of religion and its perfection in assemblies and festivals.¹⁵⁹

The imams from al-Ḥusayn to al-Mahdī

Clearly the imams after al-Ḥusayn are his offspring, not those of al-Ḥasan. However they are seldom mentioned by name in the surviving *khuṭbas*, even those prior to the period of concealment which commenced with Ismā'īl, the son of Ja'far al-Ṣādiq, or with his son Muḥammad b. Ismā'īl, who was actually the first never to have appeared in public. In Qirwāsh's sermon they are all simply 'the righteous imams, the best and most excellent, those of them that stood forth and appeared and those of them that were concealed and hidden'. In the first *khuṭba* by al-Manṣūr he calls his grandfather al-Mahdī, the 'son of the Rightly Guided Ones (*al-Mahdiyyīn*), the noble son of the most noble' without going further into the matter. That seems to have been, to judge from these *khuṭbas*, the preferred

policy for public pronouncements. Only in a *khuṭba* of al-Āmir are any of them cited by name. There he refers to the imams prior to al-Mahdī as ‘Alī b. al-Ḥusayn Zayn al-‘Ābidīn, and Muḥammad b. ‘Alī Bākir ‘Ulūm al-Dīn, and Ja‘far b. Muḥammad al-Šādiq al-Amīn, and the true imam Ismā‘īl, and Muḥammad his son, possessor of the nobility of the authentic caliphate, and those who had all excellences and superiority, and [bless] the imams who were concealed from the enemy, who in his actions opposed all of them in like manner,’ whom he contrasts with ‘the piercing stars of truth, the suns rising from the places of setting’. The latter he names one by one starting with al-Mahdī.

The imams from al-Mahdī onward

It was evidently customary practice to cite each of the preceding imams by name from the current caliph back to al-Mahdī. Ibn al-Ṭuwayrī near the end of the dynasty suggests as much. In one of the two *khuṭbas* of al-Āmir, this caliph lists all of those who came before him from al-Mahdī through al-Musta‘lī, his own father. All those to the reign of al-Ḥākim are named likewise in the *khuṭba* of Qirwāsh. Since the full name of each caliph contained the word Allāh, as in al-Manṣūr bi-Naṣr Allāh or al-Ḥākim bi-Amr Allāh, in the sermon where the name appears as part of a request addressed directly to God for Him to bless each of the imams so named, the proper form requires a personal pronoun, thus al-Manṣūr bi-Naṣrika (‘The One who is victorious through Your support’, rather than ‘The One who is victorious through the support of God’) or al-Ḥākim bi-Amrika (‘The Ruler by Your Command’ rather than ‘The Ruler by the Command of God’).

The name of the dynasty

From the medieval period until now it has been customary to call the dynasty of Ismaili imams who ruled North Africa beginning in 297/909, and then a larger empire that included Egypt, and at times much of Syria, the Hijaz, and Yaman, the Fatimids. But the history of this term is not yet clear. Did, for example, the earliest caliphs of this

line refer to themselves by that name? In 1996 the Spanish scholar Mirabel Fierro published an important study of this problem, and of the use in general of the terms *al-fāṭimī* (Fatimid) and *al-fāṭimiyyūn* (the Fatimids).¹⁶⁰ Although she carefully surveyed many of the major sources, she found little evidence of these terms in works written by adherents of the dynasty. Further investigation by others has since turned up more information. These terms do, in fact, appear but more so, and more often, in the later phases of this rule. By the end of the dynasty it was fairly common to call it *al-dawla al-fāṭimiyya* ('the Fatimid state' or 'the Fatimid dynasty'), and thus later authors grew quite accustomed to this term.

Nevertheless, it is strikingly rare in the earliest documents produced by those who held positions of authority in the government, including most particularly the imams in their public pronouncements and declarations. The *khuṭba* would have been a natural occasion for its use. Yet only one of those we now have contains the word in a form that suggests an appropriate meaning. In the *khuṭba* that al-Qā'im dictated for his chief judge to read to the army in 333, while al-Mahdiyya remained under the siege of the Khārijite forces of Abū Yazid, his words addressed to the Kutāma appeal to them as the depository where God put the rights of the Fatimid line until it could be revealed once again. 'You were the cache,' it states, 'where God placed this Muḥammadan, Fāṭimid, *mahdī*-ist right [to the imamate] until He caused it to triumph and raised it high again.' The Arabic reads for the key terms: *al-ḥaqq al-muḥammadī al-fāṭimī al-mahdī*. Therefore it is certainly technically correct to say that the Fatimids called themselves 'Fatimid' from a quite early date. It would not have been used in this fashion otherwise. The terms *al-imām al-fāṭimī* and *al-fāṭimiyyīn* also appear in early pro-Fatimid poetry.¹⁶¹

Significantly, however, it appears in this one instance joined by two other adjectives, 'Muḥammadan' and '*mahdī*-ist' (*al-muḥammadī* and *al-mahdī*), either or both of which have the same claim to apply to the dynasty. The latter term *al-mahdī* or its plural *al-mahdiyyūn*/

al-mahdiyyīn, moreover, was, to judge from the *khuṭbas* and other surviving documents, the standard way these early Fatimids referred to themselves. The phrase *khulafā' al-rāshidīn al-mahdiyyīn*, 'the rightly guided *mahdī*-ist caliphs', was a part of the very first Fatimid *khuṭba*. Al-Qā'im in 302 asked for God's blessings on *al-khulafā' al-rāshidīn al-mahdiyyīn*. In al-Manṣūr's first *khuṭba* he uses the words *ibn al-mahdiyyīn* 'son of the *mahdīs*' for his grandfather. Later in the same sermon he cites *al-hudāt al-mahdiyyīn*, 'the rightly guided guides'. In a subsequent *khuṭba* he speaks of al-Mahdī as *wārith faḍl al-a'imma al-mahdiyyīn min ābā'ihī al-khulafā' al-rāshidīn*, 'the inheritor of the excellence of the *mahdī*-ist imams from his forefathers, the rightly guided caliphs'. In the same sermon he calls al-Mahdī 'the distinguished offspring of the rightly guided imams' (*najīb al-a'imma al-mahdiyyīn*). The phrase *al-a'imma al-mahdiyyīn* becomes standard in subsequent *khuṭbas*. And it appears regularly in many contexts—documents and *khuṭbas*—throughout the Fatimid period.

Strictly from this context then the terms 'Mahdī' (in the singular), 'Mahdīs' (plural), or 'Mahdīd' (adjective) might be more appropriate than 'Fatimid'. However, in its meaning simply as the 'rightly guided one(s)', it is fairly common and thus not uniquely Fatimid. Likewise, in its heightened sense wherein the *mahdī* is the person who will restore Islam and return it to its original form after a period—perhaps lengthy—of decay and degradation, it was applied reasonably often by several competing groups and dynasties. There were Umayyad *mahdīs* and Abbasid *mahdīs*, not to speak of those belonging to the Shi'a even before the rise of the Fatimids. It can also mean the messiah who appears at the end of time. Any of these meanings—and possibly all of them together—may have played a part in the Fatimid choice of the term, but in the *khuṭbas* it seems to represent the equivalent of *rāshidīn*, those persons who have the benefit of God's guidance in contrast to most others who do not. The implication is that humans should follow those, and only those, whom God provides with guidance. As a name of the dynasty, therefore, it hardly distinguishes the Fatimids from their opponents if both make the same claim about God's favouring them. Evidently, then, the term Fatimid—which certainly applies as is attested by its use in this one early *khuṭba*, added, in other *khuṭbas*, to the more frequent mentions of Fāṭima as the

mother ancestor of the imams—eventually became the name for the dynasty, in part because it readily set them apart from the competing caliphates of the Umayyads and the Abbasids.¹⁶²

Enemies

Many of the *khuṭbas* feature condemnations of various enemies of the Fatimids. The very earliest text requests God to ‘grant him [the imam] victory over Your apostate enemies (*a’dā’ika al-māriqīn*), and heal through him the breasts of the believers, conquer through him the easts of the land and its wests as You promised him, support him against the iniquitous rebels.’ Those who oppose the Fatimid cause are in fact enemies of God. That much is made clear again and again. In the earliest sermon by al-Manṣūr he says: ‘Bring down upon his [meaning his father, al-Qā’im’s] enemies, in the east and the west, on land and on the sea, the most severe assaults and retributions that You have done or caused to occur with any of those who were enemies of Yours, with destructive misfortune, dishonouring exemplary punishments; destroy them by annihilation and burn them in the fire of hell.’

The first *khuṭba* by al-Qā’im, which is, relative to the rest, quite early and thus attests to the attitude of the Fatimids at the beginning of their rule, is, in part, a case in point but with the extension of this idea to specific dynastic opponents, here the Abbasids and the Umayyads. Responding to the situation in which he was at the time, having invaded Abbasid Egypt, al-Qā’im castigates both the rulers in Baghdad and their predecessors, the Umayyads. Although he does not say so in this *khuṭba*, descendants of the Umayyads he denounces were still governing Spain and portions of far western North Africa. They thus remained to be overcome and defeated just like the Abbasids:

The lying apostate community, reneging on its intentions, deviating from the command of their Lord, suppose that it has been correct in

what it claims about its caliphs whom they insist are the caliphs of the Lord of the worlds, such as a youth not yet mature, like the boy lacking knowledge, or like the child who, according to their claim, governs Islam. And yet among them women bring them wine from every valley and region on the backs of horses and in the bottoms of ships. As God the Exalted said: 'They take their priests and monks as lords besides God' [9: 31]. They spend the funds of orphans and the poor, wrongly on their part and unjustly, for singing lute players, skilled *tunbūrists*, and *mi'zafānists*,¹⁶³ and talented drummers. You have seen their governors of cities, how one of them mounts the wooden pulpit of the Prophet's *minbar* to preach to the people but he does not preach to himself. Rather he descends from that position and inquires of those in that land for male and female singers, *tunbūrists*, *'ūd* players, thieves, short change artists, and shavers of weights so that those can be brought to serve him. God curses the unjust and prepares for them a blazing fire. That man is someone who neither commands the good nor prohibits the bad.

So much for the Abbasids. For the Umayyads he names specific names:

O God, curse Your enemies, the people who disobey You among the ancients and the later comers: the nation of Noah in the two worlds—truly they were an impious group—and 'Ād and Thamūd, and the Associates of al-Rass,¹⁶⁴ and the tyrants of the tribe of Umayya and tribe of Marwān, and Mu'āwiya b. Abī Sufyān, who took from Your servants the rightful share of dinars and dirhams, and waged war with them against the Emigrants and Helpers. Curse 'Amr b. al-Āṣ, ... [Here he lists fourteen more], and those who were faithless and deviant, the apostates, transgressors, and heretics, and those who put off [acknowledging 'Alī's succession] and those who refrained from going to war under the Commander of the Believers.

It should be noted that this list, by including the names of certain Umayyads or Umayyad supporters and not others, suggests that the enemies named are worse than those not mentioned. Al-Qā'im is

likely to have known what he was doing. He did not, for example, explicitly condemn Abū Bakr or 'Umar, the two earliest caliphs whom the Shi'a generally castigate vehemently, or the third caliph 'Uthmān, who was himself an Umayyad and usually considered an enemy. To invoke the curse of God on any of these three in Egypt at the time of this *khuṭba* would have provoked a strongly negative reaction. In contrast the men named, who al-Qā'im likens to a set of enemies cited in the Qur'an (the nation of Noah, 'Ād, Thamūd, and the Associates of al-Rass), were not even remotely as well regarded.

The other major enemy of the Fatimids in these early *khuṭbas* was the Khārījite rebel Abū Yazīd. The revolt of Abū Yazīd Makhlad b. Kaydād al-Nukkārī looms excessively large in the history of the Fatimids during the Maghribi period. It dominated the reigns of al-Qā'im and al-Manṣūr. No wonder then that the *khuṭbas* of that era focus on it. Abū Yazīd was for the Fatimids the Dajjāl, the arch-deceiver of the end of time apocalypse. Having brought to his side a force of anti-Fatimid Berbers, Abū Yazīd, himself an Ibāḍī Khārījī preacher and teacher, burst rather suddenly upon the scene in 332/943. Known as the 'Man on the Donkey' (*ṣāhib al-ḥimār*), he quickly defeated armies sent against him and ultimately laid siege to al-Mahdiyya in 333 and early 334 before retreating. Al-Qā'im died during this siege. Without announcing either the death or his own succession, al-Manṣūr led the pursuit of the fleeing rebel whom he finally captured only in Muḥarram 336 (August 947).¹⁶⁵

Abū Yazīd was already the main subject of the final *khuṭba* of al-Qā'im:

O people! Truly this accursed Nukkārī¹⁶⁶ has exacerbated his wickedness and his disease has infested the land. Deceptive hopes sustain him, and the soul that urges to evil prompts him to esteem lightly the favour of God the exalted to him; and the devil, who is his associate, intimates to him that he has no conqueror. But it is merely that the

Commander of the Believers loosens for him his reins in order to cause him to stumble in the abundance of his halter. So may God curse him with a calamitous curse and humiliate him with lengthy ignominy and make of him a blazing fire: 'None shall burn in it but the most wretched' [92: 15].

The accursed arch-deceiver has settled in front of you with a misled, erring party that does not draw on the light of true guidance. They are like startled [and heedless] cattle, figures that merely imitate the real, planks of wood propped up, frightened donkeys. If they stand in place, they are destroyed, and if they are called back, they are overtaken. Do not recoil after advancing! You are the party of God; they are the party of Satan. Your dead are in paradise; their dead are in hellfire.¹⁶⁷

Most of the *khuṭbas* by al-Manṣūr also have something to say about Abū Yazīd. They include his sermon for the festival of fast-breaking in 336, well after the rebellion had been crushed and the offender killed:

Praise be to God; You made Your servant victorious, against the hatred of the unbelievers, the minions of the cunning, depraved, profligates, the partisans of the lying arch deceiver [*aḥzāb al-Dajjāl*], the misguiding object of anger, the filthy and unclean, the contemptible and wretched, the damned and infamous, those accursed throughout the earth and heaven.¹⁶⁸

God, the mighty and glorious, ... illuminated the hearts of the believers following upon the darkness, and the cessation of hope due to the length of the period of tribulation with the great sedition and its horrors, and its chaos and its convulsions, black darkneses, deaf blindnesses, ignorant barbarism, due to the hypocritical arch deceiver and his apostate partisans, the enemies of religion, and supporters of the accursed Iblīs. ... There was, thanks to God and His favour against our enemies, a trial that blinded them, made them deaf, led them astray, caused their apostasy, ruined them, made them degenerate, debased, dishonoured, while we and our friends had an ordeal that secured for us recompense and treasure, and brought about might and glory. Its means were vile but its results noble. Since God, the Mighty and Glorious, wanted the

renewal of our dynasty and our might and to show His favour to us, His being burdened with our victory, and the testing of our friends, and the destruction of our enemies, so that when the end of it arrived and it had reached the furthestmost degree, the satan came out hopeless, uttering rants, his fire blazing, his persistence continuing. Having been aroused to anger over his transgressors, God allowed retribution among them by giving control to His servant and appointing him to the task. Thus did God clear up its darkness and cast light on its blackness, open its denseness, and avert the distress of it, through me and by my hand, as a mark of esteem by which God singled me out, an excellence whose nobility He bestowed on me, a favour for me to store up. ...

Prior to that, swords were unsheathed, so He broke them; soldiers advanced toward me, so He defeated them; the armies of unbelief made common cause against me, so He left them in the lurch; eyes aspired after me, so He effaced them; heads were raised, so He made them bow down; noses were turned up in disdain, so He abased them; cheeks became contemptuous, so He made them humble.¹⁶⁹

Death and loss: fathers and imams

Two of our surviving *khuṭbas* announce formally the death of the previous imam. It was Fatimid policy to delay such revelations until the situation on the ground was calm and stable. In the first instance al-Manṣūr in fact waited for his sermon on the festival of fast-breaking in 336, almost two full years after the loss of his father, although by then surely everyone knew. It may therefore be significant that he speaks of having lost both his father and his grandfather:

May the peace of God and His blessings, benedictions, salutations, and charity (*zakiyyāt*) be on you both, O Commanders of the Believers, O you two caliphs of the Lord of the universe, O you two sons of the *mahdī*-ists' guidance, O father, O grandfather, O sons of Muḥammad, the Messenger of God! ... He imposed on me in losing you both, patience ... the misfortune and flow of tears over me, O father, O Muḥammad, O Abu'l-Qāsim, O mountain, O what longing, O what agony!

...I am not in doubt as to the choice of God for you and His transporting you to the abode of His favour and residence of His mercy, which provides accommodations for Muḥammad, His Messenger, your grandfather, as well as the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, your father, and Fāṭima, the radiant virgin, your mother, and your pure righteous *mahdī*-ist forefathers. But the grief of the grief-stricken is a spur to sorrows, causing tears in the eyes.

In the second case al-Mu'izz reveals his father's death in the first and only full *khuṭba* we have from him:

O God, single out the excellent imam, ... Abu'l-Ṭāhir al-Manṣūr bika, ... he whom You have made us miserable by his loss and left us alone after him. You have separated us from him and made us grieve. ...

Truly, the distress and severe agony due to you O my father, O master, O Ismā'īl, O Abu'l-Ṭāhir, O sea of the knowledge of the chaste imams, of *mahdī*-ist guidance, O remnant of the sons of the Messenger and sons of the Legatee and the immaculate lady, O imam of the community and key of the door to mercy, O lamp of right guidance, sun of mankind, he who casts light in the deep darkness, O he whom God made special by swift favours, painful for us by God who are afflicted by you. The misfortune is great; because of losing you consolation does not exist, and tongues fail in enumerating your excellences or counting your virtues. So, by Him who singled you out with His mark of honour and presented you with the abundance of His gifts, ennobled you with the parentage of His messenger, were it not for what You inspire in me because of him and confirm for me as to upholding the truth of God and defending the community of your forefather, the messenger of God, rescuing them from the flood of ignorance, the sea of error, abysses of disorder, and the wreckage of misfortunes, ... if it were not for that I would strike my face as a traveller in the land, loathing a place of rest, being content with a bag full of provisions, so that death should quickly take me to you, and thereby to gain for me nearness to you and the mercy of your Lord.

But instead I ponder, observe, and govern. I see for me no other way except patience and consideration, and that I claim your position and acquire your nobility, and so I endure. My Lord makes me patient and so I am patient. Conviction overcomes me and so I forbear.

Pilgrimage

Among the smaller details of individual *khuṭbas*, one with potential importance is al-Mu'izz's expressed intention to perform the pilgrimage to Mecca and Medina, which he makes public in the following passage, and which we can confirm from other reports. It is a hope he was never allowed to fulfil.

O God! ... Provide me the means to visit his [Muḥammad's] tomb and mount his *minbar*, stay in his house, and perform the pilgrimage to Your sacred house, and with our banners halt at these majestic shrines.¹⁷⁰

Miscellaneous themes

The surviving *khuṭbas* contain many other lesser details, elements of public policy, advice, comments, and good wishes. Some examples follow.

On the duties and rights of the imamate:

God said: 'O you who believe, obey God and obey the Messenger and those with authority among you' [4: 59]. Thus He makes obedience a duty, attaching it to obedience to the regulators of His affairs. They are the ones who uphold, on behalf of God, His truth and those who summon to him whoever desires to obey Him. He singled them out by the imamate, which is the highest of the ranks below prophecy. He prescribed for the servants rights due them and ordered them to fulfil these. He stipulated that they are connected to obeying him, doubling their reward on the measure of how well they follow those whose authority is ordained. The imam has not the option to reduce the rights of his flock, nor is the flock to decrease the rights of their imam. Among the rights of the flock against their imam is the maintaining of the Book of God and the Sunna of His prophet, may God bless him and his family, and restitution from those who treat them unjustly for those so treated, and from the powerful among them for the weak, from the noble of them for the lowly, investigating their manner of life and the differing conditions of it, looking solicitously upon his dependants in his efforts, watching

over them with his eye. For He, great and glorious is He, concerning what He praised of the character of His prophet and His messenger said: 'There has come to you a messenger from among yourselves; a sorrow that befalls you grieves him; he is anxious concerning you; with the believers he is kind and compassionate' [9:128]. When he does that, the flock should revere him, honour him and extend assistance to him, standing prepared and ready, on behalf of what is right according to the book of God and the Sunna of His prophet, may God bless him and his family.¹⁷¹

On taxes:

...there will not be collected from you in the years to come other than the tenth and the alms tax: food stuffs for food stuffs, sheep from small cattle, oxen from bovines, mature camels from camels (*al-ba'ir min al-ibil*), in accord with the laws of God, may He be exalted, and the practice of my grandfather, the messenger of God.¹⁷²

On the end of Ramaḍān alms (*zakāt al-fiṭr*):

God has imposed on you an alms tax in your breaking the fast and it follows the practice of your Prophet, the lord of the prophets. So let each man among you contribute on behalf of his dependants, the males among them and the females, the young and the old, a *ṣā'*¹⁷³ of wheat or a *ṣā'* of barley, or a *ṣā'* of dates, all these of his own food, not of anything not eaten or contributed from something else. Truly, that is forbidden him and there is no reward for it.¹⁷⁴

So draw close to God in this day of yours by rendering the fast-breaking alms, which is the *zakāt* of your fast, and is the Sunna of your prophet, the lord of the prophets. Each man of you for himself and for each individual of his household, males and females, young and old, [contributes] half a *ṣā'* of wheat, or a *ṣā'* of barley, or a *ṣā'*

of dates,¹⁷⁵ from the food of your own household and not from elsewhere. Otherwise it is unacceptable. Pray frequently and be consciously alert and expectant.¹⁷⁶

On the sacrifices for the ʿĪd al-naḥr:

Most truly this day of yours is a sacred day during a sacred month, made more significant than other days, a day of the greater pilgrimage, in which God tested Abraham, His friend. He was redeemed in it from slaughtering his son, and God imposed the obligation on the whole people of Islam of pilgrimage to His sacred house, which He made a refuge for the people and a place of safety. So draw closer to God in it by means of what He has commanded you to do. The most worthy of what brings you to Him is the female of the camel, and the female of cattle, and the ram of sheep. Steer clear of sick animals and those with defects in the eyes or ears, and those of them deformed by excess in its creation or missing something. They will not be accepted on your part. That is in accord with the practice of your Prophet, and the imams among his pure progeny.¹⁷⁷

Servants of God! Truly, this day of yours is a day of the feast God enjoins for the glorification and honouring of Him.... He made it a marker of the time for the pilgrimage to His sacred house and venerable ancient place. The gates of heaven open during it to receive prayers. So pray to God most sincerely and implore Him wishfully, approaching with what He commands you to do or restrained you from. From livestock of small cattle—and the most excellent of them is the female of the camel, the female of bovines, the ram of sheep—and he who sacrifices the young of a goat, for that he will not be rewarded, but for a young ram he will be. All animals slaughtered prior to the prayer are permissible meat, and after the prayer are acceptable sacrifice. The perfection of the sacrificed animal is soundness of eyes and ears. Avoid the sick one and the deformed, either in having extra limbs or not having some. Sharpen the blade for this purpose and treat the animal gently while slaughtering. 'So when they are down slaughtered on their sides, eat of them and feed he who is readily satisfied and the indigent' [22: 36]. Preserve

and praise God. 'Their meat does not reach God or their blood but the God-fearing piety of yours reaches Him' [22: 37], 'In that way have We made animals subject to you that you may render thanks' [22: 36].¹⁷⁸

On the sword Dhu'l-Fiḡār:

According to Fatimid accounts the fabled sword Dhu'l-Fiḡār that the Prophet had given 'Alī, and the possession of which the Shi'a regard as an important sign of legitimacy, was restored to them during the reign of al-Qā'im after it was liberated from the Abbasids in Baghdad. Al-Manṣūr would later carry it into his battles with Abū Yazīd.¹⁷⁹ Here in a *khuṭba* he characterizes his father as the 'heir of the sword of his grandfather Dhu'l-Fiḡār'.

O God, bless Muḥammad Abu'l-Qāsim, the Imam al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, son of al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, bearer of the proof of the Almighty, patron of the pious, the sharp sword of God and heir of the sword of his grandfather Dhu'l-Fiḡār, a blessing bestowing the prayer of those who pray, hoisted into the heights of heaven, enduring forever among those who have passed before, abiding endlessly until the day of judgment.¹⁸⁰

On *jihād* and the exile of war:

Having been forced away from his home in pursuit of the rebels, al-Manṣūr comments on the hardship his *jihād* has imposed on him:

O God, You have sent me out of the land, an emigrant from the place of rest, in order to accomplish the duty of holy war that You imposed on me, on Your behalf and in support of Your religion, and the fortification of the community of Your apostle.¹⁸¹

On the Kutāma:

The Kutāma tribesmen formed the backbone of the army for many years after the establishment of the caliphate. Most of them, moreover, were Ismaili, having been fully converted long before at the hands of Abū ‘Abdallāh al-Shī‘ī. They were thus not just Muslims but quite loyal Ismailis as well. Even when the Fatimids benefited from the support of additional Berber groups, such as the Ṣanhāja who were behind the Zīrids but who were themselves never Ismaili, the Kutāma continued to provide a critically important element both in the military and the general population. In the following passage, as in another noted earlier, the Imam voices his gratitude to them and asks for God’s special blessings on them in particular:

O people of our *da‘wa*, O supporters of our dynasty, O Kutāma!

Praise God and thank Him for that of His favours with which He singles you out, and the vastness of His beneficence. He gives preference in that over all of humans in the west and the east. He, the Mighty and Glorious, puts you first with the greatest favour, and then He attaches to you a magnificent beneficence, and He follows those two with such an abundance of grace to you that they cannot be counted. He made you see while the people were blind, and He informed you while the populace was ignorant. While servants were led astray, He guided you to His religion, to the triumph of His truth and obedience to His friend, the way-marker of guidance, the lamp in the darkness, the pole of religion, His firm rope. In precedence He raised you to His help, in pursuit of obeying Him, seeking shade in the shadow of His dynasty, being illuminated in the light of His wisdom, to the point that should God decree the convulsion of the county, the servants put to the test, darkness enveloping the earth, feet trembling, calamities magnifying, distress growing stronger, hearts aggrieved, God renders you immune. And He guides your hearts, firms up your feet, ... those of you alive are happy and your dead are martyrs ‘finding their sustenance with their Lord’ [3: 169]. Congratulations to you; rejoice! ...

O God, truly have I come to be pleased with the Kutāma because of their holding firmly to Your rope and, in devotion to us, their having patience through misery and adversity for Your sake, acknowledging our precedence, carrying out that which God

imposed on the servants because of us in order to reach You by obedience to us.

O God! Approve them, multiply their goodness, erase their wickedness, gather them up among the group of Your prophet to whom they are indebted, and Your friend to whom they are loyal. Leave unchanged Your favour upon them, nay complete it for them. Perfect Your charity to them, and keep their posterity in power. Give their reward liberally and guide them. Purify their hearts.¹⁸²

The next section of this book contains the full text of the sermons from which these few excerpts come, with more details and a greater opportunity to see how each *khuṭba* develops, what rhetorical devices and strategies operate in them, and how each of the speakers makes his case both to God and to his public. Ultimately, of course, the translations fail to convey the effect of the original Arabic. Qur'anic allusions and skilful use of rhyme, for example, heightened the thrust and flow of the words, adding meaning and resonance no rendering in another language can quite match. It should be remembered that these sermons were meant to be heard, not read; they are pieces of oral literature, not unlike poetry. But, in contrast to verse, as the speech of the imams, the divinely inspired leader of the community, for that same community they carried a spiritual consequence of far greater significance.

PART TWO

The *Khutbas*

Khuṭba of al-Qā'im

On the 'Īd al-fiṭr, 302 (19 April 915) at Alexandria

[‘And when it was the feast of fast-breaking and al-Qā'im, who was then staying in Alexandria, he, God bless him, went out and prayed the prayer of the feast with the people for the year just mentioned; and he delivered the *khuṭba* of the feast at Alexandria. He said:’]¹⁸³

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate; in Him is our recourse. God is great; God is great; there is no god but God.

God is great; God is great. There is no authority other than His; there can be no obedience to anyone who disobeys Him. ‘Is not the curse of God on the evildoers who block the path of God, wishing to make it crooked’ [11: 18–19], and ‘who kill those of the people who uphold justice’ [3: 21]?

Praise God, the All-knowing Creator, the All-wise Regulator, ‘who possesses the keys of the heavens and the earth’ [39: 63],¹⁸⁴ ‘He who has power over all things’ [5: 120].¹⁸⁵ ‘There is no intimate discourse among three but that He is the fourth of them; no five but He is the sixth of them; nor fewer than that or more but He is with them wherever they are’ [58: 7]. His power and His knowledge encompasses them and ‘they comprehend nothing of His knowledge except what He allows’ [2: 255]. ‘And faces will be humbled before the Living, the Self-sustaining, and those who tolerate injustice will despair’ [20: 111]. He is the first prior to all time and season, place, limit and extent. He is the Kind One, the Expert, who ‘created the heavens absent of pillars

you can see' [31: 10]. Then He separated its lights, illuminating its sun, brightening its moon, unleashing its wellsprings, 'and the earth after that spread out; He brought out of it its water and its pastures' [79: 30–31]. So glory be to Him who is not indicated other than by His signs and what flows from His earth and in His heavens; He makes clear to His creation His governance and the complete perfection of His messengers sent to the nations, to the whole body of those who serve Him, when He said to them: Truly God is 'the Creator of the heavens and the earth; it is He who summons you in order to forgive you your sins and defer you to a term defined' [14: 10].

O people, I reach out to this community of yours just as the Messenger of God, may God bless and keep him, reached out to the Jews and the Christians, who had with them the Torah and the Gospels, churches and synagogues. He, may God bless and keep him, summoned them to the fulfilment of the knowledge that was in the Torah and the Gospels but they would not believe it. So he imposed on them the sword and the poll-tax and captivity, plunder and exile. In the same way I reach out to this community of yours which has taken your Qur'an in vain. You have thrown it behind your backs and sold it for a paltry price.¹⁸⁶ And so I say to you:

'O people of the book, you stand on nothing unless you uphold the Torah and the Gospels and what has come down to you from your Lord' [5: 68]. 'O people of the book, come to common terms between us and you that we not worship any but God and not associate with Him anything and not take some of us as lords over others except God Himself' [3: 64]. You accuse me of being a rebel bent on spreading heresy. You witnessed my effort and fighting and that God is my supporter and helper. I observe the inhabitants of the cities; they pray against me in their mosques. God, the Great and Glorious, is the One who questions their words: 'they think they stand on something but they are instead liars' [58: 18]. The lying apostate community, reneging on its intentions,¹⁸⁷ deviating from the command of their Lord, suppose that it has been correct in what it claims about its caliphs whom they insist are the caliphs of the Lord of the worlds, such as a

youth not yet mature, or like the boy lacking knowledge, or like the child who, according to their claim, governs Islam.¹⁸⁸ And yet among them a woman brings them wine from every valley and region on the backs of horses and in the bottoms of ships. As God the Exalted said: 'They take their priests and monks as lords besides God' [9: 31]. They spend the funds of orphans and the poor, wrongly on their part and unjustly, for singing lute players, skilled *ṭunbūr*ists and *mi'zafān*ists,¹⁸⁹ and talented drummers. You have seen their governors of cities, how one of them mounts the wooden planks of the Prophet's *minbar* to preach to the people but he does not preach to himself. Instead, he descends from that position and inquires of those in that land for male and female singers, *ṭunbūr*ists, *ūd* players, thieves, short change artists, and shavers of weights so that those can be brought to serve him. God curses the unjust and prepares for them a blazing fire.¹⁹⁰ That man is someone who neither commands the good nor prohibits the bad.

It is so bad that when the weak and poor servant of God stood up to summon them to God, 'they formed around him a swarm' [72: 19], 'from every side slipping away' [211: 96], and from every hard ground flowing in torrents. Are the servants of God thereby going forward to what God the Exalted summons in His book? Certainly not! God is He whom there is no god but He; 'Rather, We strike with the truth against the false, which causes it to shatter, and it disappears; woe to you for what you describe' [21: 18].

O people, truly you have fallen into an iniquitous blindness and a dark blackness, overwhelmed by a calamity that carries you into another calamity; it has led you astray by its heretical delusions and overcome you with its pernicious atmosphere. You are floating in its misfortune, drowning in its ideology, its doors locked against you, its reasons become obscure, the guide-markers of your religion obliterated, the works of your prophet effaced, the abomination among you obvious. And the acceptable is with you extinct. Where is it you are headed? To the hellfire from which you cannot withdraw? Will you

therefore be among those rewarded or those punished? Will you give thanks to God for His favour, because it is His proof on you? In the matter of His religion what protects and defends the sanctity of His prophet, may God bless him and his family? And who saves you from destruction? God said: 'O you who believe, obey God and obey the Messenger and those with authority among you' [4: 59]. Thus He makes obedience a duty, attaching it to obedience to the regulators of His affairs. They are the ones who uphold, on behalf of God, His truth and those who summon to him whoever desires to obey Him. He singled them out by the imamate, which is the highest of the ranks below prophecy. He prescribed for the servants rights due them and ordered them to fulfil these. He stipulated that they are connected to obeying him, doubling their reward on the measure of how well they follow those whose authority is ordained. The imam has not the option to reduce the rights of his flock, nor is the flock to decrease the rights of their imam. Among the rights of the flock against their imam is the maintenance of the Book of God and the Sunna of His prophet, may God bless him and his family, and restitution from those who treat them unjustly for those so treated, and from the powerful among them for the weak, from the noble of them for the lowly, investigating their manner of life and the differing conditions of it, looking solicitously upon his dependants in his efforts, watching over them with his eye. For He, great and glorious is He, concerning what He praised of the character of His prophet and His messenger said: 'There has come to you a messenger from among yourselves; a sorrow that befalls you grieves him; he is anxious concerning you; with the believers he is kind and compassionate' [9:128]. When he does that, the flock should revere him, honour him, and extend assistance to him, standing prepared and ready, on behalf of what is right according to the Book of God and the Sunna of His prophet, may God bless him and his family.

'O God, Creator of the heavens and the earth, of the world of the unseen and the visible, You judge among Your servants in matters about which they disagree' [39: 46]. O God, bless al-Mahdī bi-llāh Abū Muḥammad, the Commander of the Believers, just as You blessed and favoured the rightly guided *mahdī*-ist successors who upheld the truth and dispensed justice in accord with it. O God, just

as You made them the succour for religion, and for the servants a sanctuary and a comfort, gladden the believers through him. Support him against Your insubordinately hypocritical, unbelieving, apostate, iniquitous enemies, God of creation, Lord of the worlds.

O God, grant victory to our troops and armies, in the eastern regions of the earth and in the western, on its land and its sea, its plains and its mountains. O God, curse Your enemies, the people who disobey You among the ancients and the later comers: the nation of Noah in the two worlds¹⁹¹—truly they were an impious group¹⁹²—and ‘Ād and Thamūd, and the Associates of al-Rass,¹⁹³ and the tyrants of the tribe of Umayya and tribe of Marwān,¹⁹⁴ and Mu‘āwiya b. Abī Sufyān,¹⁹⁵ who took from Your servants the rightful share¹⁹⁶ of dinars and dirhams, and waged war with them against the Emigrants and Helpers. Curse ‘Amr b. al-‘Āṣ, ‘Utba b. Abī Sufyān,¹⁹⁷ al-Walid b. ‘Utba,¹⁹⁸ al-Walid b. Abī Mu‘ayt,¹⁹⁹ and that lizard son of a lizard—namely Marwān b. al-Ḥakam²⁰⁰—and al-Mughīra b. Shu‘ba,²⁰¹ Ziyād

Khuṭba of al-Qā'im

Rajab 333 (March 945). During the siege of al-Mahdiyya.
Read by al-Marwadhī

[‘And the Imam al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, Commander of the Believers, may God bless him, dictated a sermon in which he exhorted the believers, and he ordered al-Marwadhī, his qadi in al-Mahdiyya, to read it to them. He said in it, following the praising of God the Exalted and honouring Him and the blessing for the Prophet Muḥammad, may the blessings of God be upon him and his family, the pure ones:’]²¹¹

O people! Truly this accursed Nukkārī²¹² has exacerbated his wickedness and his disease has infested the land. Deceptive hopes sustain him, and the soul that urges to evil²¹³ prompts him to esteem lightly the favour of God the Exalted to him; and the devil, who is his associate, intimates to him²¹⁴ that he has no conqueror. But it is merely that the Commander of the Believers loosens for him his reins in order to cause him to stumble in the abundance of his halter. So may God curse him with a calamitous curse and humiliate him with lengthy ignominy and make of him a blazing fire:²¹⁵ ‘None shall burn in it but the most wretched’ [92: 15].²¹⁶

You have done, O men of Kutāma, what your fathers and veterans among your forbearers did as required for obedience and adhering to its bonds and taking shade in its shadow. And fighting for God

with the effort due Him. You were the cache where God placed this Muḥammadan, Fāṭimid, *mahdī*-ist right until He caused it to triumph, raising it high again. He made of you its pride and its glory. You are like the Apostles of Jesus and the Anṣār of Muḥammad, may God bless them both.

O sons of the Emigrants and the Anṣār, those who came first²¹⁷ and before, who were most intimate, was it not through you that God ended the dynasties of the tyrants, which had passed its long period of years, until He made them into a crop that withers away?²¹⁸ 'Did He not cause you to inherit their land and estates' [33: 27]; and thus it was that you commenced to conquer after having been conquered?

The accursed arch-deceiver has settled in front of you with a misled, erring party that does not draw on the light of true guidance. They are like startled [and heedless] cattle, figures that merely imitate the real, planks of wood propped up,²¹⁹ frightened donkeys.²²⁰ If they stand in place, they are destroyed, and if they are called back, they are overtaken. Do not recoil after advancing! You are the party of God; they are the party of Satan.²²¹ Your dead are in paradise; their dead are in hellfire. So which truth other than this truth would you seek? With which imam other than your imam would you fight?

Fight, may God have mercy on you, the partisans of error, jackals of greed, moths of the fire, and pursue them to the ends of the earth, the extremities of the land, on every horizon, until God makes right the truth and wrong the false, even though the polytheists abhor it.²²²

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr

As *walī li'l-‘ahd* (Heir-apparent) on the ‘Īd al-fiṭr, 334
(6 May 946) at al-Mahdiyya

[‘When the day of fast-breaking arrived, al-Manṣūr bi-llāh Abu’l-Ṭāhir Ismā‘īl b. Abī’l-Qāsim al-Qā’im bi-Amr Allāh, peace be upon him, went out from his palace surrounded by his sons, his brothers, his followers, his loyal friends, the adherents of his government, and his servants. The people raised their voices in supplication to him and asked God that He turn against his enemy and forsake him. Banners were unfurled and drums beaten. Happiness filled hearts and delighted breast. The stars of good fortune had risen indicating, by their appearing, the fate of the friends of God. When he reached the *muṣallā*, he prayed the festival prayer and then rose up as the preacher and said:’]²²³

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God who is so good to us in His provisions and grants bountifully in His giving. I praise Him with the praise of one who is grateful for His goodness, and who follows in all matters what pleases Him. I seek His help with the resort of he who expects nothing from any one else and does not put faith in anything other than Him, who is answerable to Him alone from start to finish.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, and I testify that Muḥammad was His servant and His messenger, chosen by Him for His revelation, selected by Him to convey His messages. He was for that purpose sent as the summoner to the truth, a witness for creation. Thus did he transmit the message of his Lord and advise His servants, exerting himself on His behalf.

May the blessings of God be upon the Prophet, the chosen one, the approved messenger. And on his family be His peace, His mercy and His benediction.

Servants of God! This day of yours is a day of festival. God honours it and makes it important; He gives preference to it and exalts it; by it He closes the month of Ramaḍān and opens through it the pilgrimage to His noble house. Be faithful in it to your intentions and in it submit your requests to God. Seek forgiveness for your sins. Truly He whose praise is glorious and His names are sacred, says: 'Ask your Lord to forgive you; most certainly He is most forgiving' [71: 10]. Fear God, you servants of God! In fearing Him lies the success of those who seek and the triumph of those who win. And that is the counsel of God to those who came before and those who come after. Persist in obeying Him. Be heedful of what God the Exalted entrusted to you as His religion and His book, and has you observe of His rights and His penalties. What He causes you to desire of the bounty of His rewards and the nobility of His place of return, or He causes you to dread of His penalties and the pain of His punishment, '[for that] toil as the strivers should' [37: 61].

God inspires us and you with our guidance, and make us and you be resolved on fearing Him, following His guidance and attaining His approval.

[He, on whom be peace, sat briefly and then stood up and said:]

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God who bestows favours liberally, who crushes enemies, who deserves thanks and praise. God blesses with the most excellent of His blessings the most excellent of His prophets, Muḥammad, the seal of the prophets and lord of the messengers. [Bless] his pure family. O God, bless Muḥammad and the family of Muḥammad; have mercy on Muḥammad and the family of Muḥammad. Bless Muḥammad and the family of Muḥammad just as the most excellent of Your blessings, Your sanction, and Your mercy, fell on Abraham and the family of Abraham, 'Truly You are worthy of praise and glory' [11: 73].²²⁴

O God! bless also the sun of guidance by whose radiance Islam is made to shine, dispelling the darkness, empowering religion, completing favours for the believers, the servant of God, Abū Muḥammad, the Imam, the Commander of the Believers, al-Mahdī bi-llāh, son of the Rightly Guided Ones (*al-Mahdiyyīn*), the noble son of the most noble. May God and His angels bless him; may God honour his dwelling place near to Him, in noble mansions²²⁵ and gardens of enduring bliss.²²⁶

O God, bless as well the one who holds power, the heir to glory and honour, through whom You increased Your benevolence, and bestowed Your favours profusely. You clothed him in the vestments of high nobility and crowned him with regal splendour and the caliphate. You combined in him the succession to those prophets who were sent as messengers with the inheritance of his fathers, the imams who succeeded, the rightly guiding guides, the chosen legatees, Muḥammad al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, the Commander of the Believers.

O God, appraise him about what You have appointed him to do and have put him in charge of. Safeguard him in it and have confidence in him, with the most excellent of that which You have appraised any before him among Your deputies, the imams of guidance, his fathers, the rightly guided ones, by way of support, empowerment, inspiration, and the achievement of victory. Bring down upon his enemies, in the east and the west, on land and on the sea, the most severe assaults and retributions that You have done or caused to occur with any of those who were enemies of Yours, a destructive misfortune, dishonouring exemplary punishments. Destroy them by annihilation and burn them in the fire of hell.

O God, make religion victorious through him, and validate him with dominion and authority, grandeur and power, conquest and victory. Make his word lofty,²²⁷ his hand far reaching, his army dominant,²²⁸ and his partisans those who triumph.²²⁹ Grant him a manifest

victory,²³⁰ empower religion through him, and through him restore to good health the breasts of the believers,²³¹ God of creation, Lord of the worlds. ‘Truly, You are He who hears prayers’ [3: 38] and You do as You will;²³² ‘You do not go back on promises made’ [3: 194].

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr

On Friday, 14 Muḥarram 335 (16 August 946). Read by Ja‘far b. ‘Alī, the Chamberlain, in the Mosque of Qayrawān

[‘The Imam, peace be upon him, ordered Ja‘far b. ‘Alī, the servant of his grandfather al-Mahdī bi-llāh, to the congregational mosque of Qayrawān. There he performed the Friday prayer and then rose for the *khuṭba*. He praised God and extolled Him; and asked for blessings on the Prophet and on his family, and on his legatee and the pure imams among his offspring. He thanked God profusely for the victory He had granted to His friends and the degradation and subjugation He had visited on His enemies, what trials and tribulation God had thereby removed from the people of Islam, both from the elite and the masses, the townsfolk and the bedouin, and what had now come to them in the way of peace and security. Then he said:’]²³³

O people assembled! Our lord and master, the Amir Ismā‘īl [al-Manṣūr bi-llāh], may God prolong his duration, cause his power to persist, and strengthen his dominion, extends greetings and says to you: God, may He be hallowed, has known the goodness of my intentions toward you, what fine thoughts I harbour for you, and what benefits for your affairs I wish, what I find in myself of sadness when affliction befalls you, what comes upon you of want and the loss of selves and property. Most surely I have many splendid hopes I hold out in expectation for you that nothing prevents from being revealed but this enemy before me, and my fight with him, and these

events that have transpired between him and me. So if we reveal what we had hoped for you in the way of good things prior to victory, the ignorant would say: he does that in an attempt to generate sympathy in the hearts of the flock and out of fear for the enemy. Given that God has bestowed on us the favour you know about, and the support of His for us that you have seen, and granted victory to us against His enemies by His gifts and His power, I want to match the gifts of God, the Glorious and All-high, to us by thanks to Him and by good deeds to His servants and kindness to His creatures, and to announce some of what we intend in regard to you even though announcing it at the moment of victory is preferable and before that is more open to doubts, for the reason which I mentioned.

So the Commander, may God give him strength, has relinquished the dues incumbent on you in the coming year—that is, the year 335²³⁴—and the alms taxes, and all the obligations, and he does that for all of the people, Muslims among them as well as the protected peoples, out of kindness to them, and to aid them in refurbishing their land and steppes. So let those who witness this convey it to those who are absent. Let each bedouin among you return to his steppe without suffering heavy loss or expenditure. Subsequently, there will not be collected from you in the years to come other than the tenth and the alms tax: food stuffs for food stuffs, sheep from small livestock, oxen from bovines, mature camels from camels (*al-ba'ir min al-ibil*), in accord with the laws of God, may He be exalted, and the practice of my grandfather, the Messenger of God, may God bless him and keep him. Subsequently, those things by which the gifts of God enhance you will be conveyed to you though acts of beneficence, the emerging of justice, the resurgence of the truth, the defeat of falsehood, and you will come to recognize thereby the blessedness of our days and the prosperity of our dynasty, should God so will.

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr

On the ʿĪd al-fiṭr, 335 (25 April 947). During the siege of
Abū Yazīd at Kiyāna

[‘And when it was Sunday the first day of the month of Shawwāl of the year 335, he (al-Manṣūr), peace be upon him, rode to the *muṣallā* that he had constructed, and he prayed with the people the ʿīd prayer and mounted the *minbar* and delivered the *khuṭba*. He said:’]²³⁵

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

‘Praise be to God who created the heavens and the earth, and made the darkness and the light; yet those who do not believe regard others as equal’ [6: 1], a god worshipped and a lord praised. We take none other than Him as God and we do not associate with Him anything.

Praise be to God who ‘holds up the heaven that it not fall to the earth other than by His leave; truly God is kind and compassionate with the people’ [22: 65].

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God. And God is great! Praise be to God! ‘Glory be to our Lord; indeed the promise of our Lord has been fulfilled’ [17: 108]. ‘Glory be to God when the evening falls and when the day dawns; His praise is in the heavens and the earth, at nightfall and when it is noontime’ [30: 17–18]. ‘Glory be to your Lord, the Lord of power, over what they ascribe to Him; peace be on the messengers and praise be to God, the Lord of the worlds’ [37: 180–182].

Praise be to God, the First, the Eternal, who never ceases to be, the Last, perpetual, who never changes, the all-wise knower who never does not know, the munificent benefactor who is never stingy

His mercy encompasses all things²³⁶ so that none despair of obtaining it except those who go astray;²³⁷ He brings into being His creation for the worship of Him such that no one refuses to do it except the depraved. Proof of Him is established by the wonderful indications of Him which are such that they cannot be denied except by the infidels. Souls are submissive before Him in their glorification and hearts yield willingly to Him in their humility. Vision turns away from what it desires short of Him and, in its impotence, surrenders to His all-mighty power. Intellects testify to Him through their innate character that He, as He describes Himself, is the Alive, the Everlasting: 'drowsiness does not overtake Him nor sleep' [2: 255],²³⁸ 'nothing is like him' [42: 11], 'no vision apprehends Him yet He apprehends all visions, and He is the Kind and All-knowing' [6: 103]. His praise is glory; His names sacred; His brilliance powerful; His splendour exalted.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, and I testify that Muḥammad was His servant and His chosen messenger, His approved trustee. He sent him with the radiant light and decisive proof to the whole of His creation, bearing witness to those of the messengers who came before him and asserting the truth of the books in his hands, an indication of God, a summons to Him, of the intermission in the time between messengers and the interruption in the revelation, the obliteration of the truth, and the going astray of the people, so that he then conveys on behalf of God His message, complies with His command,²³⁹ and summons to the way of his Lord with wisdom and fine exhortation,²⁴⁰ striving for God with the true striving due Him. Providing security to His servants, he served his Lord until the certainty²⁴¹ overtook him, God bless him among those who were first and those who were later. [Bless also] his family, the pure and the chaste, the chosen legatees, the most distinguished rightly guided ones.

I urge upon you the worship of God by fearing God, He whom you cannot do without, nor is there a refuge for you other than with Him, in dying or in living, not in the afterlife nor in this world. Sacrifice yourselves in what He wants and approves. It brings you nearer to Him.

Truly, this is a day God made for you as a festival and ceremony, in which the fasting comes to an end and the months of pilgrimage commence. So make your souls answerable, may God have mercy on you! He who speaks of good let him praise God and let him increase it; he who speaks of shortcomings let him ask for censure, or of shame, and let him repent. Verily God the Exalted 'Accepts repentance from His servants and forgives sins; and He knows what you do' [42: 25].

God has imposed on you an alms tax in your breaking the fast and it follows the practice of your Prophet, the lord of the prophets, may God bless him and his family. So let each man among you contribute on behalf of his dependants, the males among them and the females, the young and the old, a *ṣā'* of wheat or a *ṣā'* of barley, or a *ṣā'* of dates,²⁴² all these of his own food, not of anything not eaten or contributed from something else. Truly, that is forbidden him and there is no reward for it.

May God protect us and you through devotion and employ us and you in doing what He wants and is pleasing to Him. Make our next life better for us and for you than the first.²⁴³

[The second *khutba*:]²⁴⁴

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, the one who unifies by His overlordship, the one who is alone in His absolute unity, the First, eternal, the Living, everlasting. I praise Him with His praises, all of them for the least of His favours and for the great, a praise requiring praise for praise, for the good fortune from Him and the guidance.

And I testify that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, in fidelity to His absolute oneness and in acknowledgement of His lordship.

I bear witness that Muḥammad was His servant, chosen by Him, and His messenger whom He sent. His prophecy is complete with revelation and the announcement of the proof is in the truth of his message, may God bless him and keep him, and raise high his renown, give him peace and honour.

O you people! Truly God orders you in a command in which He begins with Himself, then makes a doublet of it with His angels. He said: 'Truly God and His angels give their blessings to the Prophet, O you who believe, bless him and greet him with a greeting' [33: 56]. O God, bless Your servant and Your messenger with a perpetually perfect blessing; increase him with an honour to his honour and a nobility to his nobility. Bless also all of the Companions of the Cloak (*aṣḥāb al-kisā*), the pure ones, the immaculates: 'Alī, the Commander of the Believers, Fāṭima the Radiant, mistress of the women of the two worlds, and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two most noble and most righteous, and [bless] the rightly guided imams among the progeny of al-Ḥusayn, the luminaries of guidance, the full moons of the darkness, the masters of mankind, friends of the Most Merciful, the proofs of times, and pillars of the faith.

O God, bless the heir of every glory and praise, excellence and nobility, Your approved servant, Your chosen friend, and Your accepted upright deputy (*khalīfa*), the servant of God, Abū Muḥammad, the Imam al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, by whose light the horizons radiate, through whom brightness pervades, the sun of mankind and the full moon of the darkness, revealer of the light, and the revivifier of what was obliterated of the waymarkers of guidance, with the most excellent of Your perfect blessings, Your increasing benedictions, Your everlasting munificence.

O God, bless the holder of his appointment during his lifetime and his successor after his death, the chosen and selected, the venerable and sanctioned, Muḥammad Abū'l-Qāsim the Imam al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, son of al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, bearer of the proof of the Almighty, patron of the pious, the sharp sword of God and heir of the sword of his grandfather Dhu'l-Fiḡār,

a blessing bestowing the prayer of those who pray, hoisted into the heights of heaven, enduring forever among those who have passed before, abiding endlessly until the Day of Judgment.

O God, most certainly I am Your servant and Your friend. On me You have bestowed such favours that I am by You made mighty; You made me superior and thus You made me most generous. You have raised me and made me honoured by what You had me attain of the deputyship (*khilāfa*) from esteemed forefathers, the imams of right guidance, and You appointed me the flag of religion. You raised me to the imamate of the believers.

O God, complete Your favour to me, just as You completed it previously for those of the forefathers and grandfathers, the highly esteemed and celebrated, the bearers of Your banner, the keepers of Your inspiration, Your guardians of Your people, Your elite among Your servants, those chosen by You from the family of Your prophet for whom You combine the nobility of both abodes and the excellence of both residences.

O God, I am anxious about custody of their covenant and fulfilment of their promise, and the discharge of their obligations, completing their orders, keeping their memory alive, empowering those who were friends of theirs, humbling those who were enemies to them. Unite me and them, O God, in the seat of Your mercy, the residence of Your paradise, the neighbourhood of Your prophet, with the prophets and true friends, and the martyrs and the righteous, those who are faithful,²⁴⁵ O Lord of the worlds.

O God, You have sent me out of the land, an emigrant from the place of rest, in order to accomplish the duty of holy war that You imposed on me, on Your behalf and in support of Your religion, and the fortification of the community of Your apostle.

O God, grant me a clear and swift victory.²⁴⁶ Make me on Your behalf the defending dominant power against my enemy who is Your enemy.²⁴⁷ Truly You are over all things omnipotent.

O God, forgive the believers, male and female, and the Muslims,

men and women, the living among them and the dead, and those who join them coming later except for he who renounces Your names or he who is inimical to Your friends, or he who takes as friend Your enemies. Complete their recompense, and keep safe for them their religions, until they meet You having fulfilled their oath, being then worthy of Your reward. Truly You are forgiving and compassionate. 'Verily God commands justice and good deeds and giving to relatives and prohibiting indecent acts, the reprehensible and oppressive, and He admonishes you that you may remember' [16: 90]. Praise be to God, the Lord of the worlds.

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr

On the ʿĪd al-aḏḥā, 335 (2 July 947). During the siege of
Abū Yazīd at Kiyāna

[‘And when it was the day of sacrifice, Friday the 10th of Dhu’l-Ḥijja, the Imam, peace be upon him, rode a roan red horse with golden fringes on the side. He was dressed in a garment of yellow, turbaned with a saffron turban, its tail hanging loose. He was surrounded by his supporters, his army, his loyal friends and servants. Arriving at the *muṣallā* that had been put up for him prior to that, he dismounted and prayed the festival prayer. He climbed up the *minbar* that had been constructed of stones and he gave the sermon. He said:’]²⁴⁸

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God who unites through divine lordship, who is unique in oneness, who is almighty in ability and endurance, all-powerful in majesty and grandeur, the first without limit, the last without end, transcending the comparisons of the ignorant and the definitions of the describers, the conditions of the attributers, and the comprehension in visions of those who speculate.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, and I testify that Muḥammad is His servant and His messenger. He honoured him with prophecy and chose him for the message; He awarded him with excellence. He sent him with a light for him to shine and with the truth for him to proclaim, with guidance for him to command, against unbelief to hold back, over the prophets to keep watch, and for that which they had brought to

confirm its truth. So he conveyed the message and guided the way out of error. He led away from destruction successfully and made clear the waymarkers of religion and its obligations. He explained its terms and its statutes. He waged war on behalf of God with an effort worthy of Him²⁴⁹ until the certainty overcame him.²⁵⁰ May God bless him among those who came first and those who come later. And [bless also] his family, the pure, the chaste, the noble, the imams of right guidance, the esteemed and revered. Upon them have mercy and deference.

I prescribe for you, the servants of God, what I previously prescribed for myself as to fearing God and His surveillance, and doing what will please Him and bring us and you closer to Him. So, in fearing Him, there is His approval and, in His being pleased, success in paradise and salvation from the fire. And 'whoever is saved from the fire and admitted to paradise has been granted success; and the life of this world is but the merchandise of delusion' [3: 185].

Most truly this day of yours is a sacred day during a sacred month, made more significant than other days, a day of the greater pilgrimage, in which God, the hallowed and exalted, tested Abraham His friend. He was redeemed in it from slaughtering his son, may God bless them both, and God imposed on the whole people of Islam the obligation of pilgrimage to His sacred house, which He made a refuge for the people and a place of safety.²⁵¹ So draw closer to God the Exalted in it by means of what He has commanded you to do. The most worthy of what brings you to Him is the female of the camel, and the female of cattle, and the ram of sheep. Steer clear of sick animals and those with defects in the eyes or ears, and those of them deformed by excess in its creation or missing something. They will not be accepted on your part. That is in accord with the practice of your Prophet, may God bless him and keep him and his family, the imams among his pure progeny, the righteous and highly esteemed, on them the most excellent of salutation. 'It is not their flesh or blood that reaches God, but the God-fearing piety that reaches Him' [22: 37].

God accepts from us and from you, and He prescribes for us and for you, a pilgrimage to His sacred house, reaching His place of great assembly and His revered stations, by empowering our victory, completing our affair, and implementing the advancement of His promise to us. Truly He does not go back on His promise²⁵²; what He wants is never impossible for Him.²⁵³

[The second *khutba*:]

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, He who starts things and brings them back, the most efficient benefactor, the One who effects what He wants,²⁵⁴ Creator of creation, Bestower of sustenance, the One who causes the rain to descend, the Arranger of affairs, the One who survives the heavens and the earth and what is in them, and to Him do they return.

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God!

And God is great! God is great! Praise be to God!

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, and I testify that Muḥammad is His chosen servant, and His approved messenger, His confidant for what He reveals, the deliverer from error and destruction, may God bless him and his revered family, the rightly guided ones, the imams of righteous guidance: ‘Alī, the Commander of the Believers and master of the legates and best of Muslims; Fāṭima the Radiant, mistress of the women of the two worlds; and al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn, the two lords of the youth among the people of paradise; and the imams from the progeny of al-Ḥusayn, the chaste ones, the remainder of the messenger of God and his fruit, his two heirs, his proof to the servants, the mountains of religion, lords of the believers and saints of the worlds. And [bless] the approved imam, the chosen guardian, the servant of God, Abū Muḥammad, the Imam al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, inheritor of the excellence of the rightly guiding imams from his forefathers, the rightly guiding caliphs, the choicest of the choice

among the earliest of them and the latest, through whom the nation of believers rose and by whose sword the necks of the hypocrites were humbled, so that Islam was reestablished fresh and flourishing and religion made splendid and radiant, the truth luminous and resplendent. Through him God revived what had been obliterated of religion and, of the truth, what had become obscure. God combined for him the nobility of this world and its glory, and brought him the excellence of the next and its treasures, may the blessings of God be upon him and His approval, His mercy, and His affection.

O God, bless the holder of his covenant and heir of his glory, his successor after him, appointed to the imamate, crowned with high honour, the servant of God, Abu'l-Qāsim, the Imam al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, Commander of the Believers, the son of al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, scion of the elite of the prophets and remnant of those who went before, distinguished offspring of the rightly guiding imams. [Bless them] with a blessing by which You increase him in honour and esteem, nobility and majesty, sublime in ability, exalted in glory, growing in renown, enduring through the ages.

O God, just as You made me Your deputy whom You treat with deference and whom You honour, whom You hold in check and proscribe, curse those who claim it but who have no right to it and put to shame those who are hostile to it, cutting short thereby the hands of those who arrogate to it. You chose for it one after another my forefathers, the rightly guided ones, the chosen and revered, the rightly guided caliphs. Next You have me inherit their position, and You revived through me remembrance of them. You made complete through me their command. You had me follow in their tracks; You appointed me to what You appointed them, as the argument made through us to Your creation, the upholding of Your command, support of Your religion, empowering of the community of Your messenger. You made me victorious, triumphant, and dominant. You empowered through me the community after it had been humiliated and You multiplied them after they had been few. You brought them together after separation. You removed from them the shadows of discord, the gloom of darkness, and the black night of affliction, through our dynasty which You have made powerful and victorious, by our days which

You honour and thus chose, and our swords which You execute on the arch-deceiver and his party, the hypocrite and his like. You made them by it the harvest of the dying. The truth became radiant and falsehood comes to nothing,²⁵⁵ a bounty from You to us and a favour You renew with us. Upon the favours before it, You bestow it amply on us and bountifully. O God, inspire us with gratitude for Your favours; have us take up the task that has us please You and brings us closer to where You are and draws us nearer to You. For truly there is no might or power except through You. On You we depend; to You we turn.²⁵⁶ My affairs I entrust to You; in You I take refuge.

‘My prayers and my devotions, my living and my dying, are for God, Lord of the worlds’ [6: 162]. O God, forgive me and the believers, male and female, Muslims, man and woman, the living among them and the dead. Accept their deeds and attest to the validity of their efforts. Guide them and show mercy to them. Truly You are most gracious and merciful.

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr²⁵⁷

On the ʿĪd al-fiṭr, 336 (14 April 948), at al-Mahdiyya

[‘The festival of fast-breaking was on Thursday at the onset of Shawwāl of the year 366. The Commander of the Believers al-Manṣūr bi-llāh, may the blessings of God be upon him, went out to the *muṣallā* that the Imam al-Mahdī bi-llāh had built outside of al-Mahdiyya. His heir apparent al-Muʿizz li-Dīn Allāh Abū Tamīm was behind him. His paternal uncles, the sons of al-Mahdī bi-llāh, and his brothers, the sons of al-Qāʾim bi-Amr Allāh, and his own sons came after al-Muʿizz li-Dīn Allāh. He proceeded along with his troops with solemn dignity, reverence, praising God, until he reached the *muṣallā*. There he completed the festival prayer and mounted the *minbar* to deliver the sermon. He said:’]²⁵⁸

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, in gratitude for His favours which no number can possibly count, extending to the superabundance of His bounty, which is inexhaustible. There is no god but God, in keeping with His absolute oneness. And God is great, in deference to any mentioning of God, the highest and most glorious. Hallowed is God, He whose

signs bear witness to His power. His essence refuses the association with it of attributes, the vision of Him by sight, the definition of Him by intellects, being most grand and almighty, glorious and powerful, splendid and magnificent. His is the highest heavens and the lowest earth and what falls between them and what is beneath the soil.²⁵⁹ All submit to His majesty, humble before His might, acting in accord with His will, falling under His power.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone and without associate. And I testify that Muḥammad is His servant and messenger, selected and approved by Him, picked and chosen by Him, ennobled and purified by Him. He sent him with guidance and the religion of truth,²⁶⁰ by which those of the nearest angels in the heavens and those of the men and jinn on the earth express devotion. Thus he, on him be peace, was fully conversant with what had been made suitable, and he imparted what he was sent with, complying with the command of his Lord, patiently enduring sufferings and adversities on his part, until God caused His to prevail over all religions, and by His truth to destroy the vanities of the graven images. May the blessings of God be upon him and his family, and keep, exalt, and honour them.

Servants of God! I urge upon you the fear of God and obedience to Him. Dread God and His surveillance; draw near to God by that of which He approves. Most certainly He is fully acquainted with what is in your hearts and sees your deeds. No secret is hidden from Him;²⁶¹ the weight of a single atom in the heavens and earth escapes Him not.²⁶² There is no such thing as being saved from His displeasure, or a deliverance into His mercy other than by obeying Him; 'and those who obey God and His messenger will succeed greatly' [33: 71].

Indeed, most truly, did God, the Mighty and Glorious, make this day of yours a feast of greater importance than other days. He seals with it a month more excellent than other months. With it He commenced the days of the month of pilgrimage to the Ancient House, which He ennobled and sanctified. He made it the direction of prayers, the centre of blessings, the place of compassion, a rendezvous for the people and

a safe retreat,²⁶³ a lighthouse of religion and a guidepost. So draw close to God in this day of yours by rendering the fast-breaking alms, which is the *zakāt* of your fast, and is the Sunna of your prophet, the lord of the prophets, may God bless him and his family and keep him. Each man of you for himself and for each individual of his household, males and females, young and old, [contributes] half a *ṣā'*²⁶⁴ of wheat, or a *ṣā'* of barley, or a *ṣā'* of dates,²⁶⁵ from the food of your own household and not from elsewhere. Otherwise it is unacceptable. Pray frequently and be consciously alert and expectant. 'O you who believe, have fear of God and let each soul consider what it has set ahead for the morrow' [59: 18]. For it is near at hand, by God, as if already here.

Truly He, the Mighty and Glorious, would not have you be heedless in overlooking hunger and yet He does not impose a hardship in religion,²⁶⁶ but there is no excuse after having made the programme clear and confirmed by proofs, through His Messenger and the imams of guidance among his descendants, on him and on them the most excellent peace of God and His mercy.

Make us and you appropriate for His approval and brought near to Him. Draw us to Him. Truly we are His and by Him. And may the blessings of God, the first and last, be on Muḥammad, the seal of the prophets and lord of the messengers, and on his righteous and chaste family, the rightly guided (*mahdī*-ist) imams, the most noble overlords who have determined and will enjoin the truth and on the basis of it have and will rule justly.

[*The second khuṭba*. And he sat briefly and then stood and said:]

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, Lord of the universe, the ultimate end for that which would be perfect. And blessings, those coming and those going, growing, thriving, and enduring, be upon Muḥammad and his righteous and chaste family, the rightly guided (*mahdī*-ist) imams, noblest lords, the

pure and most pious. Praise! Praise! Thanks! Thanks! You carried out Your promise; You made Your servant victorious, against the hatred of the unbelievers, the minions of the cunning, depraved, profligates, the partisans of the lying arch deceiver, the misguiding object of anger, the filthy and unclean, the contemptible and wretched, the damned and infamous, those accursed throughout the earth and heaven.

Praise! Praise! And thanks to You! Thanks! Over and over again. There is no equivalent for Your favours; no repayment for Your kindnesses, confessing thus to the inability to express thanks even though it were to be attempted in every language throughout the whole of time.

May the peace of God and His blessings, benedictions, salutations, and charity (*zakiyyāt*) be on you both, O Commanders of the Believers, O you two caliphs of the Lord of the universe, O you two sons of the *mahdī*-ists' guidance, O father, O grandfather, O sons of Muḥammad, the messenger of God! The peace is that of the one who submits to God in regard to what He imposed on me in losing you both, and the patience concerning what He tries me with after you. May it be so throughout the misfortune and flow of tears over me, O father, O Muḥammad, O Abu'l-Qāsim, O mountain, O what longing, O what agony!

And Creator of the earth and heaven, Resurrector of those who are dead, Exterminator of those who are alive, I am not in doubt as to the choice of God, the Blessed and Glorious, for you and His transporting you to the abode of His favour and residence of His mercy, which provides accommodations for Muḥammad, His messenger, upon him be peace, your grandfather, as well as the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, your father, and Fāṭima, the radiant virgin, your mother, and your pure righteous *mahdī*-ist forefathers. But the grief of the grief-stricken is a spur to sorrows, causing tears in the eyes. So I am God's and to Him I will return.²⁶⁷ His are those who submit; for whatever happens to us we are grateful, and for His favours thankful.

God, the Mighty and Glorious, has enhanced the favour and multiplied the benevolence with the patience He has attached to my heart. Subsequently, He honoured me by might and victory, by means of which He spread the foundations of Islam, and with which He

illuminated the hearts of the believers following upon the darkness, and the cessation of hope due to the length of the period of tribulation with the great sedition and its horrors, and its chaos and its convulsions, black darknesses, deaf blindnesses, ignorant barbarism, due to the hypocritical arch deceiver and his apostate partisans, the enemies of religion and supporters of the accursed Iblīs. May God grant them a delay²⁶⁸ to bring them around bit by bit, and offer them a respite.²⁶⁹ So they increase in transgression as in an abyss. 'In order for God to separate the impure from the pure' [8: 37] and to show those with minds the confirmation of the promise of God in the book: '*alif lam mim*'; Do the people suppose that they will be left alone who say "We believe"; and that they will not be tested? We tried those who came before, and God will certainly know those who are true from those who are false' [29: 1-3], a promise from God not subject to breaking and a determination unchanging, in respect to those of His servant who came before and those of later, until the Day of Judgement. There was, thanks to God and His favour against our enemies, a trial that blinded them, made them deaf, led them astray, caused their apostasy, ruined them, made them degenerate, debased, dishonoured, while we and our friends had an ordeal that secured for us recompense and treasure, and brought about might and glory. Its means were vile but its results noble. Since God, the Mighty and Glorious, wanted the renewal of our dynasty and our might and to show His favour to us, His being burdened with our victory, and the testing of our friends, and the destruction of our enemies, so that when the end of it arrived and it had reached the furthestmost degree, the satan came out hopeless, uttering rants, his fire blazing, his persistence continuing. Having been aroused to anger over his transgressors, God allowed retribution²⁷⁰ among them by giving control to His servant and appointing him to the task. Thus did God clear up its darkness and cast light on its blackness, open its denseness, and avert the distress of it, through me and by my hand, as a mark of esteem by which God singled me out, an excellence whose nobility He bestowed on me, a favour for

me to store up. It is up to me to restrict it and connect its newness to the older favour to my pure forefathers and the previous beneficence of His to my grandfathers, the rightly guided imams.

Prior to that, swords were unsheathed, so He broke them; soldiers advanced toward me, so He defeated them; the armies of unbelief made common cause against me, so He left them in the lurch; eyes aspired after me, so He effaced them; heads were raised, so He made them bow down; noses were turned up in disdain, so He abased them; cheeks became contemptuous, so He made them humble. God, glorious is His glory, willed the realization of my promise and my command, the consolidation of my triumph, my coming out on top, my being victorious, my being supported and raised high, in fulfilment of His promising Muḥammad, upon whom be peace, to make his community triumph, elevating his proof and the victory of the imams of guidance from his offspring. His decree comes out having mastery; His enemies have been suppressed by force. There is no gainsaying His rule²⁷¹ and no going against His command; no partner in praise does He have.

O people of our *da'wa*, O supporters of our dynasty, O Kutāma!

Praise God and thank Him for that of His favours with which He singles you out, and the vastness of His beneficence. He gives preference in that over all of humans in the west and the east. He, the Mighty and Glorious, puts you first with the greatest favour, and then He attaches to you a magnificent beneficence, and He follows those two with such an abundance of grace to you that it cannot be counted. He made you see while the people were blind, and He informed you while the populace was ignorant. When servants were led astray, He guided you to His religion, to the triumph of His truth and obedience to His friend, the way-marker of guidance, the lamp in the darkness, the pole of religion, His firm rope. In precedence He raised you to His help, in pursuit of obeying Him, seeking shade in the shadow of His dynasty, being illuminated in the light of His wisdom, to the point that should God decree the convulsion of the county, the servants put to the test, darkness enveloping the earth, feet trembling, calamities magnifying, distress growing stronger, hearts aggrieved, God renders you immune. And He guides your hearts, firms up your feet until

God removes it from you in particular and from the servants as a whole, through us and by our hands. So there is on you a favour and on the servants a proof, so that it is removed from you and God, and you appear in a favourable light,²⁷² satisfying the promise of God,²⁷³ clinging to the rope of God, fighters on behalf of God; those of you alive are happy and your dead are martyrs 'finding their sustenance with their Lord' [3: 169]. Congratulations to you; rejoice!

O God! Truly I am Your servant. You have chosen and approved me; You have honoured me with what You have caused me to inherit of the position of Your most pure, the caliphate of Your friends. You have made me rich and the people poor in their religion and their worldly affairs in need of me. You have shown me mercy. You gave no one strength over me save Yourself; You set me up to give life to Your truth, and to be a testament to Your creatures. Most certainly I speak nothing but the truth, utter only what is correct. There has reached me on the authority of my fathers from our grandfather Muḥammad, the messenger of God, may God bless him and keep him, that he said: 'There is no preacher who preaches but that God stops him on the day of resurrection and questions him about every word and what he meant by it.' So by Your majesty, and Your glory, the highness of Your position and greatness, I do not stand in awe of any enemy, nor do I speak a falsehood, nor thank anyone for favours other than You.²⁷⁴

O God, truly have I come to be pleased with the Kutāma because of their holding firmly to Your rope and, in devotion to us, their having patience through misery and adversity for Your sake, acknowledging our precedence, carrying out that which God imposed on the servants because of us in order to reach You by obedience to us.

O God! Approve them, multiply their goodness, erase their wickedness, gather them up among the group of Your prophet to whom they are indebted, and Your friend to whom they are loyal. Leave unchanged Your favour upon them, nay complete it for them.

Perfect Your charity to them, and keep their posterity in power. Give their reward liberally and guide them. Purify their hearts. Truly You are the One close by and listening who hears all prayer.

Khuṭba of al-Manṣūr

On the ʿĪd al-naḥr, 336 (21 June 948) at al-Mahdiyya

[ʿAl-Manṣūr rode from his palace in al-Mahdiyya for the prayer of the ʿĪd al-naḥr according to the ceremony used previously for the ʿĪd al-fiṭr. He prayed with the people and then mounted the *minbar* and said:']²⁷⁵

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God.

And God is great! God is great! And to God belong praise and dominion and creation.

May God be praised, the Lord of the worlds, Governor of affairs, and Resurrector of those in the graves.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, who is adorned with might, dressed with majesty, stands alone in omnipotence and eternity, who is absolutely one in sovereignty and lordship, the Almighty, the Forgiving, the All-great, the Most powerful, transcending attributes, known by clear signs, worshipped in the earths and the heavens.

I testify that Muḥammad is His servant and His messenger, the seal of His prophets and master of His chosen, the most noble of His friends. He sent him with guidance, providing sight to the blind, rescue from error and ruin, and through him He completed His favour and benefaction to the servants, made clear through him His displeasure and His approval. Thus he, may peace be upon him, conveyed the message and announced the good tidings, proclaimed the warning. God shed light through him on the darkness and cancelled

the Period of the Ignorance of the ignorant, so much so that those averse became reconciled, unbelievers believed, infidels worshipped, and the obdurate submitted. The truth became clear after having suffered extinction, radiant after eradication in idols worshipped and infidel hearts, hands joined in alliance against it, until God permitted His religion victory over all religions.²⁷⁶

The blessings of God be upon Muḥammad, the master of the prophets, he who was well acquainted with burdens, patient through distress and adversity, spending himself for God, strengthening souls in worth and honouring them in importance with God, raising them among the heavenly host in remembrance. Servants do not ask about that as recompense except for love of kin,²⁷⁷ as his Lord commanded him so that the love for the imams of guidance from his offspring be the cause for his intercession and being assembled within his group.

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God.

And God is great! God is great! To God belong praise, majesty, and glory.

Servants of God! Truly this day of yours is a day of the feast God enjoins for the glorification and honouring of Him, and by it He commences the counted days²⁷⁸ and seals by it the appointed days.²⁷⁹ He made it a marker of the time for the pilgrimage to His sacred and revered house, the ancient sanctuary. The gates of heaven open during it to receive prayers. So pray to God most sincerely and implore Him wishfully, approaching with what He commands you to do or restrained you from. From livestock of the smaller animals—the most excellent of all livestock being the female of the camel, the female of bovines, and the ram of sheep—he who sacrifices the young of a goat, for that he will not be rewarded, but for a young ram he will be. All animals slaughtered prior to the prayer are permissible meat, and after the prayer are an acceptable sacrifice. The perfection of the sacrificed animal is soundness of eyes and ears. Avoid the sick one and the deformed, either in having extra limbs or not having some. Sharpen the blade for this purpose and treat the animal gently while

slaughtering. 'So when they are down slaughtered on their sides, eat of them and feed he who is readily satisfied and the indigent; in that way have We made animals subject to you that you may render thanks' [22: 36].

May God accept from us and from you our sacrifice, and answer our prayers and witness the validity of our actions, for truly He is a noble benefactor, a merciful provider.

[The second *khuṭba*:]

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God.

And God is great! God is great! God is great! Praise belongs to God always, and dominion without end, might overpowering, religion everlasting.²⁸⁰ So hallowed be He who is unique in perpetuity, absolutely one in sublimity, most glorious in majesty, who overwhelms creation by annihilation and yet bestows favours and benefits, makes it begin through His goodness and provides rewards in His justice. God bears witness and those who glorify Him that there is no god but Him; and likewise [say] the closest angels and believers possessed of minds, that He is equitable, unique in dominion, one in lordship. There is no god but He, the Almighty and Omniscient.²⁸¹

[He bears witness also] that Muḥammad is His servant and His messenger, the seal of the prophets and master of the messengers, the most noble of those chosen, most excellent of those selected. May the blessings of God be upon him and on those who preceded him of the prophets and messengers, and on his successor among the rightly guided imams from his noble progeny, the chaste, the tongues of the truth, the banners of right, guides of the people, summoners to guidance, and the indication of the goal.

O God, among them bless the one who manifested his light, the shiner of his brilliance, the sea of knowledge obscuring the summits, the moon of the heaven, the radiance of the planets, the illumination for the darkness, the uncoverer of the blackness, revivifier of laws, destroyer of seditions. That one is the servant of God and His chosen,

most sincere friend, Abū Muḥammad, the Imam al-Mahdī bi-llāh, Commander of the Believers, the one approved for the religion, the guide to the plain truth, the sword of God unsheathed against the unbelievers. O God, bless him with the most perfect of Your blessings, connect to him Your salutations, renew for him Your honours, and increase him in Your favours and the bounties of Your benefits and the amplitude of Your gifts.

O God, and bless the one who inherited his position, who was connected to his times, the brilliant banner, the shining lamp, Muḥammad Abū'l-Qāsim al-Qā'im bi-Amr Allāh, Commander of the Believers, whom You chose and honoured, whom You selected and approved, whom You tested and tried, so that, for Your favours, he was thankful and, in the trials, he was patient, unblemished because of the salutation of Your most honoured prophets and chosen saints, to uphold their affairs and their honour, not their shame.

Truly, he was tried by the most serious of sedition and the most severe tribulation, by the nations most deserving of ignominy and execration, for their insolence toward You, their pursuit of rebellion against You, and their repudiation of Your revelation, their declaring Your messenger a liar, their conspiring to extinguish Your light,²⁸² and their joining forces for the demolition of Your religion. He was not to a likeness of You beseeching and not to other than You submitting and, not in regard to Your support, doubting. He announced it plainly, and he explained it most clearly, a confirmation for the believers, an argument against the unbelievers. But his days were cut short and his death arrived prior to the cure of his rage and the grasping of his revenge, the attainment of his hope. He departed this world agreeable to You, laughing and happy at meeting You, confident of Your reward. O God, bless him with a blessing hopes never reach and deeds ultimately do not result in. Single him out among them by the most sublime of bounty and closest of means. Increase him in good deeds and approval, mercy and affection, of Your bounty of which the giving is never lacking and Your goodness in which there is neither benefit nor harm. Truly we are, because of Your provisions provided through him, kept unblemished, and, because of Your preference for him, we

are approved. Because of Your reward to him, we are staunch in faith. Our prayers for him and our salutations on him are an obligation from You that we fulfil, a right You impose on us that we carry out.

O God, for You there is praise both before and after for Your favours to me and for Your having made come to me the imamate of rightly guiding forefathers and the caliphate of the righteous imams. You having appointed me to revive religion by upholding the practice of the master of the messengers, empowering the believers and humiliating the unbelievers, during the time of the tyranny of satan, and when falsehood kneeled down on the truth its breast and neck, and You completed my command and You empowered my victory, bestowing amply Your favours upon me. You brought back Your generosity to me and You did not allow to any creature against me power or trouble in that.

To You is the loftiest of my wishes, the most eminent of my desires in allotting gratitude for Your favours, the execution of Your rights, the fulfilment of Your duties, the good fortune of what pleases You, draws nearer to You, brings us closer to You.

O God, most assuredly, I am Your servant and Your friend. You give preference to me and thus I am superior, and You empower me and so I am powerful. I am the mighty because of You, but submissive to You; the noble because of Your ennobling, but modest due to Your vast regard; made glorious due to Your might, but submissive to Your authority, caring out of fear of You. There is no one who desires or dreads but for You and from You. Complete for me Your favour through the good fortune by which Your goodness is extracted and Your mercy and approval are made deserved.

O God, forgive the believers, male and female, the living among them and the dead, those on whom Your favours fall because of us and so they are thankful, and fight on behalf of our dynasty and so have patience, pondering our religion, fulfilling their covenant,²⁸³ submitting to the warden of their affairs,²⁸⁴ asserting the truth of the right when it comes to them, hastening to the treasures,²⁸⁵ struggling

to do righteous deeds. O God, double their reward and strengthen their support, subdue through them the hearts of Your enemies and those who deny the rights of Your saints.

And bless, O God, Muḥammad, Your prophet, the chosen one and Your approved messenger. [Bless also] his pure family and the rightly guided imams. Praise be to God, the Lord of the worlds, as the First and the Last, the Inner and the Outer.

Khuṭba of al-Mu‘izz

On the ‘Īd al-naḥr, 341 (28 April 953) at al-Manṣūriyya

[‘The Commander of the Believers al-Mu‘izz li-Dīn Allāh, may the blessings of God be upon him, hid the passing of his father the Commander of the Believers from the end of the month of Shawwāl, the day of his death, until the tenth of Dhu’l-Ḥijja, the day of the sacrifices. Then he went out for the prayer of the festival wearing solemn attire and the emblems of the imamate. He prayed the festival prayer and then mounted the *minbar*. He delivered his sermon in which he revealed publicly the death of the Commander of the Believers al-Manṣūr bi-llāh. He said:’]²⁸⁶

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God!

And God is great, the mightiest, the most powerful, the Creator, the Governor, possessor of all strength and majesty, of might and sovereignty, the One, the Eternal, the matchless and unique, the highest master, the Inner and the Outer, the First and the Last,²⁸⁷ instigator of the heavens and the earth with force, master of them with might, governor of them with wisdom, and creator of them with all the wonders of nature they contain and the marvels of their composition and making; He to whom every thing alive and inert speaks a prayer and is evidence for Him, testifying that He is absolutely one, great, and glorious. His causing things to come into being from nothing all at once and altogether is evidence that nothing came before Him and their end at a term indicates that there is no limit to Him. That they are

apprehended by definitions establishes that He has no definition. The weakness, impotence, poverty, and want of which created beings are not free is the most eloquent admission and most truthful evidence for the Creator, who is alone, glorious is His praise, in divinity and singularity, in power and lordship, in completeness and perfection, in eternity and perpetuity. God be praised, Lord of the universe, 'who made all things He created excellent' [32: 7]. And He assigned for each living thing its sustenance, and then, next, the guidance of intellect, which established the proof of Him and the necessity of obeying Him, and the scriptures and the messenger through which His word reached fruition.²⁸⁸ Therefore God bless them all, and Muḥammad, the lord of the messengers who upholds His mention, and the most powerful of them; highest is his powers. He bestowed on him the most noble means and singled him out by every sort of excellence, sending him as the guide for the servants and a light in the land, through him providing knowledge against ignorance, guidance away from error, increasing from little, empowering from lowliness, thereby to bring harmony out of dissonance, lightning through him the murky blackness of gloom. May the blessings of God be upon him and on his rightly guiding (*mahdī*-ist) family, the chosen, the good.

O people, God created you not in jest,²⁸⁹ nor will He overlook you without purpose. He does not impose on you a hardship in religion,²⁹⁰ and yet He does not disregard being remembered but rather He created you for worship, obeying Him, and He ordered you to obey His messenger. For obedience He made fixed signs and written decrees, and the most excellent of these signs and the most noble of days for that is the day of the great pilgrimage to the ancient house of God, the dwelling place of Abraham, the friend of God, and the prayer-direction of Muḥammad, the messenger of God, may God bless and keep him. So draw near to God through what He commanded you to do. He provides you the means for it from livestock animals, following the model of Muḥammad's Sunna, he who was the prophet of mercy and guidance, he being conscious of God with proper piety. For truly

God, the Almighty and Glorious, said: 'Their meat and blood do not reach God, but rather it is your piety that reaches Him' [22: 37]. So it is through piety that deeds are accepted and hopes realized. Praise God for His having guided you;²⁹¹ thank Him for what He has given you.

Indeed, certainly the best offering is the camel and the best camel is its female. Likewise with bovines. Next the ram among sheep. The soundness of the sacrifices means sound eyes and ears and that it be lawfully owned.

We ask God for our sakes and yours that the reception of this act pleases Him and attains the hoped aim of His approval, and His mercy and beneficence.

[The second *khutba*:]

God is great! God is great! There is no god but God!
And God is great! God is great in terms of significance, the mightiest in authority, too manifest in signs and proofs for minds to deny His absolute oneness or wish to define Him. Creator of the heavens and the earth, ruler and governor of them both, the Unique, the Eternal, the One, the Only, who has neither partner nor peer, Creator almighty, the merciful forgiver, He whose judgment effects. What He wants comes to be with perfect mastery of every thing in production, bestowing everything abundantly supported, comprehending all things in knowledge.²⁹² I praise Him, I beg His assistance, I ask His forgiveness, I seek His guidance; and I defer to Him and I rely on Him in all matters.

I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without partner, and I testify that Muḥammad was His choice from among His servants, noblest of His creation, most pure of the chaste, and His messenger to the whole of the world, the one sent by Him with the imamate to men and jinn, to convey the proof of the Lord, to explain the way to the truth. Thus he brought the message of God, was merciful and gracious to the servants of God, patient with the great against the cunning of the unbelievers, until God granted the upper

hand to the truth over falsity, guidance over errors, kindling in him a light in the unknown, in Muḥammad, on whom the most excellent of blessings and their most pure, most complete, copious, enduring, and perpetual. And on the rightly guided (*mahdī*-ist) imams among his noble and chaste progeny who have been chosen for the caliphate and approved for the imamate, confirming their proof in the testament of the Messenger, making obedience to them necessary in the revelation, after His conferring excellence on them over the world through the parentage of Muḥammad, the lord of the messengers, and 'Alī, the most excellent of the legatees, those whose mother was the mistress of women, the fifth of the Companions of the Cloak. The blessing of God be upon them all. And on the two Commanders of the Believers, al-Mahdī bi-llāh and al-Qā'im bi-amr Allāh, the two lords of all mortals and imams of right guidance, through whom God raised high the appeal to the truth, and by whom He caused the faith and the faithful to speak, and on whom He established the pillars of religion. By means of their truth, He annihilated the falseness of the pretenders and the lies of the prevaricators,²⁹³ and cut out with their swords the roots of transgressors.²⁹⁴

O God, single out the excellent imam, the just successor, the completely pious, the showering rain, he of the splendid marvels, penetrating miracles, the spender of his noble self in times of hardship and troubles, the man patient in misery and loss, until the land was cleared of the tyranny of enemies, Your servant, advocate, chosen one, and friend Abu'l-Ṭāhir al-Manṣūr bika ['the One Victorious through You'], he who relied on You, who committed to You, he who did what pleased You, who drew near to You, coming close to You, he whom You have made us miserable by his loss and left us alone after him. You have separated us from him and made us grieve. So accept his prayer and answer his call; bring together him and his dear ones in the abode of Your paradise and the abundance of Your mercy.

Truly the distress and severe agony due to you O my father, O master, O Ismā'il, O Abu'l-Ṭāhir, O sea of the knowledge of the

chaste imams, of *mahdī*-ist guidance, O remnant of the sons of the Messenger and sons of the legatee and the immaculate lady, O imam of the community and key of the door to mercy, O lamp of right guidance, sun of mankind, he who casts light in the deep darkness, O he whom God made special by swift favours, what God has inflicted on you affects us grievously. The misfortune is great; because of losing you, consolation does not exist; and tongues fail in enumerating your excellences or counting your virtues. So, by Him who singled you out with His mark of honour and presented you with the abundance of His gifts, ennobled you with the parentage of His messenger, were it not for what You inspire in me because of him and confirm for me as to upholding the truth of God and defending the community of your forefather, the messenger of God, rescuing them from the flood of ignorance, the sea of error, abysses of disorder, and the wreckage of misfortunes, and what was resolved for me and what sank into my breast of the reward for fidelity to God and His messenger, and to the imams of right guidance, if it were not for that I would strike my face as a traveller in the land, loathing a place of rest, being content with a bag full of provisions, so that death should quickly take me to you, and thereby gain for me nearness to you and the mercy of your Lord.

But instead I ponder, observe and govern. I see for me no other way except patience and consideration, and that I claim your position and acquire your nobility, and so I endure. My Lord makes me patient and so I am patient. Conviction overcomes me and so I forbear. Thus do I say: We belong to God and to God we will return.²⁹⁵ There is no might or power except through God, the Most High and Mighty, the Merciful and Compassionate, for Him thanks for what afflicts and gratitude for what is done.

Companions of our friends, those who confess their loyalty to us and those who hold fast to our rule! These, by God, are grievously severe trials, which ripen the liver; this convulsion so great that feet cannot be firmly planted, these processions that your imams never cease explaining and, when it comes upon you and the trials in it fall upon you, constantly request of God to plant your feet firmly and

keep your hearts unblemished. So be resolute and safe. Do not go astray and then have to repent! God will never leave His land and His age, through all of time, without someone who upholds the truth on behalf of God, a witness for creation in whom the believers rest assured and through whom the deviant deceiving unbelievers are repudiated.

Indeed God, with praise to Him, created creatures without need on His part for them but rather for worship of Him and the manifesting of His excellence and generosity to them. He made life in them a productive power and death a round cup, and what is after death a reward for work. He explained to you that between these two is the path well trod by His chosen messengers and by the chosen imams of right guidance. He fashioned their reward and share in accord with the value of their communication and effectiveness, and their proficiency with His commandments, and the guiding of His creatures. He created among them degrees of excellence in rank. Thus He, glorious is praise of Him, said: 'Then We made inherit the book those of our servants that We have chosen; among them some were unjust to themselves, some follow a middle course, and some excel in good deeds with the permission of God; that is a great blessing' [35: 32]. God, the blessed, Lord of the universe, He who sanctioned the worldly realm not as a reward for the believers, nor as a punishment for the unbelievers.

O people, there is no living thing that is not subject to death, and no deceased but that after it there is resurrection, and no resurrection except with the accounting, and hence either reward or punishment. So blessedness for he who meets God holding fast to the near relations of His friends, keeping safe by means of their infallibility, upholding the requirements of the loyalty imposed on them by His proofs and His chosen ones, seeking shade in the shadow of the banners of the family of our lord Muḥammad, the messenger of God, lord of the messengers, a day on which nothing will avail but religion and nothing will save except the authenticity of certitude. 'A day on which each soul will find before it what good it has done and what evil it has done; it will wish that there were a great separation between it and them, but God cautioned you about Himself, and God is kind to those who serve' [3: 30].

O people! Actions are in how they end, and the reward from God is commensurate with fidelity to God and to His messenger, and to the imams of right guidance among the offspring of the Messenger. You have seen the lord of the imams, the shepherd of the community and the lamp in the darkness. In residences and shrines he fulfilled there the obligation his Lord imposed on him and carried out the charge given him by his grandfather, Muḥammad. He made clear to you that, if you follow his law, you will never go astray, nor will you be cut off from the mercy of God. Your vision will never grow too dim to follow the straightest path and adhere to great proof. There is no prior guardian but that after him there is a succeeding legatee, who upholds on behalf of God His rights in expectation of realizing his reward, doing what will please Him in accord with his own capacity and the ultimate limit of what he is able to accomplish. 'God burdens no soul beyond its capability' [2: 286]. And, for the maintenance of His religion and for the guiding of His creatures and the care of the community of His prophet, He approves only those most excellent and praiseworthy, unique individuals, of the highest high-mindedness, exemplary character, proud souls, of the purest lineage. God's law runs through His creatures and His wisdom brings about what is impossible to reject, or for speech to refute, such connection of the messengers to the explanation of the path from one time to another, and to proclaim His religion to the extent possible. So He grants to the servants reward according to their obedience and their response to the appeal and acceptance of the guidance, and punishment according to their displeasure, rejection, and repudiation. Rejection of the last of them is not for a believer in the first of them; nor does accepting the truth of the last of them avail the rejecter of the first of them, in regard to the reward and mercy against the painful punishment and abiding shame. God has connected obedience to the imams of right guidance with obedience to the Messenger, and obedience to the Messenger with obedience to Himself. Thus He said: 'Obey God and obey the Messenger and those with command among you' [4: 59]. And that is His practice concerning prophets and messengers. 'You will find no alteration in the law of God, and you will find no deviation in the law of God' [35: 43]. Is there for he who affirms the prophethood of Moses and

the messengership of Jesus, on both of whom be peace, a need to state the superiority of our lord Muḥammad, the seal of the prophets and lord of the messengers, if that person rejects his prophethood? Is there any benefit to his acts or a reward for his devotion?

The light, O people, is in us well protected; the gift of your Lord to us is undiminished. So where do you go and in what land do you lose your way? 'Far, very far, is what you are promised' [23: 36]. So obey us and be guided; cling to our rope and be led on the right path. Do that which will have you succeed in your afterlife and be happy! Do not make the greatest of your concerns your present life. The Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, father of the rightly guided (*mahdī*-ist) imams, may the blessing of God be on them altogether, said: 'God makes licit what is permitted and provides assistance for it, and He makes illicit the forbidden and how to guard against it.' So call for what is little when it is plentiful, and what is narrow when it is extended! Thus he commands for you an action and burdens you with the means to live. So the search for what is guaranteed you is not more important for you than seeking what you are supposed to do.

O God! Prompt in us thankfulness for Your blessings, adapt us to what meets Your approval and draws us near to You, and makes necessary a high degree of Your bounty and stored up treasures with You by the completion of Your favour upon me in this world and the next, God of creation, Lord of the universe.

O God! Support me with Your aid; conquer for me Your enemies with a victory that revives religion and by which the community of Muḥammad, lord of the messengers, grows mighty. Provide me the means to visit his tomb and mount his *minbar*, stay in his house, and perform the pilgrimage to Your sacred house, and with our banners halt at these majestic shrines. You have restored our might and that of our friends; You have supported us and them with victory; You have honoured us with triumph and made us prevail over the oppressors, subjugating for us the necks of the rebellious opposition. The times appointed to approach You have gone for fathers and grandfathers. Your promise has no variance; there is no gainsaying Your command. Acceptance and being safe lie in what You have decreed, or have arrived quickly or come slowly.

O God! Make what You bestow a portion of Your beneficence, and what You restore in us a part of Your bounty, and Your favour to us and to the servants, a mercy from You.

O God! And connect to all of the might You restore for us a humility that reassures my heart in the face of Your majesty, glory, and awesome dignity. There is no power except through submission and worship of You; no riches other than in needing You; no security but in apprehension of You; no felicity in this world or the next without Your approval, O Lord of the universe.

O God! Watch over the believers, both men and women, and the Muslims, both male and female, those of them living as well as the dead. Single out the friends of our dynasty and supporters of our *da'wa*, the fighters, the steadfast, the grateful, with Your mercy, with which they are obligated by obedience to You, to carry out Your orders and maintain friendship with Your friends and enmity to Your enemies.

May God bless Muḥammad, lord of the messengers in former times and later. Remember God, the Mighty, in your invocation;²⁹⁶ seek His protection both for me and for you. Praise be to God and may His blessings and peace be on our lord Muḥammad and his family in its entirety.

Khuṭba of al-Mu‘izz

[‘We will mention a part of what has come down from the imams of truth, on whom be peace, explaining thereby the loftiness of their positions, the eminence of their ranks, and what is required in regard to them, which is to believe about them what our lord al-Mu‘izz li-dīn Allāh, the blessings of God be upon him, said in one of his *khuṭbas*:’]²⁹⁷

Praise be to God, He who unifies the ones that indicate His oneness, He who makes splendid splendours by the splendour of His lordship, He who makes eternal eternity by the eternity of His divine being, who connects perpetuity with time through the innovating of His divine lordship, who causes that which His causation causes, above that which moves and its mover in its motion, raised high over both of them by the supreme degree of the power of His omnipotence. He was before there was motion and stillness, appearance and concealment, He who makes the ages revolve and eras come around, determiner of night and day, the inner meaning produced by the intellect and the senses, the outer meaning in the picturing of forms and individuals. I thank Him for that in which He singles us out, makes particular to us, chooses us by the letter *lam* in *al-ẓilāl*,²⁹⁸ gives us prominence without equal among persons, makes us the means to the majesty of His awesomely overwhelming power so that we are its gateways

and its treasurers, its face, its side, its two outstretched hands²⁹⁹ in His servants. We are the gateway of relief of which whoever enters his sins are pardoned and his torments removed. We are the doorway to His house inhabited, His ceiling raised high,³⁰⁰ the straight path,³⁰¹ and the splendid tidings.³⁰²

O people! We have shown you a remembrance, so recollect the fullness of the favours to you through us, the perfection of religion that God approved for you as religion, the religion of Islam,³⁰³ no other than that should be sought, or accepted. 'Whoever seeks a religion other than Islam, will find it unacceptable and he will be in the next life among the losers' [3: 85]. Abraham was the first in it; Muḥammad was the end of it. We are its completion, its perfection, and its end. 'Truly Satan is an enemy to you; treat him as an enemy; he calls upon his party only to become the companions of the inferno' [35: 6]. God never ceases to have appear with our appearance a satan in each time and age, in order to show, by his imperfection, our excellence and, in his corruption, our benefit. The Prophet, may God bless him and his family, said: 'There is associated with each prophet a satan and with us there are two satans.' Do not purchase error for guidance³⁰⁴ by following someone who is insolent and tyrannical, who issues lies, and seizes control, who shed blood in the sacred month,³⁰⁵ he and those of his forbearers who came earlier, while the people were in an inviolable state. That is disbelief in God and is to declare false what God promised would be secure to His friends. These people 'God cursed for their disbelief' [2: 88]³⁰⁶ and made their hearts remorseless in their inequity.³⁰⁷ 'Most surely, the curse of God falls on the iniquitous' [11: 18].

O God, grant a pardon to me and to the believers, the men and the women, 'and do not increase the iniquitous except in ruination'

Khuṭba of Qirwāsh

On 4 Muḥarram 401 (18 August 1010) at Mawṣil

[‘Among the events of that year came the news that Abu’l-Manīʿ Qirwāsh b. al-Muqallad had assembled the people of Mawṣil and revealed to them his allegiance to the ruler of Egypt. He announced to them his intention to establish a *daʿwa* for him and he invited them to accept that. They responded with the answer of an enslaved flock restrained in aversion and repugnance. The one to give the *khuṭba* was present on that Friday the 4th of Muḥarram; he received a robe of honour and was given a copy of the sermon he was to deliver. It went as follows:’]³⁰⁹

God is great, God is great; there is no god but God.

For Him is the praise of those who are, by His light, above the floods of fury, who, by His power, burst asunder the pillars supporting idols, who, by His light, cause the rising of the sun of truth from the west, who, by His justice, blot out the tyranny of injustice and break, by His might, the back of inequity so that matters revert to their original state and truth returns to its owners. Distinct in His essence, alone in His attributes, manifest in His signs, solitary in His indications, time passes by Him not so that the seasons preceded Him and forms do not resemble Him so that places contain Him. Eyes do not see Him so that tongues can describe Him. His existence is prior to all existences; His goodness surpasses all goodness. His oneness is fixed in every intellect; His presence exists in every vision. I praise Him with what is required of His grateful friends, the highest of praise for

Him. I implore Him to do as He wills and wants. I acknowledge about Him what His most sincere friends and His witnesses acknowledge. I bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, no partner does He have; this is testimony unadulterated with the filth of idolatry or afflicted with delusions of doubt. It is free of deceit; it consists solely of obedience and submission.

I bear witness that Muḥammad is His servant and His messenger, may God bless him. He chose him and selected him for the guidance of the people and for the upholding of the truth so that the message and guidance away from error arrives. The populace was at that time heedless and astray from the path of truth because of following personal whims. He saved them from the worship of idols and commanded them to obey the most Merciful so that the proofs of God and His signs were upheld. He brought to perfection his words by the delivery of them,³¹⁰ may God bless him, and bless the first to respond to him, ‘Alī, the Commander of the Faithful and lord of the legatees, the establisher of excellence and mercy, the pillar of knowledge and wisdom, the root of the noble and righteous tree generated from the sacred and pure trunk. And [blessings be] on his successors, the lofty branches of that same tree, and on what comes from it: the fruit that grows there.

O people, ‘fear God with the piety He is due’ [3: 102]; seek His reward: beware of His punishment. You have seen what was recited to you in His book. God the Exalted said: ‘the day We summon all the people by their imam’ [17: 71], and He said: ‘O you who believe, obey God and obey the Messenger and obey those with command among you’ [4: 59]. So beware, beware, O people, it is as if the present world were leading you to the next. Its conditions have become clear, the pathway looms up, interrogation is its reckoning and entry is according to its book: ‘thus whosoever does an atom’s weight of good he will see it; whosoever does an atom’s weight of bad he will see it’ [99: 7–8]. Climb aboard the ship of your salvation before you founder; ‘hold fast to the rope of God altogether, do not scatter’ [3: 103]. Know that He knows what is in your souls, so beware of Him.³¹¹ Return to God with

the best of returns, respond to the summoner³¹² who is the gateway of compliance, before ‘you yourself should say, “Ah, woe is me, I neglected my duty to God and am now among those who scoffed”; or should say, “Alas, if God had guided me I would have been among the God-fearing”; or should say, upon seeing the punishment, “O that I could have another chance that I might be among those who do good” [39: 56–58]. Be on your guard against heedlessness and indifference before that remorse, and the sorrow, the hoping for another chance, the begging for redemption, and ‘it is too late to escape’ [38: 3]. Obey your imam and you will be well guided; cling to the holder of the covenant and you will be led on the right way. He has shown you knowledge by which you are led rightly and the path by which you are guided. May God make us and you those who follow His wish; He makes faith his provision. He inspires him with his piety and good sense. May God the most magnificent grant us and you forgiveness, and for all Muslims the same.

[Then he sat and rose again and said:]

Praise be to God who is the Most Glorious and who is the Creator of mankind, who determines the divisions though He is [Himself] matchless in eternity and perpetuity, who causes the dawns to break, who creates phantoms and makes spirits. I praise Him as the First and the Last. I testify that He is the Outward and the Inner. I seek His aid as the divine power. I request His support as the victorious guardian. And I testify that there is no god but God, alone, who has no associate, and that Muḥammad is His servant and His messenger, this testimony from one who affirms His absolute oneness in true faith and who confesses to His divinity willingly, knowing the demonstration of what He summons to and understanding the truth of the proofs for Him. O God, bless your radiant guardian and your greatest friend, ‘Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, the father of the rightly guided imams. O God, bless the two pure grandsons al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn and the righteous imams, the best and most excellent, those of them that stood forth

and appeared and those of them that were concealed and hidden.³¹³ O God, bless the imam who is ‘The One rightly guided by You’ [*al-Mahdī bi-llāh*], and who conveyed Your commandments and made manifest Your proofs and who took up the cause of justice in Your lands as the guide for Your servants. O God, bless ‘The one who takes charge by Your order’ [*al-Qā’im bi-amr Allāh*] and ‘The one who is victorious through Your support’ [*al-Manṣūr bi-naṣr Allāh*], these two who expended themselves for Your satisfaction and waged holy war on Your enemies. O God, bless ‘The one who makes strong Your religion’ [*al-Mu’izz li-dīn Allāh*], warrior in Your cause who revealed Your authentic signs and prominent proofs. O God, bless ‘The one who is mighty because of You’ [*al-‘Azīz bi-llāh*], by whom the land is cleared and by whom the servants are guided. O God, extend all of Your blessings and the most perfect of Your favours to our lord and master, the imam of the age, fortress of the faith, head of the ‘Alid *da’wa* and prophetic religion, Your servant and guardian on Your behalf, al-Manṣūr Abū ‘Alī al-Ḥākim bi-Amr Allāh, Commander of the Believers, just as You blessed his rightly guided forefathers and as You ennobled Your saints who were rightly guided. O God, bear in mind what You have appointed him to do and safeguard him in what You observe of him. Favour him in what You bring to him; support his armies; raise high his banners in the east of the land and its west, for indeed You are capable of all things.

Khuṭba of al-Āmir

On a Friday, during Ramaḍān

[‘I quote from some *khuṭbas* of his that I found on a piece of silk on which it had been transcribed for the Lady al-Ḥurra, the Ṣulayḥid queen; applied to it was the noble signature of the Commander of the Believers. It is word for word what follows here:’]³¹⁴

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, He whom the intelligent fall short of understanding the true nature of His essence, and tongues are unable to enumerate His attributes. Those in His earth and His heavens yield to His might; and the splendour of His signs indicates the oneness of His majestic dominion. No one gainsays His decrees; ‘nor alters His words’ [6: 115].³¹⁵ We thank Him for His favours that never cease to make us flow along the good favour of His customary way. We bear witness that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, a testimony that effaces from the one who says it the greatest of his sins, and entails the doubling of his goodness. We bear witness also that our grandfather Muḥammad was His servant and messenger whom He sent, the one most excellent of character among His signs. May God bless him and our father, the Commander of the Believers, ‘Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, he who gave alms upon completing his prayers. And bless the chaste imams from the offspring of them both, the demonstrations of guidance and its markers. Peace unconditioned.

O people, until when will you be ‘in the flood of forgetfulness’ [51; 11], heedless of what is before you in the way of the horror that

dawns, for perceptions you can not use, for what they summon to and you cannot do, 'On the contrary, you will know; most certainly you will come to know' [102: 3-4]. Then God has mercy for the man who directs his attention to his imam, and who is guided by the straight road of his imam, who satisfies his creator in his rejection and in his confirmation, avoiding obscenity in his speech and words.

Servants of God! This is the month of Ramaḍān, the blessed, which has descended upon you as does the arrival of a guest. So go to utmost length to honour it. Increase its prayers and fasting. Strive to pass its days in sacrifice and piety, and its nights prostrate and bent in prayer, and to fast in it for offences and sins, your fast without drink and food.

Truly, the most decisive is that read on the tops of the *minbars*, and the hearing of the bedouin and the settled heed; it is the speech of the one completely familiar with the unseen, the one who knows the secrets. God, the Exalted, said in His well-concealed book: 'When the Qur'an is read, listen to it and hearken well, perhaps you may be treated with mercy' [7: 102]. Seek the protection of God and His power against Satan and his tendency. In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate: 'Ramaḍān is the month in which the Qur'an was sent down, a guide for the people, explanations of guidance and a criterion; so those of you present during the month, let them fast during it; and those who are sick or travelling should make it up on other days' [2: 185].

God blessed us and you in the magnificent Qur'an, and benefited us and you in the verses and the wise remembrance. We ask the forgiveness of God for us and whoever of the believers who submit to us in unconditional acceptance.

[The second *khuṭba*:]

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, creator of creation, and knower of the unknown, too high for companions and offspring. God bless our grandfather, Muḥammad, the guide to the shining path, and our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, his brother and son of his paternal uncle, whom he sanctioned for the position of executor, and

the chaste imams among the descendants of both, the clear evident proofs of God to His creatures, peace unconditioned.

O people, truly did God, the Exalted, raise our grandfather Muḥammad to the highest rank and caused him to obtain such nobility as the utmost of hope and desire have never achieved. He, may He be hallowed, issued an order, in which He began with Himself and then included His angels, to revere him in celebration and glorification of his honour. He who is greater than the sayer said: 'Truly, God and His angels blessed the Prophet; O you who believe, bless him and wish him peace unconditionally' [33: 56]. O God, bless our grandfather Muḥammad, Your noble messenger, the guide to Your straight path, he upon whom was revealed: 'Truly, you it was on whom the Qur'an was bestowed coming from the All-wise, All-knowing' [27: 6], and bless, O Lord, the family of Muḥammad.

O God, bless our grandfather Muḥammad, who caused the face of blackish time to shine by his having been sent and to bring by his appearance the good news of all the noble prophets, and for whom was revealed to describe him: 'Truly you are of sublime character' [68: 4]. And bless, O Lord, the family of Muḥammad. And bless, O God, our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, who held the place with respect to him that had Aaron with Moses, the one who spoke to God. And [bless] our mother Fāṭima, the radiant and chaste, and her two sons the imams Abū Muḥammad al-Ḥasan and Abū 'Abd Allāh al-Ḥusayn, the best of creatures, and 'Alī b. al-Ḥusayn Zayn al-'Ābidīn, and Muḥammad b. 'Alī Bākir 'Ulūm al-Dīn, and Ja'far b. Muḥammad al-Šādiq al-Amīn, and the true imam Ismā'īl, and Muḥammad his son, possessors of the nobility of the authentic caliphate and they who had all excellences and superiority, and [bless] the imams who were concealed from their enemy all of whose actions consistently opposed them, and on the piercing stars of truth, the suns rising from the places of setting, al-Mahdī bika, al-Qā'im bi-Amrika, al-Manšūr bi-Našrika, al-Mu'izz li-Dīnika, al-'Azīz bika, al-Ḥākīm bi-Amrika, al-Ẓāhir fi-Izāz Dīnika, al-Mustanšir bika, and al-Musta'li bika, who have been taken to Your secure presence, residing there among the companions of the right hand.³¹⁶

O God, and I am Your servant al-Āmir bi-Aḥkāmika, he who is thankful for Your favour. You put in proper order for me by Your grace the contracts of good fortune, and You crowned me with the highest crown, adorned with pearls of well-ordered success. You made me inherit the position of caliph which was transferred to me from noble forefathers and grandfathers, and You have made my days the advantages of existence. You have had submit to me the necks of lions, and You have joined in obeying me the hearts of both lords and subjects.

O God, so just as You have singled me out by this clear favour, and made of me Your far-reaching proof to the two worlds, bless me and my offspring with the rope of the imamate until the Day of Judgement, as You promised. Make those who follow me be among those who are safe and successful.

O God, be pleased with the Illustrious Excellency, al-Afdal, the son of the Lord Commander of the Armies, may he please You with what are the best of deeds.³¹⁷ Extend the support of Your mercy to them both without interruption.

Grant victory, O God, to our armies and battalions wherever they are or will be, on land or sea, and extirpate by their swords the root of Your enemies who rebel tyrannically and heretically, and protect the Muslims from them in triumph and victory.

Forgive, O God, the Muslims, men and women, believers, male and female, the alive among them and the deceased. Truly You are the benefactor of good deeds and the forgiver of sins.

‘Truly, God has ordained justice, the doing of good deeds, giving to one’s relatives, and He has forbidden indecency, evil acts, and oppression; He admonishes you so that you will remember’ [16: 90]. Be mindful of the exalted God that He might remember you, and offer thanks that He will advance you.

Praise be to God, the Lord of the universe, and may His blessings be on His messenger, our lord Muḥammad, and his family, the chaste ones.

Khuṭba of al-Āmir

On the ʿĪd al-fiṭr

[‘And another among his *khuṭbas* that I found written on a piece of silk and on which was the noble signature: *al-ḥamdu li-lahi rabbu’l-‘ālamīn*, and this is what it said:’]³¹⁸

God is great, God is great! And there is no god but God, and praise be to God, and God is great! God is great! And to God thanks, God is great, for that which He guides us, and for Him gratitude for that which He entrusts to us.

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God, who supports through us, who are the body of imams from the family of His prophet, the religion of Islam, which is indispensable, and who hurls at our enemy, the adversaries, perpetual torture and burning incendiaries of piercing flames,³¹⁹ and who enforces among those who oppose us the judgments of our sharp swords, the piercing of fencers, which spreads through us the markers of justice, the renown of which is exalted in the easts and wests. We thank Him for His favours, which rainstorms generously grant us by the spraying shower of good deeds poured out, and the realization of our hopes all that is both near and distant. We testify that there is no god but God, alone, without associate, a testimony that produces certainty from its wholesome, most agreeable beverages, and which establish the absolute oneness of the Almighty and the ennobling to the highest degree. We bear witness that our grandfather Muḥammad was His servant and His

messenger by means of whom He guided to the Ḥanīfite religion³²⁰ and the most excellent of the laws and ways of conduct. He inspired him with the Qur'an, so brilliant in its signs and wonders, and He aided him through our father, the Commander of the Believers, 'Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, his brother and his legatee and the spokesman of his law who explained its peculiar intricacies. May God bless both of them, and the imams from their progeny, a blessing that causes them to attain by it the noblest of return to the ultimate of ranks.

O people, adhere to the mighty Book of God and to the Sunna of His messenger. Act in accord with what we have understood as its command and example. Rely on them both in the practical applications of religion and in its root principles. Do not pass beyond that to what God forbids, plunging thus into the discourse of heresy and its vanities. Truly, that is one of the snares of Satan and his errors. Accordingly, you have heard the words of the exalted God: 'This is my straight path; follow it and do not follow the roads that will separate you from His way' [6: 153]. Obey our exhortation, which issues from the purity of sincere advice and solicitude. 'Do not be dissuaded by Satan' [43: 62] and his supporters, the people of aberration and hypocrisy, from the laws and what they make clear about the way to proper worship. Indeed God, the Exalted, supports it with His books, His messengers, and their miracles with the most potent of argumentation. He makes minds serve these and does not make minds a judge of the laws. The laws emanate from Him and He is the Creator, unique in knowing the unseen and the perfect. He created intellects, like other attributes of created beings, imperfect. Any imperfection that applies to the perfect cannot be attributed to the Almighty. Be thus fully engaged in what God ordered you to do, and shun what He forbade your doing. Submit to Him to be happy and safe; do not seek salvation by disputation and be thus led to error and regret.

Servants of God! This day of yours is a festival in which God honours the religion of Islam, and closes with it the month of

fasting, which distinguishes it over the other months, and gives it preference. He imposes the fasting of it in commemoration of His favours in His Book, which He revealed during it, and promised all of those who do good deeds in it and repent, a hope of realizing a doubling of the good deeds and forgiveness for evil deeds. In it He turns his face toward the months of pilgrimage to His sacred house, which guarantees to each of its pilgrims and those who perform its *‘umra*, a wiping away of his sins, bringing him to the preciousness of his portion of it. So unsheathe, may God have mercy on you, resolutions that have been accomplished; mount those efforts that will be fulfilled; put first the blessings of those way-markers. Seek refuge in the sanctuary of God, the most all-inclusive of compassions, overcome by His having forgiven crimes, and become successful in the perpetual pleasure of being with Him. Be, for the sanctity of this festival, one who preserves it, doing and saying in it what pleases God. Return to your poor, as assistance, of your funds and kindness. Be safe from a present enemy and a future fear. May God make abundant your share of the lights of certitude. Do for yourself what will be pleasing for you in terms of religion and guard you from the deception of the accursed Satan.

Truly, the most complete of offerings and the clearest of them as guides and means is the words of God and what comprises His statement: ‘The word of your Lord is perfect in truth and justice’ [6: 115], and He says, may He be exalted: ‘When the Qur’an is read, listen to it and hearken to it, perhaps you will be shown mercy’ [7: 204]. I seek refuge in God and the guidance and the light those with Him have, away from Satan and the heresy and delusion he summons to. In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate, ‘they were ordered to serve God alone, sincere in faith to Him, Ḥanīfs, and to observe prayers and offer alms; that is the proper religion’ [98: 5]. God’s blessing for us and you in the noble Qur’an; He avails us and you in the verses and wise remembrance. We seek God’s forgiveness for us and for those believers who submit to us with true submission.

[The second *khuṭba*:]

In the name of God, the Merciful, the Compassionate.

Praise be to God who makes strong through us, the company of imams from the family of His prophet, the partisans of faith, and causes it to be victorious, and puts in order its affairs. God bless our grandfather, Muḥammad, His messenger who perfected His religion, His miracle, and His proof; and [bless] our father, ‘Alī b. Abī Ṭālib, his brother and legatee, through whom he supported, confirmed and upheld it. And [bless] the imams from the progeny of both with a blessing that multiples for each his eminence and beneficence in the abode of His honour.

O people! He ordered you to bless His prophet, the one sent to all creatures, the most perfect of His messengers in principle and in practice. Accordingly, He, hallowed is He, said in a munificent bestowing of favours: ‘Verily, God and His angels extend blessings to the Prophet; O you who believe, bless him and wish him peace without reservation’ [33: 56]. O God, bless Muḥammad by means of whose law You provide creation with considerable guidance and direction. You guide them to salvation and the straight path to it. And [bless] the family of Muḥammad. O God, bless Muḥammad through whom You summon to the abode of Islam and its abiding happiness. By it You bring safety from the fire of hell and its most painful chastisement. And [bless] the family of Muḥammad. O God, bless our father, the Commander of the Believers, his brother and his legatee, brother of his *naq’atihi*³²¹ companion, truthful advisor, his prudent wazir, dispeller of his troubles in critical life threatening battle situations. [Bless] our mother Fāṭima, the radiant, nurturer of the revelation and the nobility of character and honour that was particular to prophecy. [Bless] al-Ḥasan and al-Ḥusayn two imams of the community and shining lights of the sphere of religion and its perfection in assemblies and festivals. [Bless] the imams from the progeny of al-Ḥusayn proceeding in accord with the Sunna of their prophet in traditions and duties, they who hold fast to the signpost of his law, requiring for the

knowledge of any of those who know the imams of right guidance, the chosen of God among the servants, those for every group of whom a guiding imam was appointed.³²² They are the most excellent of the servants and ascetics, and the people of good fortune in establishing orthodox religion and due diligence. A group that adopts anyone else as guardian goes astray; they are ignorant concerning their excellence clearly and conspicuously. They reject the truth by casting it behind them, paying it no attention, perpetrating a false thing by their pertinacity and their splitting off.

O God, most certainly I am Your servant, the one who summons to Your path, the fighter against the enemies of Your messenger, the explainer of Your signs, the indication of that which You promised to Your friends of Your paradise, the clarifier of Your demonstrations and proofs, and the seeker of Your forgiveness and approval. O God, grant me victory over the unbelievers and infidels; make through me appear justice and empower religion, support the warriors and fighters, protect the territory of the believers, defend Islam and the Muslims, guide to the distinct path of the truth those who want guidance. Be for me the best guardian and defender through Your mercy, O most Merciful of the merciful. And praise be to God, the Lord of the worlds. God bless our lord Muḥammad and his family the chaste.

Glossary

Anṣār:	those in and from Medina who assisted and supported the Prophet.
Buyids:	a dynasty of Daylamite origin which ruled the eastern Islamic lands from the middle of the 4th/10th to the middle of the 5th/11th centuries.
<i>dāʿī</i> :	the person who summons or appeals on behalf of the true faith, hence an agent or missionary for the imam and his <i>daʿwa</i> .
<i>daʿwa</i> :	the invitation or appeal issued by God and the imam for men to believe in and accept the true religion, Islam.
Dhuʿl-Fiḡār:	the legendary sword acquired by the Prophet and then given by him to ʿAlī.
<i>duʿāʾ</i> :	prayer or invocation.
<i>hāfiẓ</i> :	a person who knows the Qurʿan by heart.
<i>hawdaj</i> :	a camel litter.
Ibādīs:	the Khārijite sect to which the rebel Abū Yazīd belonged.
ʿĪd al-aḏḥā:	the festival of the feast of sacrifice on the 10th of Dhuʿl-Ḥijja. Also called ʿĪd al-naḥr.
ʿĪd al-fiṭr:	the festival of the breaking of the fast following the close of Ramaḏān.
ʿĪd al-naḥr:	See ʿĪd al-aḏḥā.
<i>iḥrām</i> :	entering a state of ritual purity, of consecration, particularly as in putting on the clothes worn for the pilgrimage.
<i>iqāma</i> :	the call to stand for prayer.

<i>jihād:</i>	the waging of holy war, especially against infidels.
Khārijites:	a Muslim sect noted for its opposition to both Sunnis and Shi'is.
<i>khaṭīb:</i>	the preacher attached to a mosque who delivers the Friday sermon.
Kiyāna:	a high fortress in the Ḥoḍna mountains of what is now Algeria and the last refuge of the Khārijite rebel Abū Yazīd.
Kutāma:	the Berber tribe that were the first to support the mission in North Africa of the <i>dā'ī</i> Abū 'Abdallāh al-Shī'ī and then of the Fatimid imams.
Legatee:	Arabic <i>waṣī</i> , the executor or administrator of an estate or legacy, also its guardian.
Mahdiyya:	the North African coastal town founded by the caliph al-Mahdī to serve as the capital of the Fatimid empire.
<i>manḥar:</i>	a place where animals are slaughtered for sacrifice.
<i>maqṣūra:</i>	box or stall in a mosque near the <i>miḥrāb</i> reserved for the ruler.
<i>miḥrāb:</i>	the principal place or niche in a mosque pointing out the direction of Mecca.
<i>minbar:</i>	the pulpit of a mosque.
<i>mu'adhdhin:</i>	the one who calls to prayer.
Muḥājirūn:	those Companions of the Prophet who left Mecca and joined him in Medina.
<i>muḥannak:</i>	a class of court eunuchs distinguished by wrapping the tail of their turbans under the chin.
<i>muṣallā:</i>	the place for prayer, especially the open ground of a festival square used for 'īd prayers and sermons.
<i>maṣṭaba:</i>	a raised bench on the outside of homes and buildings for people to sit on.
<i>najwā:</i>	a confidential discourse.
<i>rak'a:</i>	an inclination of the head during prayer so that the palms of the hands rest on the knees.
Raqqāda:	a suburb of Qayrawān that became, for a time, the administrative capital under the Aghlabids and earliest Fatimids.

- ṣāʿ: a dry measure of four *mudd*, each *mudd* weighing a *riṭl* and one-third.
- Ṣanhāja: the Berber tribal group from which came the Zirids.
- Seljuks: a Turkish dynasty which dominated the Islamic east beginning in the mid-11th century.
- takbīr*: declaring the greatness of God by saying *Allāhu akbar*.
- tashahhud*: making a profession of religion by testifying to the unity of God and the apostleship of Muḥammad.
- ʿumra: the sacred, lesser visitation (as distinct from the *ḥajj* or ritual pilgrimage) to the holy cities of Mecca and Medina.
- ʿUqaylids: an Arab dynasty of northern Iraq which flourished from about 380/990 until 564/1169.
- Zirids: a Berber dynasty of North Africa who began as the appointed successors of the Fatimids.
- zuhr* prayer: the afternoon prayer.

أثناء حصار المهديّة، قرأها المروزي رجب ٣٣٣

«وأنشأ الإمام القائم بأمر الله أمير المؤمنين صلى الله عليه خطبة يحرض فيها المؤمنين، وأمر المروزي قاضيه بالمهديّة أن يقرأها عليهم. يقول فيها، بعد حمد الله تعالى والثناء عليه والصلاة على النبي محمد صلى الله عليه وعلى آله الطاهرين:»^١

أيها الناس، إن هذا اللعين النكاري قد استشرى شره، واستوبأ مرتعه، وحملته الأماني الغرارة، والنفس التي هي بالسوء أمارة، على أن غمط نعمة الله تعالى عليه، وسول له الشيطان الذي هو قرينه^٢ أن لا غالب له. وإنما أرخى له أمير المؤمنين في زمامه. ليعثر في فضل خطامه فلغنه الله لعناً وبيلاً، وأخزاه خزيّاً طويلاً، وصيره إلى نار تلظى^٣ «لا يصلّاها إلاّ الأشقى» [٩٢: ١٥].

وقد عملتم يا معشر كتامة ما مضى عليه آبائكم وقدماء أسلافكم من لزوم الطاعة والاعتصام بحبلها والتفني بظللها، والمجاهدة في الله حقّ جهاده، وأنكم خبيثة الله لهذا الحقّ المحمدي الفاطمي المهدي حتى أظهره وأعلاه، وجعل لكم فخره وسناه، فأنتم كحواري عيسى وأنصار محمد صلى الله عليهما.

«اللَّهُمَّ، فَاطِرَ السَّمَاوَاتِ وَالْأَرْضِ عَالِمَ الْغَيْبِ وَالشَّهَادَةِ أَنْتَ تَحْكُمُ
بَيْنَ عِبَادِكَ فِيمَا كَانُوا فِيهِ يَخْتَلِفُونَ» (٣٩: ٤٦). اللَّهُمَّ، وَصَلِّ عَلَى الْمُهْدِيِّ
بِاللَّهِ أَبِي مُحَمَّدٍ أَمِيرِ الْمُؤْمِنِينَ كَمَا صَلَّيْتَ وَبَارَكْتَ عَلَى الْخُلَفَاءِ الرَّاشِدِينَ

أَلَا إِنَّهُمْ هُمُ الْكَاذِبُونَ» [٥٨: ١٨]، فظننت^١ الأمة الكاذبة المرتدة الناكسة على عقبها، المغيرة لأمر ربها أنها قد أصابت فيما ادّعت له لخلفائها الذين يزعمون أنهم خلفاء رب العالمين مثل صبي^٢ لم يبلغ ومثل غلام لم يعقل، ومثل طفل يدبر الإسلام يزعمهم ومعهم^٣ امرأة تحمل إليهم الخمر من كل واد وكل قطر على ظهور الخيل وبطن السفن، كما قال الله تعالى: «اتَّخَذُوا أَحْبَارَهُمْ وَرَهَبَانَهُمْ أَرْبَابًا مِنْ دُونِ اللَّهِ» [٩: ٣١] فأنفقوا أموال اليتامى والمساكين ظلماً منهم وعدواناً لمغن^٤ عوآد، وطبراني حاذق ومعزفاني وطبّال مجيد، ورأت ولايتها في الأمصار يصعد أحدهم أعود منبر رسول الله صلى الله عليه وسلم فيعظ الأنام وهو غير واعظ لنفسه، وينزل عن ذلك الموضع فيسألهم^٥ في البلد عن^٦ مغن ومغنية وطبراني وعوآد وسارق وباحس مكيال وناقص ميزان، فيجيء ذلك إليه، لعن الله الظالمين وأعدّ لهم سعيراً^٧، فلا أمرٌ بمعروف ولا ناهٍ عن منكر.

حتى إذا قام عبد الله الضعيف المسكين يدعوهم إلى الله «كَادُوا يَكُونُونَ عَلَيْهِ لِبَدًا» [٧٢: ١٩] «مِنْ كُلِّ حَذَبٍ يَنْسِلُونَ» [٢١: ٩٦]، ومن كل حزن يهطلون. فهلّموا عباد الله إلى ما دعا الله تعالى في كتابه! كلاً قاله الذي لا إله إلا هو «بَلْ نَقْذِفُ بِالْحَقِّ عَلَى الْبَاطِلِ فَيَدْمَغُهُ فَإِذَا هُوَ زَاهِقٌ وَلَكُمُ الْوَيْلُ مِمَّا تَصِفُونَ» [٢١: ١٨].

يا أيها الناس، إنكم أصبحتم في عمياء مظلمة وسوداء مدلهمة، غامرة بفتنة تنقلكم إلى فتنة. قد أضلّتكم بأضاليلها المبتدعة وشملتكم بأكنافها المهلكة. فأنتم عاثمون في غواشيتها مغرقون في مباديها، قد

وَلَا أَكْثَرَ إِلَّا هُوَ مَعَهُمْ أَيْنَ مَا كَانُوا» [٧: ٥٨]، أحاطت بهم قدرته وعلمه «وَلَا يُحِيطُونَ بِشَيْءٍ مِنْ عِلْمِهِ إِلَّا بِمَا شَاءَ» [٢: ٢٥٥]، «وَعَنَتِ الْوُجُوهُ لِلْحَيِّ الْقَيُّومِ وَقَدْ خَابَ مَنْ حَمَلَ ظُلْمًا» [٢٠: ١١١]. هو الأول قبل كل أوان وزمان ومكان وغاية ونهاية، وهو اللطيف الخبير الذي «خَلَقَ السَّمَاوَاتِ بِغَيْرِ عَمَدٍ تَرَوْنَهَا» [٣١: ١٠] ففلق مصابيحها وأضاء شمسها وأنار قمرها وفجر ينابيعها «وَالْأَرْضَ بَعْدَ ذَلِكَ دَحَاهَا أَخْرَجَ مِنْهَا مَاءَهَا وَمَرْعَاهَا» [٧٩: ٣٠-٣١]. فسبحان الذي لا يدل عليه إلا بآياته وما فطر من أرضه وسماواته وiban لخليقته من تدبيره وتكامل رسله إلى الأمم كافة من عباده إذ قال لهم: إِنَّ اللَّهَ فَاطِرُ السَّمَاوَاتِ وَالْأَرْضِ يَدْعُوكُمْ لِيَغْفِرَ لَكُمْ مِنْ ذُنُوبِكُمْ وَيُؤَخِّرَكُمْ إِلَى أَجَلٍ مُّسَمًّى» [١٤: ١٠].

الله أكبر الله أكبر لا إله إلا الله.

والله أكبر، الله أكبر، لا حكم إلا لله، لا طاعة لمن عصى الله. «أَلَا لَعَنَهُ اللَّهُ عَلَى الظَّالِمِينَ الَّذِينَ يَصُدُّونَ عَنْ سَبِيلِ اللَّهِ وَيَبْغُونَهَا عِوَجًا» [١١: ١٨-١٩]، «وَيَقْتُلُونَ الَّذِينَ يَأْمُرُونَ بِالْقِسْطِ مِنَ النَّاسِ» [٢١: ٣].
